### 5. Regular Agenda

**5.1** Adoption Of Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan

Motion: Mike Slavik Second: Laurie Halverson

Tom Lewanski, Parks Natural Resources Manager, presented this item and answered questions related to it. The discussion centered on the natural resource management plan for the Mississippi River Greenway and its funding strategies. One commissioner emphasized the importance of starting with existing funds before pursuing state and federal grants, as well as private contributions. They inquired about the possibility of obtaining simultaneous funding from multiple sources. Staff confirmed that the plan includes utilizing current state and federal grants, with projects being overseen by staff. Additional funding will be sought once the initial funds are depleted.

Staff were directed to make full use of the current state and federal grant funds allocated for existing projects and seek additional funding opportunities for the next phases of these projects.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 17-274 (May 23, 2019), the County Board adopted the Dakota County Natural Resources Management System Plan, which demonstrates a need to develop Natural Resource Management Plans (NRMP) for all County Parks, Greenways, and Conservation Easements; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 20-568 (November 17, 2020), the County Board adopted the Land Conservation Plan, which aims to improve County coordination and collaboration with other agencies and organizations regarding land protection and long-term natural resource management; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 99-526 (September 21, 1999), the County Board adopted the Mississippi River Greenway master plan, which established a 28-mile preferred alignment from St. Paul to downtown Hastings; and

WHEREAS, a consultant was hired to develop the first NRMP for the Mississippi River Greenway; and

WHEREAS, there are plans to potentially extend the greenway southeast along County Road 54 to the Goodhue County border, which would add approximately 9.5 miles of trail; and

WHEREAS, the public lands along the greenway are owned by Dakota County, the Cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings; and

WHEREAS, a stakeholder meeting was held on October 16, 2024, to solicit input on the NRMP. Participants included staff from the cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings, as well as staff from Mississippi Park Connection and the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS, the NRMP addresses the natural resource inventory, future vegetative cover goals, and recommended projects developed in cooperation with landowner partners; and

WHEREAS, Ecologists conducted field work and identified 22 natural area nodes; and

WHEREAS, these nodes were selected because they contain existing natural areas or parks where opportunities exist to increase habitat; and

WHEREAS, trail corridors between these nodes were also surveyed; and

WHEREAS, an estimate of \$2,389,000 in projects were identified; and

WHEREAS, \$589,000 has been secured, to date, from an Environment and Natural Resource Trust Fund Grant and a Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant to begin implementing the recommendations in the plan; and

WHEREAS, external grant funding will be used to fund additional restoration projects, and grant match and cost share fiscal impacts will be established and individually brought to the County Board for review in the form of future joint powers agreements between partners prior to project implementation; and

WHEREAS, the draft NRMP was presented to the Dakota County Planning Commission on June 26, 2025, at which time it voted to recommend to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners to release the draft plan for public review; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 25-360 (July 29, 2025), the County Board authorized the Mississippi River Greenway NRMP be released for a 30-day community review period, which occurred from July 29 through August 29, 2025; and

WHEREAS, no comments were received from the public during the comment

period; and

WHEREAS, during this time, County staff gave presentations about the NRMP to the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission of Inver Grove Heights (August 13) and to the Rosemount Parks and Natural Resources Commission (August 18).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan.

This item was approved and recommended for action by the Board of Commissioners on 10/21/2025.

5.2 Approval Of Unified Schematic Design And Authorization To Amend Professional Services Contract With ALLiiANCE For Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment Project

Jerome Biedny, from Capital Projects Management, and Michael Wiese, Senior Project Manager at CPM, presented on the topic and addressed questions.

Staff and commissioners discussed the schematic design and schedule for phase one of the Empire Maintenance Facility project, which includes a \$20.6 million heated storage facility and a \$1 million amendment for Alliance Architects. This phase would allow the closure of the existing Hastings Transportation Shop and fuel island. Additional discussion centered around the recommended sequencing of the phases (phase 2 includes cold storage sufficient to close the current Farmington Transportation Shop). One commissioner questioned the necessity of the heated storage facility amid the urgency to close the Hastings campus. Staff stressed that the heated storage in phase one is essential to meet future needs and control costs.

Commissioners encouraged staff to look for ways to expedite the closure of the Hasting's Transportation Shop and to provide the board with a future update on the status and plans for the Hampton property that was originally purchased to serve as a transportation shop.

WHEREAS, Improvements were completed at the Empire Maintenance Facility in 2020, including only part of the proposed South Building due to budget constraints; and

WHEREAS, with unmet needs identified, an addition to the South Building was included in the 2024-2028 Facilities Capital Improvement Program Adopted Budget and partially funded in 2024; and

WHEREAS, a previously proposed project to develop a new maintenance facility

in Hampton was not approved to proceed; and

WHEREAS, the County Board instead directed staff to develop and present an alternate to the Hampton facility that would meet its objectives of closing the existing Hastings and Farmington Shops through a phased approach; and

WHEREAS, ALLiiANCE was selected as the consultant firm to provide early phase design services for this project by Resolution No. 24-147 (March 26, 2024); and

WHEREAS, ALLiiANCE and staff were authorized to develop a unified design for phased equipment storage and an office addition for Transportation Department staff by Resolution No. 24-564 (December 3, 2024); and

WHEREAS, the unified design for phased equipment storage would construct an approximate 53,400 square foot storage addition to the South Building by mid-2029 (Phase 1) to allow for future closure and sale of the Hastings Highway Shop site; and

WHEREAS, the unified design would also construct an approximate 22,200 square foot new Pre-Fabricated Cold Storage Building in 2032 (Phase 2) to allow for the closure and sale of the Farmington Highway Shop site; and

WHEREAS, additional efforts to complete the design through construction are necessary; and

WHEREAS, ALLiiANCE has provided a proposal to provide design through construction closeout for an approximate 53,400 square foot storage addition to the South Building; and

WHEREAS, there are sufficient Sales and Use Tax (SUT) funds within the project budget to cover this contract increase.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the schematic design of the Phase 1 South Building storage addition as presented; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the schematic design of the Phase 2 Pre-Fabricated Cold Storage Building as presented; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes amending the professional services contract with ALLiiANCE, 400 Clifton Avenue S., Minneapolis, MN 55403 to increase professional design fees for the Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment project Phase 1, in an amount not to exceed \$1,050,000, for an amended contract total of \$1,430,267, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form.

5.3 Update On Right Of Way Acquisition And Direction On Alignment For Veterans Memorial Greenway

Eddie Buell, Real Estate Supervisor, and Tony Wotzka, County Greenways Manager, presented this item and responded to questions.

Staff and Commissioners discussed three alternatives for the Veterans Memorial Greenway project for the three remaining parcels in Phase II of the project, each with different impacts and costs. All three alternatives would reroute the greenway through Eagan's Lakeside Park to Atlantic Hills Drive. Alternative 1 includes a 10-foot trail and a 5-foot turf boulevard along Atlantic Hills Drive in Eagan, with significant utility and vegetation impacts. Alternative 2 is a 12-foot path at the back of the curb and also runs along Atlantic Hills Drive. This option also has considerable utility and vegetation impacts. Alternative 3 places the greenway on Atlantic Hills Drive, raising concerns about shared use and risk. Staff compared these options, as well as a "no build option", to the adopted plan alignment that runs along an existing transmission line easement behind the three homes. Information related to user experience, public safety, and private property impacts was presented for each of the options.

Commissioners directed staff to:

- 1.Engage with the three remaining homeowners about alternatives 1 and 2 and further attempt to negotiate on the rear easement or fee title acquisition.
- 2. Explore whether the City of Eagan would waive fees for the trail project.
- 3. Present updated information from homeowner discussions and the City of Eagan to the board at a future committee meeting.

Information only; no action requested.

### 6. Physical Development Director's Report

Georg Fischer, Physical Development Director, provided the Committee with a written Division update.

Mr. Fischer addressed the presence of zebra mussels in Lake Byllesby and the ongoing efforts to monitor the situation. He also provided an update to the committee regarding the MMB proposals for three projects, highlighting changes in funding requests. The request for County Road 46 has increased from \$17.5 million to \$22.5 million due to an adjustment in the

match percentage. The funding for the County Road 50 project has been reduced to \$12.6 million. Meanwhile, the funding for the Lebanon Hills and Lake Byllesby Beach House project remains at \$22 million.

### 7. Future Agenda Items

The commissioners discussed a resolution to ensure the MVTA's funding and existence. One commissioner called for a broader discussion in light of upcoming legislative developments and a report due February 1. Concerns were expressed about potential legislative actions to eliminate 1984 opt-out provisions. The board acknowledged the urgency with a November 1 deadline but chose to postpone the decision for further committee discussions to avoid disrupting other legislative goals.

Commissioners directed staff to the following:

1. Schedule a discussion on this topic at the Physical Development Committee at a future date.

The discussion ended with a commissioner assuring to inform Chair Keeley of the board's decision not to take action on the resolution next week.

Authorization To Award Bid And Execute Contract With Ebert Inc. To Provide General Contractor Services For Recycling Zone Plus Project

#### PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize award of bid and execution of a contract with Ebert Inc. dba Ebert Companies to provide general contractor services for the Recycling Zone Plus project.

### **SUMMARY**

The Recycling Zone Plus facility will be a 19,765-square-foot facility providing space for the sorting of reuse products from household hazardous waste, sorting by hazard categories, packing, bulking, weighing, and safe storage of hazardous waste. After check-in, patrons will have the option to drop off scrap metal, paper/cardboard, and tires themselves and then either exit the site or proceed to a covered drop-off area where staff will receive materials, including batteries, oil, paints, fluorescent lamps, and other household chemicals and products. Most materials will then be sent off-site for further processing. Some products will remain at the site for other patrons to take at no cost.

Dakota County's and Scott County's existing household hazardous waste and recycling centers are insufficient to meet current and future needs. The two facilities properly manage almost seven million pounds of material per year from over 80,000 participants. Dakota County's facility already handles four times the capacity it was designed to accommodate, and Scott County's program growth is projected to be 325 percent by 2030. In addition, the large geographical area of Scott County and Dakota County results in underserved areas. In a recent survey, 25 percent of Dakota County residents who did not use the facility said it was either too far away or inconvenient.

A regional facility located in the Lakeville geographic area would increase participation by 32 percent by offering additional convenient opportunities to properly manage hazardous waste and recyclables. An additional site serving both counties will also prolong the life of the two existing facilities by slowing the growth at those sites.

A presentation of the schematic design work was shared for approval at the November 21, 2023, Physical Development Committee of the Whole Meeting.

The base bid design includes the minimum number of additional items to meet Minnesota Buildings, Benchmarks, and Beyond (B3) requirements as outlined in the Solid Waste Processing Facilities Capital Assistance Program. These include 42.5 kW of electricity-producing solar panels (quantity 79 solar panels), including the added roof structure to support it, a geothermal system, a radon exhaust

system, 29 additional trees, and bird-safe glass.

Bid documents were prepared by LHB, the project design firm, which included strategic alternates to provide options to the County Board for consideration.

A public bid was advertised on September 25, 2025. Eight bids were received and opened on October 16, 2025 (Attachment: Bid Tabulation).

The bidders were asked to provide base bids, including four alternates.

- Alternate No. 1 adds 104 additional solar panels to the 79 solar panels included in the base bid. This maximizes the use of the available roof space.
- Alternate No. 2 adds a pre-engineered metal building garage to the project. The base bid does
  not include a garage. The proposed garage is 1,600 square feet and includes a separate
  electric service from the utility company for EV charging inside the garage for county
  equipment. (No longer an option due to City of Lakeville zoning requirements)
- Alternate No. 3 adds an 800-square-foot multi-purpose room for breakroom and training activities. It also converts lobby space to an additional public toilet room to support training activities and adds an additional 16 solar panels over the multi-purpose room. Previous changes to the facility design eliminated dedicated office space in favor of a multi-use space that can be used for office space, trainings, meetings, and as a break room. This is a more efficient use of the space, and is essential to the operations of the facility.
- Alternate No. 4a changes the finish on the lower portion of the precast panels from an acid
  etch finish to a form finish, giving a brick appearance to the precast. (Required due to City of
  Lakeville zoning requirements)
- Alternate No. 4b adds 20 window openings to provide natural lighting to the warehouse and allow the one-story building to appear as a two-story building. (Required due to City of Lakeville zoning requirements)
- Alternate No. 4c adds a 1,600-square-foot precast concrete garage, including a separate electric service from the utility company for EV charging inside the garage for county equipment. The garage is necessary to store the electric loader, associated attachments, and other required facility equipment indoors. Electric vehicles, which have been determined to be the most economical and safe choice for this facility, cannot be stored outdoors in the colder months. The addition of the garage will significantly increase the operational efficiency of the facility by eliminating the need to move the equipment in and out of the facility during hours of operation, freeing up valuable floor space in the main building for other operational needs.

Staff is recommending the approval of Alternates No. 1, 3, 4a, 4b, and 4c.

Staff and LHB, the project design firm, reviewed the bidder qualifications and found that Ebert Inc. has submitted the lowest responsive and responsible bid.

The construction is planned to begin in spring 2026 and will last approximately 12 months. Current funding is a combination of state grants, use of Environmental Legacy Fund fund balance, and a contribution from Dakota County's project partner, Scott County.

### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the bid for the Recycling Zone Plus be awarded to Ebert Inc. in an amount not to

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exceed \$12,930,000 including Alternates No. 1, 3, 4a, 4b, and 4c.

#### **EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS**

The Facilities Capital Improvement Program Adopted Budget for the project includes total funding of \$24,000,000, paid for from multiple sources. State funding is \$8,000,000. The remaining is a split between the use of Environmental Legacy Fund fund balance and contributions from Scott County. Those amounts will be confirmed and amended pending the forthcoming Joint Powers Agreement with Scott County.

The Facilities Management operational costs for the new facility are estimated to be approximately \$125,000 which will be funded by a combination of ELF and the Scott County Joint Powers Agreement. Overall operations of the facility are estimated to increase the Household Hazardous Waste budget by an estimated \$833,000 per year (including the facility management operating costs above). On-going operations will be funded thorough a Joint Powers Agreement with Scott County (still in development) and the Environmental Legacy Fund.

WHEREAS, the Facilities Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget authorized the Recycling Zone Plus project; and

WHEREAS, the Recycling Zone Plus facility will be a 19,765-square-foot facility providing space for the sorting of reuse products from household hazardous waste, sorting by hazard categories, packing, bulking, weighing, and safe storage of hazardous waste. 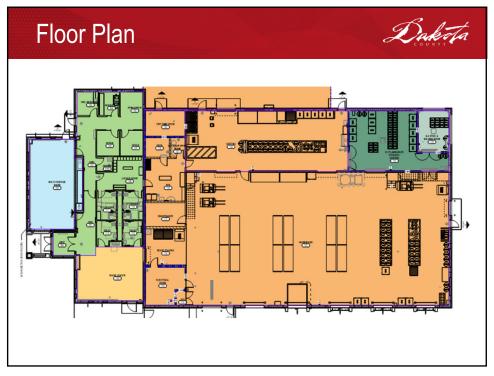

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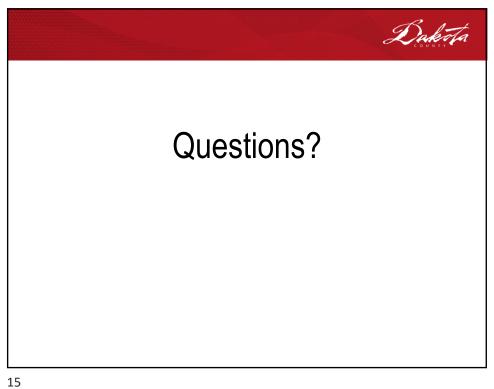

#### PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Approve the schematic design for the Mississippi River Landing Use Area and Access (MRLUA&A) project in Spring Lake Park Reserve (SLPR), County Project (CP) 2000410.

#### SUMMARY

By Resolution No. 21-313 (June 22, 2021), the Dakota County Board of Commissioners adopted the SLPR Masterplan, which outlines the development of the MRLUA&A project. By Resolution No. 23-309 (July 18, 2023), the 2024 Park's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget includes a project to develop the MRLUA&A.

The MRLUA&A, previously referred to as Bud's Landing near Fischer Avenue in SLPR, is currently used to provide limited public water access to the Mississippi River for waterfowl hunting and limited recreation. The current one-lane road is subject to erosion. Minimal parking creates challenges for visitors and programming, and the road grade is steep and not Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant for pedestrian use.

The project will create multiple access paths to the Mississippi River Landing Use Area, including an accessible pedestrian path connecting Fischer Trailhead, a non-accessible soft trail along riverside connecting Camp Spring Lake Retreat Center, and a vehicular access route. New facilities will include two small parking areas, a non-motorized boat launch, an accessible floating pier, self-service kayak rentals, wayfinding and interpretation elements, picnic tables, portable toilets, an outdoor classroom, fishing access points, stormwater treatment features, and vegetation restoration. The team will also study the feasibility of providing a small pavilion building with storage.

The site has a long history of precontact use and habitation by Indigenous people and was previously identified on the Traditional Culture Properties Survey. In 2024, a non-invasive geotechnical survey was conducted to identify the specific nature of cultural sites in the project area. The initial survey found no evidence that would rule out development. County staff consulted with Tribal Partners in April 2025 and confirmed that they are informed of the preliminary archaeological findings and are ready to move ahead.

By Resolution No. 25-337 (July 8, 2025), SRF Consulting Group was selected to provide professional design for the project. Beginning in August 2025, staff collaborated with SRF Consulting Group to

develop schematic design (Attachment: Presentation Slides). A public open house was held in person on September 30, 2025, and project materials were made available online for public comments (Attachment: Public Engagement). Wetland delineation was conducted in September 2025.

Because the project is located in a culturally sensitive area, the design is guided by a desire for a minimal footprint while still meeting the goals of the masterplan. A former homestead site that has already been disturbed is used for the primary road and trail alignments to reduce potential culturally sensitive areas. Staff reviewed the project design with Tribal Partners virtually on September 2, 2025. Per the State Historical Preservation Office's requirement, archaeological shovel testing was carried out in October 2025. Staff will continue to engage Tribal Partners throughout the archaeological review process and design updates.

The location of the project has rich natural resources and environmental resources. Some species of interest include pearly mussel, northern long-eared bats, and rustic patched bumble bee. It is currently under review by multiple related agencies, including U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. These ongoing reviews are expected to influence and inform the final design and project schedule. Due to federal government shutdown, the review time will be impacted and potentially causing the delay of the project.

Cost estimating was conducted in October 2025 based on the preliminary design. Staff worked on strategies to lower the cost so that the proposed scope is within the project budget. The Small Pavilion with storage will be carried as an alternate scope, pending final price.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the County Board approve the schematic design as presented at the November 6, 2025, Physical Development Committee of the Whole.

#### **EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS**

By Resolution No. 23-309 (July 18, 2023), the 2024 Parks CIP includes a budget for this project. By Resolution No. 24-007 (September 24, 2024), the 2025 Parks CIP was amended, and the budget now includes \$4,632,230 in total funding for this project, which will be sufficient for this professional design service contract and the construction work.

#### **Summary of Meeting**

• There were approximately 25-30 people that attended the meeting. Eleven people signed the sign-in sheet when they entered the room.

#### Summary of comments spoken to staff and consultants

- How will the landing and the park integrate and/or regulate E-Watercrafts? Confirm if these will be considered motorized?
- Due to the distance of the trails, recommendations for bikes, and/or E-scooters or other aided travel devices.
- Concern over trailer parking when there are kayak or canoe trailers, especially with larger groups. The preference is not to walk back from Fischer Avenue trailhead. Discussion of a potential pull off area on the one-way loop was a desirable solution.
- Discussion of gate at entrance and operation during park hours was desired
- Concern over duck hunting transition, however, many of the duck hunters and families that
  have hunted here the past 50 years are aging and have alternative locations they could go.
  They have history with this area and would like to have signage and/or viewing areas that
  represent the flyway and key species that gather here.
- Discussion on the need for flood resilient native plantings in this area.
- Great area for birdwatching, would like overlook areas/resting areas along the shoreline
- Kayak fishing is becoming a popular alternative
- Shoreline fishing is okay but a dock is desired because people like to get out deeper when possible

- Would like to have more interpretive signage of the history on the site, bison, birds, and river.
   Would also like to have more bison interpretation and signage near the paddock areas and/or along trails.
- Several questions on weather an overlook was going in near the bison paddocks, its difficult to see the entire paddocks and where the bison are. More signage with QR codes to link to maps that indicate where bison are located.
- Discussion on if duck hunting is not allowed here and non-motorized boats are not allowed, there will be more push from the DNR to improve the other landing access. The other landing has difficult entrance driveway conditions and a very shallow launch.
- Positive attitude towards desire to have portable restrooms at both the upper and lower areas of the park.
- Several comments were made about the initial concern for the project but after todays open house, all are leaving with an excitement and positive attitude towards the proposed work.
- Commissioner stated that what is being proposed is better than what was imagined during the master planning process. Strong suggestion that the paved access road is a priority. Perhaps if need be, the pavilion could be scaled back.

#### **Summary of Comment Cards**

- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River. Concern about safety with the barges. Need for more public education recreation such as canoe/kayaking but have safety warning signs. Interested in trips between Grey Cloud Island and Spring Lake Park Reserve. Could explore mapping, signage, and/or brochure for that route. Rental Kayak kiosk exists at Grey Cloud, would be nice to be able to go one way and drop the kayak or canoe off at either end. Would be nice to be able to take a brief swim or have signage for the water; how is the water? Years ago, I would get in and out of the water near the current access which was nice on a hot day.
- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River. My wife and I have a canoe and enjoy
  paddling. We have paddled the river starting in Inver Grove Heights and would definitely use
  this as an access point.
- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River. Glad to see a port-a-potty included in the plan. The DNR does not provide those at many of its launches. Please include bike racks. Looking forward to keeping updates on this plan process via the Dakota County website. Thanks for an informative open house! Will you have another one once the plans are finalized? We currently kayak from Hilary Path and are very excited for this project, which looks to provide more reliable and convenient access. We also hike and bike the trails in the park, it would be nice to have more connections and amenities. Thanks for opening up the carry-in access to others besides duck hunters. It's a beautiful area!
- Concern with the elimination of the motors (mud motors) from buds landing and what it causes. Dakota County residents use the landing for duck hunting presently and will be very unhappy.

- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River, more trail options, and learning more about
  the area through interpretive elements. No major concerns but be sure to incorporate native
  plant species and protect the existing forest on steep slopes as much as possible. I like what
  is being proposed.
- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River, more trail options, and learning more about
  the area through interpretive elements. Usable access to Spring Lake for motorized craft is
  important. The non-motorized feature with improved parking is great for paddlers. There is
  increased opportunity for recreation in Spring Lake and the park and trails. Overall this looks
  very positive and increases opportunities for activities in Spring Lake park. It will attract more
  visitors to an excellent park.
- Most excited for trail options in the park. Sufficient parking for the canoe/kayak access is important. Like the variety of uses planned into the space and attention to trail and road surfaces for grades and sustainability.
- Most excited for access to the Mississippi River. I think it sounds great, I'm excited for the kayak/canoe rental opportunities. Great job!
- The landing should have some parking for cars with boat trailers even if its canoes/kayaks



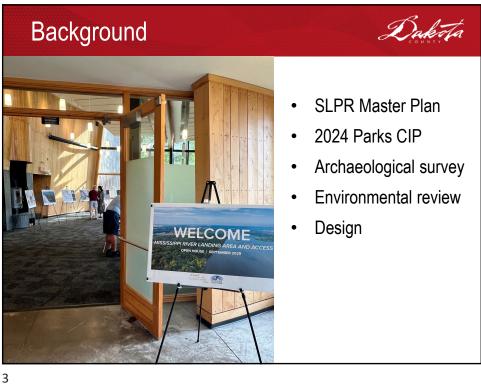

The 2025 construction projects are funded through the approved Parks CIP budget. Staff estimate that it costs about \$4,000 per mile of Greenway to maintain them once they are operationalized, which includes, mowing, snow removal, trash removal, routine inspections, graffiti removal and repairing infrastructure. Deferred or replacement maintenance activities are funded through the Parks Greenway preservation set-aside, which uses Active Transporting funds, for pavement improvements and the Greenway Enhancement Set-Aside, which uses Active Transportation funds and CPA County funds, for other infrastructure repairs or replacements. Staff maintenance activities are funded from the Facilities Department operating budget, which is funded by Levy, General Fund and CPA funding sources.
