TITLE

Public Hearing To Receive Comments And Adoption Of Dakota County 2026 Fee Schedules

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Conduct a public hearing and adopt the 2026 Dakota County fee schedules.

SUMMARY

The County Manager recommends that the County Board adopt fee schedules for fiscal year 2026. Minn. Stat. § 373.41 provides that the County Board may, after a public hearing, establish fees to be charged for services that are not governed by other statutes. Fee revenues provide an important revenue source for the County and help to support the cost of operations and offset the annual levy. The recommended fees are for services that are not governed by a more specific law and are proposed to take effect January 1, 2026, except for several Parks fees which will take effect in late 2025.

The Finance Department worked with all divisions to set fees to cover estimated costs of providing services, including overhead, with an inflationary rate increase of three percent. The projected inflationary increase is consistent with the overall budget planning framework that reflects higher labor costs for 2026. Some exceptions to this approach include:

- Fees established by law or rule; and
- Fees for services when it is difficult to determine the actual cost of service such as rental of campgrounds, facilities, and equipment. The recommendation for these types of fees or services are based upon market rates.

Many Community Services fees are set at the cost of services; however, the amount charged to clients is usually less due to the provision of a sliding fee schedule that is included in the Community Services policy.

The following are highlights of the 2026 fees:

- 10 new fees are being proposed for 2026
- 17 fees are being removed
- 36 fees had an increase over 5%

The recommended fee schedules were presented to the General Government and Policy Committee of the Whole meeting on October 7, 2025 (Attachment: 2026 Proposed Fee Schedules Combined).

6.1 Resolution No: 25-477

Adoption Of Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan

Motion: Mary Hamann-Roland Second: William Droste

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 17-274 (May 23, 2019), the County Board adopted the Dakota County Natural Resources Management System Plan, which demonstrates a need to develop Natural Resource Management Plans (NRMP) for all County Parks, Greenways, and Conservation Easements; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 20-568 (November 17, 2020), the County Board adopted the Land Conservation Plan, which aims to improve County coordination and collaboration with other agencies and organizations regarding land protection and long-term natural resource management; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 99-526 (September 21, 1999), the County Board adopted the Mississippi River Greenway master plan, which established a 28-mile preferred alignment from St. Paul to downtown Hastings; and

WHEREAS, a consultant was hired to develop the first NRMP for the Mississippi River Greenway; and

WHEREAS, there are plans to potentially extend the greenway southeast along County Road 54 to the Goodhue County border, which would add approximately 9.5 miles of trail; and

WHEREAS, the public lands along the greenway are owned by Dakota County, the Cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings; and

WHEREAS, a stakeholder meeting was held on October 16, 2024, to solicit input on the NRMP. Participants included staff from the cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings, as well as staff from Mississippi Park Connection and the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS, the NRMP addresses the natural resource inventory, future vegetative cover goals, and recommended projects developed in cooperation with landowner partners; and

WHEREAS, Ecologists conducted field work and identified 22 natural area nodes; and

WHEREAS, these nodes were selected because they contain existing natural areas or parks where opportunities exist to increase habitat; and

WHEREAS, trail corridors between these nodes were also surveyed; and

WHEREAS, an estimate of \$2,389,000 in projects were identified; and

WHEREAS, \$589,000 has been secured, to date, from an Environment and Natural Resource Trust Fund Grant and a Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant to begin implementing the recommendations in the plan; and

WHEREAS, external grant funding will be used to fund additional restoration projects, and grant match and cost share fiscal impacts will be established and individually brought to the County Board for review in the form of future joint powers agreements between partners prior to project implementation; and

WHEREAS, the draft NRMP was presented to the Dakota County Planning Commission on June 26, 2025, at which time it voted to recommend to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners to release the draft plan for public review; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 25-360 (July 29, 2025), the County Board authorized the Mississippi River Greenway NRMP be released for a 30-day community review period, which occurred from July 29 through August 29, 2025; and

WHEREAS, no comments were received from the public during the comment period; and

WHEREAS, during this time, County staff gave presentations about the NRMP to the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission of Inver Grove Heights (August 13) and to the Rosemount Parks and Natural Resources Commission (August 18).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan.

WHEREAS, a previously proposed project to develop a new maintenance facility in Hampton was not approved to proceed; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County is responsible for the costs of tuberculosis clinical services for residents who are uninsured or underinsured; and

WHEREAS, due to the lack of a clinic in Dakota County that provides infectious tuberculosis related services, Dakota County Public Health has joint powers agreements (JPA) with Hennepin County and Ramsey County to assist with this need; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 23-572 (December 16, 2023), the Dakota County Board of Commissioners authorized the Community Services Director to enter into a JPA with Ramsey County for the delivery of tuberculosis services to Dakota County tuberculosis clients, in a total amount of up to \$70,000 for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County Public Health has utilized Ramsey County tuberculosis services since 2010; and

WHEREAS, Ramsey County operates a tuberculosis control program and is able to provide those program services to Dakota County under the terms of this JPA; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this JPA is to set out the respective duties and responsibilities of Dakota and Ramsey Counties for the provision of tuberculosis control services to those residents who have been referred to Ramsey County by Dakota County; and

WHEREAS, the maximum amount to be paid by Dakota County pursuant to this Agreement shall not exceed \$50,000; and

WHEREAS, the maximum amount to be paid in the previous contract (2023-2025) was not to exceed \$70,000; and

WHEREAS, the maximum amount was decreased by \$20,000 based on an average cost of \$36,000 over a period of two years; and

WHEREAS, the remaining \$14,000 buffer allows for an unpredictable influx in

clients or large-scale contact investigation service costs; and

WHEREAS, tuberculosis control service needs are unpredictable and can vary client to client due to diagnostic needs, diagnosis or disease type, treatment, and follow-up requirements; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends a two-year JPA to continue tuberculosis clinical services provided by Ramsey County through the Saint Paul-Ramsey County Tuberculosis Clinic to clients referred by Dakota County Public Health (Attachment: Joint Powers Agreement); and

WHEREAS, the vendor's performance was previously successful as shown by the ability to receive all clients referred from Dakota County Public Health for diagnostic work, treatment, and follow-up thoroughly and as expected.

SUMMARY

The Dakota County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) provides a comprehensive framework that outlines a coordinated response to emergencies and disasters within the County. The EOP promotes a unified and effective approach to managing incidents that threaten public safety, property, and critical infrastructure.

The EOP outlines an all-hazards approach providing the structure for emergency management operations, and describes the responsibilities, capabilities, and requirements across county departments, cities and townships, response agencies, and partner organizations. It integrates local capabilities with state and federal resources, in alignment with the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS), to support a scalable, flexible, and adaptable response. Plan development incorporates guidance and best practice from FEMA and Minnesota Homeland Security and Emergency Management's (HSEM).

The EOP is organized into two main sections:

- **1. Basic Plan** Provides an overview of the county's approach to emergency management, including legal authorities, concept of operations, roles and responsibilities, and coordination protocols.
- 2. Emergency Support Function (ESF) Annexes Details the organization and assignment of specific functions such as transportation, communications, public health, and sheltering, outlining how each will be managed during a response.

County Board approval of the EOP is required by HSEM once every four years to meet requirements within the Emergency Management Preparedness Grant (EMPG) Program. The County Board must also authorize the County Board Chair, County Manager, and County Emergency Manager to sign the Plan Approval page.

Dakota County EOP Summary

The Dakota County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is developed and updated in accordance with existing federal, state and local statues and understandings of various departments and agencies involved. The plan has been reviewed by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management.

Plan introduction

The plan introduction provides a context for the Dakota County EOP, including the reason, purpose, and assumptions for preparing this plan.

Concept of Operations

Concept of Operations describes the process by which this operations plan will be executed, and how the application of the Incident Command System (ICS) guides coordination. Emergency Responsibilities are assigned to various county departments and are listed under the Emergency Support Functions (ESF) they are responsible for.

Coordination, Direction and Control

Coordination, Direction and Control describes how the direction and control of government operations is achieved from an equipped and organized facility designed to conduct emergency operations. The primary Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is in the Dakota County Judicial Center in Hastings.

The Dakota County Board of Commissioners will be responsible for making policy decisions on behalf of the County during an emergency or disaster.

The County Manager is responsible for the overall direction and control of County resources in response to a large-scale incident or disaster.

The Dakota County Emergency Management Director is responsible to implement the County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) and will serve in an advisory role in policymaking regarding response, resources, and operating guidelines.

Emergency Support Functions (ESF)

The Dakota County Emergency Management Director, through the plan, designates the primary agencies for each Emergency Support Function (ESF) to coordinate the activities of that function. These functions are summarized in the table below:

 - Allow provider agencies, including counties, to set aside a portion of Housing Support funds to pay for their administrative work.
- 4. Crisis mental health services
 - The legislature should create a long-term funding plan to ensure sustainability of the mental health system in Minnesota.
 - While a long-term funding is being developed, the legislature should provide a direct appropriation to Dakota County to support and expand its existing, critical services.

Also, staff is recommending the following capital projects be adopted as priorities for 2026:

- 1. County Road 50 and Interstate 35 interchange
 - County Road 50 safety and pedestrian improvements
 - Transportation improvements for construction detour
- 2. Lebanon Hills & Lake Byllesby campground buildings and beach house replacement
- 3. County Road 46 expansion from Trunk Highway 3 to Trunk Highway 52

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Dakota County supports:

1. A comprehensive plan by the legislature, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and the Minnesota Board of Animal Health to slow the spread of chronic wasting disease.

Waste

- 1. Adequate state resources for the long-term care of existing landfills, including the return of diverted Closed Landfill Investment Fund (CLIF) revenue.
- 2. Development of local priorities and the provision of cost-effective, efficient and environmentally sound statewide waste management practices.
- 3.2. Full state funding to counties for waste diversion mandates by the state. This includes increased funding from the Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment (SCORE).
- 4.3. State actions with funding to properly close the Freeway Landfill to protect public health and the environment and benefit the local community.
- 5.4. Maintaining Minnesota's existing waste management hierarchy that prioritizes waste management in the preferred order: waste and toxicity reduction, reuse, recycling and organics recovery/diversion, resource recovery and land disposal.
- 6.5. State-led coordinated market development efforts to recover materials from waste that prioritizes high-value uses of recovered materials, including for hard-to-recycle materials.
- 7. The use of state funding to support solid waste management projects as a match to the funding counties invest in infrastructure for state-mandated solid waste management activities.
- <u>8.6.</u> Coordinated state efforts to manage tree waste and ensure regional capacity to dispose of large quantities of wood waste from emerald ash borer infestation and tree diseases.
- <u>9.7.</u> Maintaining support for federal and state extended producer responsibility laws and product stewardship approaches that support producer-led toxicity reduction, source reduction, reuse and recycling.

Water

- Coordinated efforts among state agencies to develop updated state rules and guidelines to implement and oversee wastewater, graywater and combined rainwater/stormwater reuse systems.
- 2. Strengthen legislation to protect and improve the quality of groundwater and surface water in Minnesota, and identify and reduce contamination of nitrates, PFAS and other emerging contaminants of concern.
- 3. Update state statute 103I (Wells, Borings and Underground Uses) to allow the commissioner of health to delegate inspection, reporting and enforcement duties for all borings.

- 4.3. Return state aid for aquatic invasive species to original funding levels and establish base funding for land-based invasive species management.
- 5.4. State support of ongoing efforts to financially assist landowners with replacement of non-compliant septic systems for protection of essential groundwater resources. This includes increased funding for the Agriculture Best Management Practices programs or direct grant funds for septic system replacement.
- 6.5. Establishment of a long-term state program to assist public and private drinking water well owners with the mitigation treatment of contaminated well water that exceeds safe drinking water levels for geogenic (e.g., manganese and arsenic) and anthropogenic (e.g., nitrates, pesticides and PFAS) sources.
- 7.6. Support legislation or policies that require new large water users to identify impacts to regional groundwater capacity and availability for current and future needs.

Energy

1. State and federal policies and funding that support cost-effective, clean, renewable and sustainable energy.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

- 1. A child welfare system designed to keep children safe and with their families through adequate funding with the impact of providing manageable caseloads and keeping children in safe permanent housing arrangements.
- 2. Addressing an eligibility gap in the waiver system related to older adults with significant mental health needs.
- 3. An Intrastate Funding Formula (IFF) for distribution of federal Older Americans Act (OAA) resources that adequately funds the growing needs of older adults in the seven-county Twin Cities Metropolitan Area.
- 4. Flexibility for Elderly Waiver renewals for individuals in long-term care.
- 5. Interventions that address workforce challenges and resulting impacts in disability services including:
 - a. Stabilizing home and community-based services staffing through targeted wage increases and other strategies (i.e. educational incentives, etc.).
 - b. Maximizing flexibility in self-directed programs to increase informal support options for people.
 - c. Simplifying paperwork and administrative requirements that don't add value, so direct support staff can focus on direct support.
 - d. Increasing availability of assistive technology to supplement paid caregivers.
- 6. Investments in modernizing the IT infrastructure at all levels for counties administering DHS and DCYF programs that will reduce the administrative burden at the state and county level and improve outcomes for for both clients and workers. This should include additional oversight and

accountability for modernization investments. The state should improve the human services systems counties rely on to administer mandated programs.

- 7. Policies and legislation that address cannabis and THC impacts, including:
 - a. Enhancing local control.
 - b. Reducing public health impacts.
 - c. Dedicating cannabis-related tax and fee revenues for public health prevention activities
 - d. Strengthening efforts to monitor product safety, conduct inspections, prevent access to minors, and enforce rules and regulations.
- 8. Setting the assessment adjustment for Medical Assistance to three years.
- 9. Simplification of state program rules and reporting requirements is paramount to successful modernization.
- 10. Stable, flexible state funding and public policy to improve and maintain healthy communities by supporting:
 - a. Addressing the impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs).
 - b. State funding for home and community-based care.
- 11. State policy and financing to assure a full range of community-based mental health services that promote mental health, prevent mental health problems, promote mental wellbeing, treat mental health conditions, and allow people with mental health conditions to thrive in the community.
- 12. Sustainable funding for community-based Family Resource Centers.
- 13. The elimination of health and human services-related cost shifts to counties.
 - a. Cost shifts coming from the federal government should be covered at the state level, specifically the added administration for SNAP and penalties for high error rates.

Authorization To Execute Contract With Minnesota Labs For Community-Based Drug Testing **Services**

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize execution of a contract with Minnesota Labs for Community-Based Drug Testing Services.

SUMMARY

The work of Children and Family Services requires access to community-based services for children, youth, and families, whether in addressing child protection issues, children's mental health needs, truancy, or youth transitioning from the foster care system. The Minnesota Comprehensive Children's Mental Health Act, specifically Minn. Stat. § 245.4874, subd. 1, requires county boards to develop a system of affordable and locally available children's mental health services based on a local service delivery system detailed in Minn. Stat. § 245.4875, subd. 2.

The juvenile protection provisions of the Juvenile Court Act, Minn. Stat. § 260C, reference child protection case plan services and the need for county social services agencies to provide support and services to prevent out-of-home placement, and to assist in family reunification following children being in out-of-home placement. Children and Family Services contracts for supportive services that address the needs of children, youth, and families based on the concerns that brought them to Social Services.

Social Services requires research-supported testing for exposure to alcohol and other drugs on children, youth, and adults. On September 2, 2025, staff issued a request for proposals for Community-Based Drug Testing Services. A review committee from the Social Services team reviewed and scored the proposals (Attachment: Solicitation Summary).

Staff recommends executing a contract with Minnesota Labs for Community-Based Drug Testing Services for the term and the amount listed below:

- Term of contract: date of execution through December 31, 2026
- Not to exceed (NTE) amount: \$200,000 (NTE amount is the same as previous contract period)
- Funding source: County Levy
- In 2024, 429 clients were referred for testing.

OUTCOMES

The effectiveness of services is evaluated at the program and service level. Services provided

through contracts supports overall child protection and children's mental health plan goals.

How Much?

In 2024, 2,571 children were served by Dakota County's Children and Family Services in programs providing a range of services, including Child Protection Assessment and Case Management, Parent Support Outreach, and Children's Mental Health Assessment and Case Management.

How Well?

In 2024, 124 children entered out-of-home placement through child protection. Of those 124 children, 28 children (23 percent) entered placement with parental drug or alcohol abuse being the primary reason for placement. Through the support of drug testing services, 18 children (64 percent) were successfully reunified with their parents.

Is Anyone Better Off?

For children who entered placement in 2024 and were reunited with their parents, no children (zero percent) have had a repeat report of parental drug or alcohol abuse. One hundred percent of children who reunited did not have a repeat report.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Commissioners authorizes the Community Services Director to execute a contract with Minnesota Labs for Community-Based Drug Testing services in a not to exceed amount of \$200,000 from the date of execution through December 31, 2026.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

Funding for this contract will be included in the 2026 County Manager's Recommended Budget, pending authorization by the County Board. The contract shall contain a provision that allows the County to immediately terminate the contract in the event sufficient funds from county, state, or federal sources are not appropriated at a level sufficient to allow payment of the amount due.

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA AND DAKOTA COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AGENCY FOR FAMILY VOUCHER PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION SERVICES

PARTIES

The parties to this Agreement are the County of Dakota (County), a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota, and the Dakota County Community Development Agency (CDA), (collectively referred to as "the parties.") This Agreement is made pursuant to the authority conferred upon the parties by Minn. Stat. § 471.59.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County desires to engage the CDA to provide Rental Assistance Administration for the Family Voucher Program, which is funded by the State and Local Affordable Housing Aid (SAHA and LAHA), and the CDA desires to serve in this role; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement is made pursuant to the authority conferred upon the parties by Minn. Stat. § 471.59.

ACCORDINGLY, the parties agree:

AGREEMENT

- 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.
- 1.1. <u>Cooperation.</u> The parties agree to cooperate and use their reasonable efforts to ensure prompt implementation of the various provisions of this Agreement, and to in good faith, undertake resolution of any dispute in an equitable and timely manner.
- 1.2. <u>Diversity and Inclusion; Prohibited Acts.</u> It is the policy of the County to respect culture and reduce bias in the workplace and service delivery. The County's commitment to inclusion, diversity, and equity requires that the CDA uphold respectful regard for cultural differences and recognition of individual protected-class status as defined under law.

The CDA, its managers, officers and employees shall abstain from discrimination, harassment and retaliatory actions in the performance of this Agreement. If the County receives a report of non-compliance with this provision, it will share the report with the CDA, conduct an appropriate investigation as warranted by the nature of alleged behavior, and notify the CDA of the findings of the investigation and any required remedial actions by the CDA. The CDA shall inform the County of compliance with any required remedial actions within the time period provided by the County. If the behavior persists, the County may terminate the Agreement in accordance with this Agreement. The CDA shall have policies that prohibit retaliation for reporting that is not in compliance with this provision.

2. TERM.

This Agreement is effective on January 1, 2026 ("Effective Date") and expires on December 31, 2027, or when all Services have been satisfactorily performed and final payment is made, whichever occurs first, unless earlier terminated under the provisions herein or by law.

- 3. CDA'S OBLIGATIONS.
- 3.1. <u>General Description</u>. The CDA shall provide the services generally described as Rental Assistance Administration for the Family Voucher Program (the "Services"). Services shall be provided in accordance with the criteria set out in Exhibit 1, <u>Service Grid</u>, which specifically describes the Services to be provided.
- 3.2. <u>Conformance to Specifications.</u> The CDA represents, covenants, and warrants it can and will perform the Services in a timely manner according to this Agreement.

3.3. <u>Eligible Clients</u>. Services shall be provided to clients who are designated or referred by the County and determined eligible as set out in Exhibit 1, Service Grid.

3.4. Reports/Evaluations.

- A. The CDA shall maintain a complete set of financial and eligibility records for this program based on standards established by regulation and applicable laws and policy.
- B. The CDA's accounting procedures and internal financial controls shall conform to generally accepted accounting practices, including adequate internal controls to assure that: 1) a clearly defined audit trail is available; 2) there is proper classification of expenditures; 3) every cost is allocable to service funds to the extent of benefits received by the service program; and 4) every expenditure has proper documentation on file (i.e., signed time sheets, invoices, cancelled checks).
- C. The County's procedures for monitoring and evaluating the CDA's performance under the terms of this Agreement may include, but are not limited to, on-site visits to the CDA's premises or job site; review of the CDA's financial, statistical and program records; and review of reports and data supplied by the CDA at the County's request. To assist the County in its obligation to evaluate and monitor the CDA's performance the CDA shall allow County personnel access to the CDA's premises or the job site and records, shall maintain a bookkeeping system which reflects all revenue received from the County and all costs incurred in the performance of this Agreement, and shall, upon reasonable notice, meet with County staff to assist the County in the evaluation of the Services, and upon request, provide the County with verification of all services provided.
- D. The CDA shall furnish the County with information regarding any revenue received for program costs. In the event the CDA hereafter receives revenue other than from this Agreement, and such revenue is used to provide any or all of the Services or to pay its employees, volunteers, and permitted subcontractors (collectively, "personnel") for their time allocated to providing the Services, then that revenue shall be deducted from the amount to which the CDA would otherwise be entitled under this Agreement. The CDA further agrees to return any or all such excess payment to the County within sixty (60) calendar days of a request. Upon reasonable notice, the CDA shall meet with County staff to assist the County in evaluation of services.
- E. The CDA shall maintain and upon request furnish the County with program and financial information including evaluation and performance criteria and reports which are reasonably required for effective administration of services. The CDA shall maintain a bookkeeping system which sufficiently and properly reflects all revenue received from the County and all direct and indirect costs incurred in the performance of this Agreement.
- F. The CDA shall provide reports required by the County as outlined in Exhibit 1, Service Grid, or as the County may, from time to time, reasonably require.

3.5. <u>Information about Personnel</u>.

- A. <u>Qualifications</u>. The CDA shall provide the County with such information regarding the qualifications of its personnel to verify that present and subsequent Services are being rendered by competent, trained, and properly licensed or certified individuals.
- B. <u>Background Investigation</u>. If County staff determine that the CDA or any of the CDA's personnel will interact with County clients in performing the Services, the CDA shall comply with the following, and failure to do so may result in termination of the Agreement:

The CDA shall require that all personnel who provide Services pursuant to this Agreement undergo a criminal background check before providing any Services. The CDA agrees to perform such criminal background checks, at its sole expense, and to provide the results thereof to the County upon request.

The CDA further agrees that it shall have an ongoing responsibility to notify the County Liaison of any information obtained because of the criminal background check or from other sources that are necessary for the County to ensure that personnel who may pose a security risk do not gain access to individuals served pursuant to this Agreement or to the County's assets or secured areas.

- 3.6. <u>Ability to Perform.</u> The CDA shall maintain personnel, facilities, and equipment necessary to perform under this Agreement. The CDA shall promptly provide Notice to the County when it knows or suspects it may be unable to perform under this Agreement. The County shall determine whether such inability requires amendment or termination of this Agreement. No Notice of Default is required to terminate under this Section.
- 3.7. <u>Changes in Policies or Personnel.</u> The County may terminate this Agreement by providing ten (10) calendar days' Notice if the CDA makes or proposes significant changes in policies or staffing.

4. PAYMENT.

- 4.1. <u>Total Cost</u>. County will pay the CDA a total amount not to exceed One Million Two Hundred and Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$1,225,000) ("Agreement Maximum). The Agreement Maximum is not subject to any express or implied condition precedent. The County is not required to pay for any minimum amount of any Services.
- 4.2. <u>Payment Rates</u>. The County shall pay for Services as set out in the schedule attached as Exhibit <u>2</u>, <u>Payment & Buget</u>.
- 4.3. <u>Invoices & Time of Payment</u>. The CDA shall invoice the County, and the County shall issue payments, in accordance with Exhibit 2, Payment & Budget.
- 4.4. <u>Interest on Late Payments.</u> This provision is required by Minn. Stat. § 471.425. The County shall pay interest of 1 ½ percent per month or any part of a month to the CDA on any undisputed amount that is not paid on time. The minimum monthly interest penalty payment for an unpaid balance of \$100 or more is \$10. For unpaid balances of less than \$100, the County shall pay the actual interest penalty due the CDA.
- 4.5. <u>Late Request for Payments</u>. The County may refuse to pay invoices received or postmarked more than ninety (90) calendar days after the date that the invoiced Services were performed.
- 4.6. Payment for Unauthorized Claims.
 - A. Payment does not prevent the County from disputing the claim. Payment of a claim is not a waiver, admission, release, ratification, satisfaction, accord, or account stated by the County.
 - B. The County is not responsible for any interest, fee, or penalty if it withholds payment for failure to comply with any provision of this Agreement or during the pendency of an audit or inspection.
 - C. If the County requires an audit or inspection, the County does not have to pay any invoices until the audit or inspection is complete. Upon completion of the audit or inspection, the County will pay the CDA pursuant to the time period for payment after receipt of an invoice.
 - D. The County may offset any overpayment or disallowance of claim by reducing future payments.

5. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS/STANDARDS.

5.1. <u>General</u>. the CDA shall abide by all Federal, State or local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules, and regulations now in effect or hereafter adopted pertaining to this Agreement or to the facilities, programs, and staff for which the CDA is responsible. Any violation of this Section is a material breach of this Agreement. No Notice of Default is required to terminate under this Section.

- 5.2. Revision of Laws. In the event that there is a revision of law, standards, or orders which makes performance of the Agreement or any portion thereof unlawful, all parties will review the Agreement and renegotiate those items, if possible, that are necessary to bring the Agreement into compliance with the law. Refusal to renegotiate within seven (7) calendar days of a request to bring the Agreement into compliance shall be cause for termination of this Agreement as of the date when the Agreement is out of compliance.
- 5.3. Governing Law & Venue. The laws of Minnesota govern all matters related to this Agreement, without giving effect to the principles of conflict of law. Venue and jurisdiction for any litigation related to this Agreement must be in those courts located within Dakota County, State of Minnesota or U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota.
- 5.4. <u>Licenses.</u> At its own expense, the CDA shall procure and maintain all licenses, certifications, registrations, permits, or other rights required to perform the Services under this Agreement. the CDA shall furnish copies of the above to the County upon request. the CDA shall provide Notice to the County of any changes in the above within five (5) calendar days of the change. Any violation of this Section is a material breach of this Agreement. No Notice of Default is required to terminate under this Section.

6. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS.

The CDA is an independent contractor. Nothing in this Agreement is intended to create an employer and employee relationship between the County and the CDA. The CDA is not entitled to receive any of the benefits received by County employees and is not eligible for workers' or unemployment compensation benefits. The CDA also acknowledges and agrees that no withholding or deduction for State or Federal income taxes, FICA, FUTA, or otherwise, will be made from the payments due the CDA, and that it is the CDA's sole obligation to comply with the applicable provisions of all State and Federal tax laws.

7. AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES & NOTICES.

7.1. The following named persons are designated the Authorized Representatives of the parties for the purposes of this Agreement. These persons have the authority to bind the party they represent and to consent to modifications, except that the Authorized Representative shall have only the authority specifically or generally granted by their respective governing boards. Unless otherwise stated in a specific section of this Agreement, any notice or demand provided pursuant to this Agreement (collectively, "Notice") must be in writing to the other party identified below or as may be specified at a later time by such party by providing Notice in accordance with this Section:

7.2. Notice must be provided by either personal delivery on the Authorized Representative or via registered or certified mail to the above address for the Authorized Representative, with return receipt requested

and postage prepaid. For Notice other than Notice of Terminatiob, Notice may be provided by email to the Authorized Representative.

8. LIABILITY & INDEMNIFICATION.

Each party to this Agreement shall be liable for the acts of its officers, employees or agents and the results thereof to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other party, its officers, employees or agents. The provisions of the Municipal Tort Claims Act, Minn. Stat. ch. 466 and other applicable laws govern liability of the County and the CDA. Each insurance party warrants that they are able to comply with the aforementioned indemnity requirement through an insurance or self-insurance program and that each has minimum coverage with the liability limits contained in Minn. Stat. ch. 466. In the event of any claims or actions filed against either party, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to allow a claimant to obtain separate judgments or separate liability caps from the individual Parties. The provisions of this section shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

9. RECORDS AND INFORMATION.

- 9.1. Minnesota Government Data Practices. The CDA and its employees, agents, successors, and assigns must comply with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act (the "MGDPA") as it applies to all data provided to the CDA by the County under this Contract and as it applies to all data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the CDA pursuant to this Contract. If the CDA receives a request to release data pursuant to the MGDPA, the CDA shall notify the County immediately and consult with the County as to how the CDA should respond to the request. The CDA's response shall comply with applicable law.
- 9.2. Private and Confidential Data. The CDA and its employees, agents, successors and assigns shall comply with the provisions of the MGDPA and all other applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations relating to data privacy and confidentiality. The CDA further acknowledges that the classification of trade secret data will be determined by the County based on applicable law, and labeling its data as trade secret data or confidential will not necessarily make it so. The CDA and its personnel shall comply with County security policies and procedures when accessing County facilities in connection with the Services.
- 9.3. County Data. If the CDA has access to or possession of data or information acquired from the County pursuant to this Contract ("County Data"), the CDA shall maintain and protect such County Data as required by the MGDPA and all other applicable state and federal laws, rules and regulations relating to data privacy or confidentiality. The County will retain ownership and control of all County Data. Except to the extent required by law or as agreed to by the County, the CDA shall not retain any County Data that are confidential, protected, privileged, not public, nonpublic, or private, as those classifications are determined pursuant to applicable law. In addition, the CDA shall, upon the County's request, certify destruction of any County Data so specified by the County. If the County permits the CDA to retain copies of any County Data, the CDA shall not, without the prior written consent of the County or unless required by law, use any of the County Data for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever; shall not assign, license, loan, sell, copyright, patent and/or transfer any or all such County Data.
- 9.4. <u>Data Incident Notice.</u> The CDA must provide the County with notice by email to the Authorized Representative and data.practices@co.dakota.mn.uswithin 24 hours of a known or suspected Data Incident. A "Data Incident" is defined as the unauthorized or unlawful processing, accessing, viewing, acquiring, or disclosing of County Data that are confidential, protected, privileged, not public, nonpublic, or private, as those classifications are determined pursuant to applicable law; the unauthorized or accidental loss, destruction, damage, alteration of such County Data; the breach or attempted breach of County security measures; and/or a cybersecurity incident, as defined in Minn. Stat. § 16E.36, subd. 1(c) ("Cybersecurity Incident"), relating to a County System. The notice must include, at a minimum, (a) the nature of the Data Incident; (b) the types of potentially compromised County Data; and (c) the duration and expected consequences of the Data Incident. In addition to providing Notice to the County, pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16E.36, the CDA shall report Cybersecurity Incidents that impact the County to Minnesota IT Services ("MNIT") at the following link: https://mn.gov/mnit/about-mnit/security/cir/. The CDA must

cooperate with County in the investigation, containment, and mitigation of any Data Incident as requested and directed by the County. The County providing or accepting assistance does not constitute a waiver of any claim or cause of action for breach of contract.

9.5. Responsible Authority for Welfare Data. The CDA designates Tony Schertler as its Responsible Authority, pursuant to the MGDPA, Minn. Stat. § 13.46, subd. 10 (a) (4), as the individual responsible for any data collected, created, maintained, or disseminated by the CDA in performing the Services.

10. TERMINATION.

Either party may terminate this Agreement for cause by giving seven days written notice or without cause by giving 30 days written notice, of its intent to terminate, to the other party. Such notice to terminate for cause shall specify the circumstances warranting termination of this Agreement. Cause shall mean a material breach of this Agreement and any supplemental agreements or amendments thereto.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, the County may immediately terminate this Agreement by written if it does not obtain funding from the Minnesota Legislature, Minnesota Agencies, or other funding source, or if its funding cannot be continued at a level sufficient to allow payment of amounts dues under this Agreement. The County will not be assessed any penalty or damages if the Agreement is terminated due to lack of funding.

The County is not obligated to pay for any obligations that are incurred after written Notice of Termination is tendered and CDA shall take all reasonable steps to terminate or minimize any unpaid obligations that were incurred prior the Notice of Termination.

11.2. The Liaison, or his or her successor, has authority to assist the parties in the day-to-day performance of this Agreement, ensure compliance, and provide ongoing consultation related to the performance of this Agreement. The parties shall promptly provide Notice to each other when a Liaison's successor is appointed. The Liaison's successor shall thereafter be the Liaison for purposes of this Agreement.

12. GENERAL.

- 12.1. <u>Assignment.</u> No party shall assign or transfer any rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the party.
- 12.2. <u>Amendments.</u> Any amendment to this Agreement must be in writing and will not be effective until it has been approved and executed by each party.
- 12.3. <u>Rights Cumulative.</u> All remedies under this Agreement or by law are cumulative and may be exercised concurrently or separately. The exercise of any one remedy does not preclude exercise of any other remedies.
- 12.4. <u>Waiver.</u> If either party fails to enforce any provision of this Agreement, that failure does not waive the provision or that party's right to enforce it.
- 12.5. Equal Employment Opportunity. The provisions of Minn. Stat, § 181.59 apply to this Agreement. In addition, in connection with the execution of this Agreement, the CDA agrees that it will comply with Minn. Stat. § 363A.08, to not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, religion, national original, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, membership or activity in a local commission, disability, sexual orientation, or age.

- 12.6. <u>Force Majeure.</u> Neither party shall be liable to the other party for any loss or damage resulting from a delay or failure to perform due to unforeseeable acts or events outside the defaulting party's reasonable control, providing the defaulting party gives notice to the other party as soon as possible. Acts and events may include acts of God, acts of terrorism, war, fire, flood, epidemic, acts of civil or military authority, and natural disasters.
- 12.7. Audit. The CDA shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to costs incurred and services performed under this Agreement for a period of at least six (6) years after the termination of this Agreement. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, Subd. 5, the CDA shall allow the County or other persons or agencies authorized by the County, including the Legislative or State Auditor, access to the records of the CDA at reasonable hours, including all books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices of the CDA relevant to the subject matter of the Agreement, for purposes of audit.
- 12.8. <u>Survival.</u> The provisions of this Agreement which, by their terms, impose obligations that are continuing in nature and which must survive in order to give effect to their meaning will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement, including, without limitation, the following clauses: Sections 8 (Liability & Indemnification); 9 (Records and Information); 12.7 (Audit); and 5.3 (Governing Law and Venue).
- 12.9. <u>Severability.</u> The provisions of this Agreement are severable. If any provision of this Agreement is void, invalid, or unenforceable, it will not affect the validity and enforceability of the remainder of this Agreement unless the void, invalid, or unenforceable provision substantially impairs the value of the entire Agreement with respect to either party.
- 12.10. <u>Agreement Complete.</u> This Agreement, which includes and incorporates herein Exhibit <u>1</u>, <u>Service Grid</u>, and Exhibit <u>2</u>, <u>Payments & Budget</u>, contains all negotiations and agreements between the County and the CDA. No other understanding regarding this Agreement, whether in written or oral form, may be used to bind either party.
- 12.11. <u>Electronic Signatures.</u> The parties agree to the use of electronic signatures in the execution of this Contract.

Invoices & Payment

Invoices must be submitted, at a minimum, quarterly to County. Invoices must specify budget categories and include documentation to support the invoice, including:

- 1. List of enrolled households
- 2. General ledger with itemized Housing Assistance Payments
- 3. Itemized administrative payments

If the invoice is not received by County within sixty (60) calendar days following the last day of the calendar month in which services were provided, County will refuse payment for the aforementioned calendar month.

The County shall make payment to the CDA within thirty-five (35) days of the date on which the invoice is received, and services are accepted by the County, on any invoices or forms required or specified by Dakota County staff. If an invoice is received for a monthly period in which the Quarterly Expenditure Report is past due, the invoice will be held until the Quarterly Expenditure Report has been submitted, even if the invoice was submitted thirty-five (35) or more days prior.

If the invoice is incorrect, defective, or otherwise improper, the County will notify the CDA within ten (10) days of receiving the incorrect invoice. Upon receiving the corrected invoice from the CDA, the County will make payment within thirty days.

Payment will be made upon receipt of an invoice based on a line item budget presented, on Exhibit 2. This budget is estimated and line items may be revised as necessary to achieve programmatic goals, however, County approval is required for line item budget changes of more than 10% of total budget in a year.

This allocation is a decrease of 0.4% from last year's grant allocation.

Staff recommends authorization to execute a grant amendment with DEED to add \$738,230 to the current grant agreement of \$662,657 for a new not to exceed amount of \$1,400,877 and execute contract amendments with DEED Job Service and HIRED to add an additional \$100,000 to each contract for a new not to exceed amount of \$200,000 for each contract for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2027.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize submission of the Biennial Service Agreement (BSA), acceptance of biennial funding from the Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) with the Minnesota Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF), and execution of contract with Avivo for MFIP employment services.

SUMMARY

Minn. Stat. §142G.76, subd.4, requires counties to have an approved biennial service agreement with DCYF to receive consolidated funds. The primary purpose of this service agreement is to assess statewide efforts toward the goal of "economic stability for low-income families" under MFIP. The agreement assesses the ongoing needs of families and children within program areas, the resources available to address these needs, budgeting of allocated resources, and community participation and review in the planning and development of the service agreement.

The 2026-2027 BSA (Attachment: Biennial Service Agreement) builds upon existing efforts by counties to serve the needs of families and children, and to assess how well current efforts are leading to better outcomes for Minnesota families. Counties use the MFIP Consolidated Fund to administer MFIP financial assistance, the Diversionary Work Program (DWP), deliver MFIP and DWP employment services, and provide emergency assistance. As required by law, Employment and Economic Assistance provided an opportunity for public comment through an online public posting on Dakota County's website, available for comment for thirty days prior to the submission of the agreement to DCYF. Dakota County did not receive any public comments as a result and the announcement closed for comments on October 30, 2025.

Staff recommends authorization to submit the BSA for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2027, and accept funds in a total not to exceed amount of \$8,812,654 (\$4,406,327 for each year). This is a decrease of \$232,796 (-2.6%) from the funding received in the prior biennium.

Staff recommends authorization to execute a contract with Avivo for MFIP employment services in a not to exceed amount of \$1,390,406 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026. This is an increase of \$190,406 (15.9%) from the prior year and is increasing as individuals previously enrolled in DWP will now be moving to the MFIP program.

WHEREAS, staff recommends authorization to submit the BSA for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2027, and accept funds for a total not to exceed amount of \$8,812,654 (\$4,406,327 for each year); and

WHEREAS, this is a decrease of \$232,796 (-2.6%) from the funding received in the prior biennium; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends authorization to execute a contract with Avivo for MFIP employment services in a not to exceed amount of \$1,390,406 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026; and

WHEREAS, this is an increase of \$190,406 (15.9%) from the prior year and is increasing as individuals previously enrolled in DWP will now be moving to the MFIP program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes Dakota County to submit the Biennial Service Agreement for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2027, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Community Services Director to accept funds from the Minnesota Family Investment Program with the Minnesota Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) in an amount not to exceed \$8,812,654 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2027; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That unless the grant program requirements change, the Community Services Director is hereby authorized to amend the grant to extend the grant term up to two years after initial expiration date, accept additional grant funds, and continue grant-funded full-time equivalents, consistent with County contracting policies, and inclusion of grant funds in future yearly Recommended and Approved Budgets, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Community Services Director to execute a contract with Avivo for Minnesota Family Investment Program employment services in a not to exceed amount of \$1,390,406 for the period of January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Community Services Director is hereby authorized to amend said contract, consistent with the amount budgeted, to alter the contract amount and the contract term up to one year after initial expiration date, consistent with County contracting policies, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That the contract shall contain a provision that allows the County to immediately terminate the contract in the event sufficient funds from county, state, or federal sources are not appropriated at a level sufficient to allow payment of the amount due.

Authorization To Execute Joint Powers Agreement With City Of Lakeville For Greenway And **Trail Segment Maintenance**

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the execution of a city-wide maintenance agreement with the City of Lakeville for the North Creek Greenway that require routine and deferred maintenance, or replacement of Greenway Regional trail infrastructure according to the County's existing maintenance service standards (Attachment: Draft Maintenance Agreement). Additional segments and infrastructure of the North Creek Greenway and Lake Marion Greenway will be added through contract amendments (Attachment: Open and Planned Map).

SUMMARY

By Resolution No. 11-517 (October 18, 2011), the North Creek Greenway Master Plan (Master Plan) was adopted by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners. The master plan established a preferred alignment of the North Creek Greenway from Lebanon Hills Regional Park to downtown Farmington. The proposed Draft Maintenance Agreement is a new template that creates a standard city-wide maintenance agreement for Greenway segments and infrastructure, rather than multiple individual agreements for segments or separate projects. A primary goal is to create efficiencies for both the County and City. The proposed agreement will define maintenance responsibilities for approximately 3,300 ft. of new regional greenway trail and the recently constructed improved midblock crossing of 170th Street, which were both 2025 City-led construction projects. The agreement will also include the 2024 - 2025 County-led project P00146 which constructed 2.2 miles of new and reconstructed trail, including two new trail bridges over the North Creek and adjacent tributaries and wetlands in the cities of Lakeville and Farmington (Attachment: Project Location Map). Subsequent amendments to the agreement will be completed by adding or revising exhibits when new infrastructure is added, like future segments of the North Creek Greenway and Lake Marion Greenway, or if maintenance terms change.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends Dakota County execute a Maintenance Agreement with the City of Lakeville for Greenway and trail segments within the city boundaries of Lakeville for the North Creek Greenway that require maintenance responsibilities and reimbursement responsibilities.

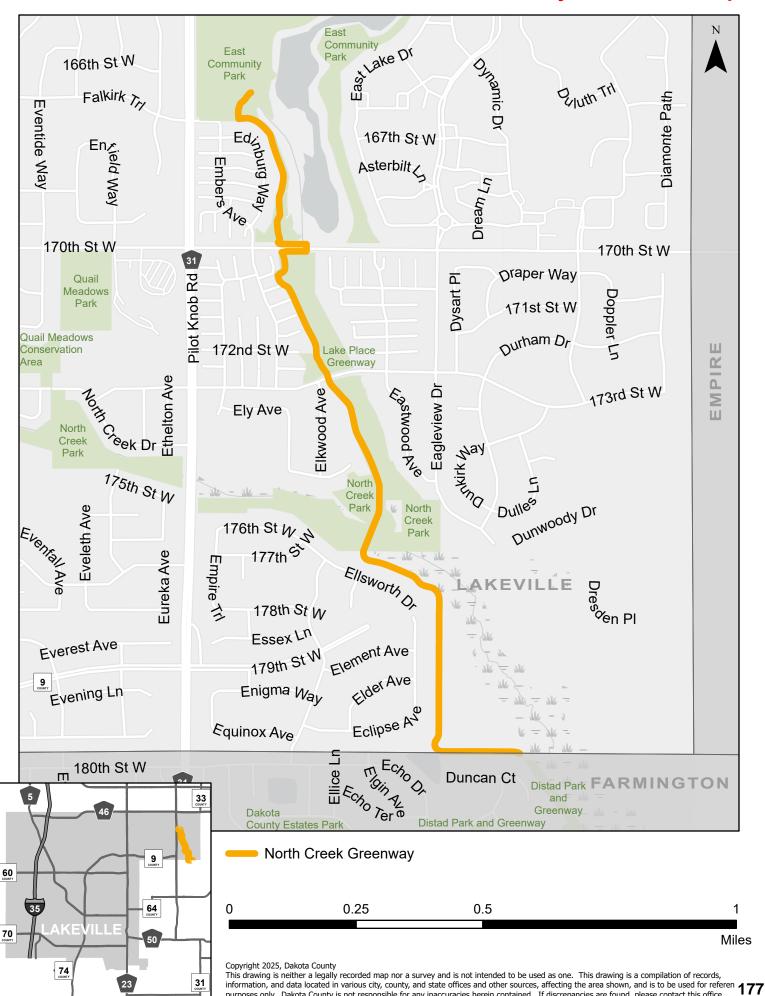

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA AND THE CITY OF LAKEVILLE FOR MAINTENANCE OF GREENWAYS. TRAILS AND ASSOCIATED IMPROVEMENTS

This Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") is between the County of Dakota, by and through Dakota County Parks ("County") and the City of Lakeville ("City"). This Agreement uses the word "Parties" for both the County and the City.

WHEREAS, the County and City are governmental units as that term is defined in Minn. Stat. § 471.59.

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 471.59 authorizes local governmental units to jointly or cooperatively exercise any power common to the contracting parties.

WHEREAS, the Parties have cooperated and intend to continue to cooperate in the construction of various Greenway and other regional and local trail segments and associated improvements within the City.

WHEREAS, the City and County recognize that it may be efficient and cost-effective to share resources and cooperate in maintaining certain Greenway and trail segments and their associated improvements.

WHEREAS, the City and the County further recognize that it will be efficient to have a single master maintenance agreement for all Greenway and trail segments within the City, and to provide for that agreement to be modified over time as improvements are added or removed and as cooperative opportunities and maintenance efficiencies may change.

WHEREAS, the City and the County therefore desire to enter into this Agreement for the purpose of identifying cooperative maintenance opportunities and the responsibilities of the Parties for maintaining various regional and local improvements within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to set out the respective duties and responsibilities of the County and the City for the maintenance of Greenways and other regional and local trail segments located within the City and their associated improvements, as more fully described herein.

ARTICLE 2 TERM

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of the signatures of the Parties (the "Effective Date") and shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein, or until termination is required by operation of law or by decision of a court of competent jurisdiction.

ARTICLE 3 MAINTENANCE

- 4.1 County Maintenance Obligations. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the County will be responsible for the routine maintenance, repair and replacement of the County's trail improvements located within the Greenway segment(s) shown on the attached Exhibit 1 (the "Greenway Improvements"), at no cost to the City. The County's maintenance obligations shall be limited to those Greenway Improvements constructed within areas for which the County has an easement or other right to use and maintain property for the Greenway Improvements, including through this Agreement, as determined by the County. The County will maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements according to the County's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the County in its sole discretion.
- **4.2** <u>City Maintenance Obligations.</u> Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the City will be responsible for all routine maintenance, repair and replacement of any City-owned trail improvements connected to the Greenway Improvements (the "City Improvements"), at no cost to the County. The City will maintain the City Improvements according to the City's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the City in its sole discretion.

4.3 Cooperative Maintenance Responsibilities, Payment.

- 4.3.1 <u>City Greenway Maintenance</u>. The City will be responsible for routine maintenance for those Greenway Improvement segments shown on Exhibit 2 and any addendum to Exhibit 2 (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 2"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual Greenway segments shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 2. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 2, the City shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair or replacement of the Greenway Improvements but may notify the County if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.2 County Local Improvement Maintenance. The County will be responsible for all routine maintenance for those segments of any City Improvements shown on Exhibit 3 and any addendum to Exhibit 3, if any (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 3"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual City Improvements shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 3. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 3, the County shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair and replacement of the City Improvements but may notify the City if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.3 Payment for Cooperative Maintenance. A Party assuming a maintenance obligation under this Agreement shall be compensated according to the amounts, if any, identified on the applicable Exhibit. By way of example, the Exhibits may identify a per mile charge for certain tasks (such as snow removal, cleaning, mowing) and/or a per unit or flat charge for certain asks (such as emptying trash receptacles), or any other appropriate compensation method agreeable to the Parties. In addition, the Parties may provide on the Exhibits that no compensation is appropriate if the Parties agree that their shared maintenance obligations for each other's improvements are roughly equal.

- 4.3.4 Adjustments for Cooperative Maintenance Payments. The City and the County will meet prior to June 1 each year as provided in Article 6 of this Agreement, to evaluate and establish the compensation rates that will be applicable to their respective maintenance obligations for the following calendar year, and the compensation rates may be modified by agreement of the Parties. Following the annual meeting, a Party proposing an increase in compensation rates shall provide written notice of such increase to the other Party's Authorized Representative. The Authorized Representative will respond in writing within 60 days and may request additional information or may, in its discretion, accept or reject the proposed rate increase. If the rate increase is accepted, the Parties shall memorialize a modification to the applicable Exhibit by amendment or by separate addendum referencing this Agreement. If the proposed compensation rate increase is rejected or if the proposed increase has not been accepted or rejected in writing within 60 days from the date the written proposal was submitted, the proposing Party may terminate this Agreement as set forth in Section 8.1.
- **New Improvements.** The Parties will coordinate on the installation of new Greenway improvements and new City improvements that may be connected to current or future Greenway improvements (the "Additional Improvements"). The Parties may include Additional Improvements within the cooperative maintenance responsibilities identified in this Agreement through a written amendment to the Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Any such amendment shall be considered a material amendment under Section 7.3 of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 5 ACCESS AND USE RIGHTS

- 5.1 <u>City Access to Greenway Easements</u>. The City may reasonably access the Greenway Improvements for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes related to routine work relating to the City Improvements. The City will contact the County prior to beginning any work that requires Greenway closure, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the County or the public's use of the Greenway Improvements. The City may be required to obtain a special use permit from the County for such extended access
- **County Access to City Right-of-Way and Property.** The County may reasonably access City right-of-way and other City-owned property for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes in connection with routine work relating to improvements owned by the County and connected to City Improvements. The County will contact the City prior to beginning any work that requires any closure of City right-of-way, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the City's or the public's use of City right-of-way or other property. The County may be required to obtain a special use permit from the City for such extended access.
- **Perpetual License for Greenway Improvements.** The City grants a perpetual license for the County and its employees, agents and contractors to install, maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements for those Greenway segments shown on Exhibit 1 that are located on City property or within City right-of-way. The perpetual license shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement. The perpetual license shall be subject to the City's right to require relocation of the Greenway Improvements pursuant to applicable law. The City's right to require relocation shall also survive expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Permanent Easements for Greenway Improvements. At the County's request, and limited to City-owned property, the City will replace the license provided for in section 5.3 with permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements shown on Exhibit 1. The City will execute documents reasonably necessary to convey permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements. The County will provide all surveying and other documentation and information necessary for the City to grant the requested permanent easements.

ARTICLE 6 ANNUAL REVIEW

The parties shall confer annually to review the parties' respective maintenance obligations and to discuss any issues the parties may have relating to this Agreement. The annual meeting shall occur on or before June 1 of each year, unless a later date is agreeable to both parties for their convenience.

ARTICLE 7 AMENDMENTS

- **7.1** Amendments. No amendments or variations of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties' Authorized Representatives.
- Administrative Amendments. The Authorized Representatives may make non-material alterations, amendments, variations, modifications, or waivers to this Agreement without first obtaining authorization form their respective governing bodies. Any such modification or amendment shall not be effective until incorporated as a written amendment to this Agreement pursuant to section 7.1. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Parties may adjust the compensation rates provided for in Section 4.3.4 through a written addendum explicitly referencing this Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Modification of the maintenance obligations identified in the Exhibits to this Agreement made for the convenience of the Parties shall be considered a non-material amendment, provided that the Parties' Authorized Representatives determine that such modifications do not significantly impact the Party's approved budget for its obligations under this Agreement. Nothing in this Section 7.2 requires a Party to process an amendment administratively if, in the Party's sole discretion, the Party determines that a proposed amendment should be reviewed by its governing body.
- 7.3. Material Amendments. Any material changes to this Agreement, including but not limited to the addition or removal of any Greenway Improvement segments to or from Exhibit 1 or the modification of maintenance obligations that, in the view of an individual Party, significantly impact that Party's maintenance budget, including but not limited to costs of materials, equipment, and wages, shall require authorization and approval by the Parties' respective governing bodies. A Party may unilaterally choose to have its governing body approve an increase in compensation rates established in Section 4.3.4 of this Agreement. A decision by a Party to have its governing body approve one or more annual compensation rate increases shall not require the other Party to also request approval from its governing body.

ARTICLE 8 TERMINATION

- **8.1** With or Without Cause. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause, by either Party upon sixty (60) calendar days' written notice of intent to terminate.
- **8.2 Non-Appropriation of Funds.** Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, either Party may terminate this Agreement immediately in the event the Party determines that sufficient funds from City, County, State, or Federal sources are not appropriated at a level sufficient to allow for the performance of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9 AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES AND LIAISONS

Authorized Representatives. The following named persons are designated the Authorized Representatives of the parties for purposes of this Agreement. The Authorized Representative, or their successor, has authority to bind the Party they represent to the extent such authority has been granted by the Party's governing body. The parties shall promptly provide Notice to each other when an Authorized Representative's successor is appointed. All notice shall be provided to the following named persons and addresses unless otherwise stated in this Agreement:

ARTICLE 10 LIABILITY

Each Party to this Agreement shall be liable for the acts of their own officers, agents, volunteers, or employees and results thereof to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other Party, its officers, agents, volunteers, or employees. The parties mutually agree to indemnify and hold harmless each other from any claims, losses, costs,

expenses, or damages resulting from the acts or omissions of the respective offices, agents, or employees related to activities conducted by either Party under this Agreement. It is understood and agreed that the provisions of the Minn. Stat. § 471.59, the Municipal Tort Claims Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 466 and other applicable laws govern liability arising from the parties' acts or omissions. Each Party warrants that they are able to comply with this section through an insurance or self-insurance program and that each has minimum coverage consistent with the liability limits contained in Minn. Stat. Ch. 466. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to allow a claimant to obtain separate judgments or separate liability caps from the individual parties. The provisions of this Article 10 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11 GENERAL PROVISIONS

- **11.1** Conflict Resolution. The County and City will cooperate in the coordination of operations and maintenance of the Greenway Improvements, City Improvements, and any Additional Improvements. The City and County Authorized Representatives, or successors, will be responsible for resolving issues and conflicts. If the Authorized Representatives are unable to reconcile issues and conflicts the responsibility for resolution shall be forwarded to the County Manager and City Administrator.
- **11.2 No Joint Venture.** It is agreed that nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as creating the relationship of agents, partners, joint ventures, or associates between the parties or as constituting the County or the City as the employee of the other entity for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever.
- **11.3 Data Practices.** The Parties agree that any information and data received from the other Party during the term of this Agreement shall be treated and maintained in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules and regulations governing same, including but not limited to the provisions of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13.
- **11.4** Notices. Any notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be delivered personally or sent by U.S. mail to the other Party's Authorized Representative. Mailed notice shall be deemed complete two business days after the date of mailing.
- 11.5 <u>Audit.</u> To the extent applicable as to any disbursement of public funds between the Parties for services provided under this Agreement, the Parties shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to costs incurred and services performed under this Agreement for a period of at least six (6) years after the termination of this Agreement. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, Subd. 5, each Party shall allow the other Party, the State Auditor, or their authorized representatives access to the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to the subject matter of the Agreement, for purposes of audit.
- **11.6** <u>Minnesota Law Governs</u>. The laws of Minnesota govern all matters related to this Agreement, without giving effect to the principles of conflict of law. Venue and jurisdiction for any litigation related to this Agreement must be in those courts located within the County of Dakota, State of Minnesota or U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota.

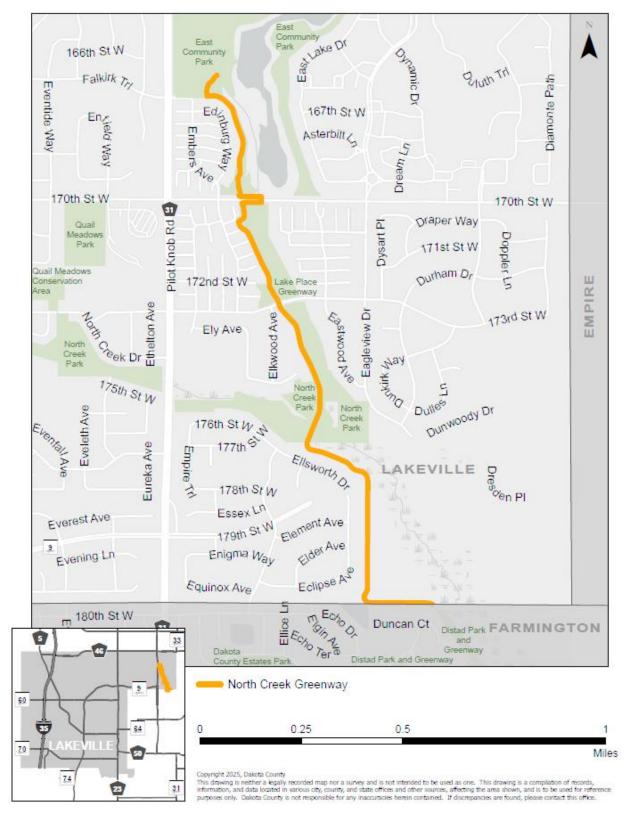
- **11.7 Survival.** The provisions of this Agreement which, by their terms, impose obligations that are continuing in nature and which must survive in order to give effect to their meaning will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- **11.8** Authority. The person or persons executing this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the City and the County represent that they are duly authorized to execute this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the respective Parties and represent and warrant that this Joint Powers Agreement is a legal, valid and binding obligation and is enforceable in accordance with its terms.
- **11.9 Severability.** In the event that any portion of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.
- **11.10** <u>Electronic Signatures</u>. Each Party agrees the electronic signatures of the Parties included in this Agreement are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as wet ink signatures.

Authorization To Execute Joint Powers Agreement With City Of Hastings For Greenway And **Trail Segment Maintenance**

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the execution of a city-wide maintenance agreement with the City of Hastings for the Mississippi River Greenway and Vermillion River Greenway that require routine and deferred maintenance, or replacement of Greenway Regional trail infrastructure according to the County's existing maintenance service standards (Attachment: Draft Maintenance Agreement).

SUMMARY

By Resolution No. 99-526 (September 21, 1999), the Mississippi River Greenway Master Plan (Master Plan) was adopted by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners. The master plan established a preferred alignment of the Mississippi River Greenway from St. Paul to Hastings. By Resolution No. 19-767 (October 29, 2019), the Vermillion River Greenway - Hastings Segment Master Plan (Master Plan) was adopted by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners. The master plan established a preferred alignment of the Vermillion River Greenway from within the Hastings city limits. The proposed Draft Maintenance Agreement is a new template that creates a standard citywide maintenance agreement for Greenway segments and infrastructure, rather than multiple individual agreements for segments or separate projects. A primary goal is to create efficiencies for both the County and City. The proposed Maintenance Agreement will define maintenance responsibilities for approximately 4.4 miles of existing and recently reconstructed Mississippi River Greenway regional trail, as well as the 2024 - 2025 County-led project P00301 which reconstructed 2.1 miles of new and reconstructed trail, including a new bridge over Tributary No. 1 to the Vermillion River (Attachment: Project Location Map). Subsequent amendments to the agreement will be completed by adding or revising exhibits when new infrastructure is added, like future segments of the Mississippi River Greenway and Vermillion River Greenway, or if maintenance terms change.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends Dakota County execute a Maintenance Agreement with the City of Hastings for Greenway and trail segments within the city boundaries of Hastings for the Mississippi River Greenway, Vermillion River Greenway that require maintenance and reimbursement responsibilities.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The City of Hastings will perform routine maintenance of the Greenway Regional trails, with the County responsible for routine and deferred maintenance, or replacement, of Greenway Regional trail infrastructure. The County reimburses cities with funds from the Facilities Department operating

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 99-526 (September 21, 1999), the Dakota County Board of Commissioners adopted the Mississippi River Greenway Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, sufficient funds are available in the Asset Preservation Set-aside project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Physical Development Director, or their designee, to execute a Maintenance Agreement, as substantially presented, with the City of Hastings for the Mississippi River Greenway and Vermillion River Greenway that require routine and deferred maintenance, or replacement of Greenway Regional trail infrastructure according to the County's existing maintenance service standards, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form.

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA AND THE CITY OF HASTINGS FOR MAINTENANCE OF GREENWAYS. TRAILS AND ASSOCIATED IMPROVEMENTS

This Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") is between the County of Dakota, by and through Dakota County Parks ("County") and the City of Hastings ("City"). This Agreement uses the word "Parties" for both the County and the City.

WHEREAS, the County and City are governmental units as that term is defined in Minn. Stat. § 471.59.

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 471.59 authorizes local governmental units to jointly or cooperatively exercise any power common to the contracting parties.

WHEREAS, the Parties have cooperated and intend to continue to cooperate in the construction of various Greenway and other regional and local trail segments and associated improvements within the City.

WHEREAS, the City and County recognize that it may be efficient and cost-effective to share resources and cooperate in maintaining certain Greenway and trail segments and their associated improvements.

WHEREAS, the City and the County further recognize that it will be efficient to have a single master maintenance agreement for all Greenway and trail segments within the City, and to provide for that agreement to be modified over time as improvements are added or removed and as cooperative opportunities and maintenance efficiencies may change.

WHEREAS, the City and the County therefore desire to enter into this Agreement for the purpose of identifying cooperative maintenance opportunities and the responsibilities of the Parties for maintaining various regional and local improvements within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to set out the respective duties and responsibilities of the County and the City for the maintenance of Greenways and other regional and local trail segments located within the City and their associated improvements, as more fully described herein.

ARTICLE 2 TERM

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of the signatures of the Parties (the "Effective Date") and shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein, or until termination is required by operation of law or by decision of a court of competent jurisdiction.

ARTICLE 3 MAINTENANCE

- 4.1 County Maintenance Obligations. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the County will be responsible for the routine maintenance, repair and replacement of the County's trail improvements located within the Greenway segment(s) shown on the attached Exhibit 1 (the "Greenway Improvements"), at no cost to the City. The County's maintenance obligations shall be limited to those Greenway Improvements constructed within areas for which the County has an easement or other right to use and maintain property for the Greenway Improvements, including through this Agreement, as determined by the County. The County will maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements according to the County's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the County in its sole discretion.
- **4.2** <u>City Maintenance Obligations.</u> Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the City will be responsible for all routine maintenance, repair and replacement of any City-owned trail improvements connected to the Greenway Improvements (the "City Improvements"), at no cost to the County. The City will maintain the City Improvements according to the City's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the City in its sole discretion.

4.3 Cooperative Maintenance Responsibilities, Payment.

- 4.3.1 <u>City Greenway Maintenance</u>. The City will be responsible for routine maintenance for those Greenway Improvement segments shown on Exhibit 2 and any addendum to Exhibit 2 (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 2"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual Greenway segments shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 2. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 2, the City shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair or replacement of the Greenway Improvements but may notify the County if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.2 County Local Improvement Maintenance. The County will be responsible for all routine maintenance for those segments of any City Improvements shown on Exhibit 3 and any addendum to Exhibit 3, if any (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 3"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual City Improvements shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 3. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 3, the County shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair and replacement of the City Improvements but may notify the City if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.3 Payment for Cooperative Maintenance. A Party assuming a maintenance obligation under this Agreement shall be compensated according to the amounts, if any, identified on the applicable Exhibit. By way of example, the Exhibits may identify a per mile charge for certain tasks (such as snow removal, cleaning, mowing) and/or a per unit or flat charge for certain asks (such as emptying trash receptacles), or any other appropriate compensation method agreeable to the Parties. In addition, the Parties may provide on the Exhibits that no compensation is appropriate if the Parties agree that their shared maintenance obligations for each other's improvements are roughly equal.

- 4.3.4 Adjustments for Cooperative Maintenance Payments. The City and the County will meet prior to June 1 each year as provided in Article 6 of this Agreement, to evaluate and establish the compensation rates that will be applicable to their respective maintenance obligations for the following calendar year, and the compensation rates may be modified by agreement of the Parties. Following the annual meeting, a Party proposing an increase in compensation rates shall provide written notice of such increase to the other Party's Authorized Representative. The Authorized Representative will respond in writing within 60 days and may request additional information or may, in its discretion, accept or reject the proposed rate increase. If the rate increase is accepted, the Parties shall memorialize a modification to the applicable Exhibit by amendment or by separate addendum referencing this Agreement. If the proposed compensation rate increase is rejected or if the proposed increase has not been accepted or rejected in writing within 60 days from the date the written proposal was submitted, the proposing Party may terminate this Agreement as set forth in Section 8.1.
- **New Improvements.** The Parties will coordinate on the installation of new Greenway improvements and new City improvements that may be connected to current or future Greenway improvements (the "Additional Improvements"). The Parties may include Additional Improvements within the cooperative maintenance responsibilities identified in this Agreement through a written amendment to the Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Any such amendment shall be considered a material amendment under Section 7.3 of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 5 ACCESS AND USE RIGHTS

- 5.1 <u>City Access to Greenway Easements</u>. The City may reasonably access the Greenway Improvements for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes related to routine work relating to the City Improvements. The City will contact the County prior to beginning any work that requires Greenway closure, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the County or the public's use of the Greenway Improvements. The City may be required to obtain a special use permit from the County for such extended access
- **County Access to City Right-of-Way and Property.** The County may reasonably access City right-of-way and other City-owned property for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes in connection with routine work relating to improvements owned by the County and connected to City Improvements. The County will contact the City prior to beginning any work that requires any closure of City right-of-way, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the City's or the public's use of City right-of-way or other property. The County may be required to obtain a special use permit from the City for such extended access.
- **Perpetual License for Greenway Improvements.** The City grants a perpetual license for the County and its employees, agents and contractors to install, maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements for those Greenway segments shown on Exhibit 1 that are located on City property or within City right-of-way. The perpetual license shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement. The perpetual license shall be subject to the City's right to require relocation of the Greenway Improvements pursuant to applicable law. The City's right to require relocation shall also survive expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Permanent Easements for Greenway Improvements. At the County's request, and limited to City-owned property, the City will replace the license provided for in section 5.3 with permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements shown on Exhibit 1. The City will execute documents reasonably necessary to convey permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements. The County will provide all surveying and other documentation and information necessary for the City to grant the requested permanent easements.

ARTICLE 6 ANNUAL REVIEW

The parties shall confer annually to review the parties' respective maintenance obligations and to discuss any issues the parties may have relating to this Agreement. The annual meeting shall occur on or before June 1 of each year, unless a later date is agreeable to both parties for their convenience.

ARTICLE 7 AMENDMENTS

- **7.1** <u>Amendments.</u> No amendments or variations of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties' Authorized Representatives.
- Administrative Amendments. The Authorized Representatives may make non-material alterations, amendments, variations, modifications, or waivers to this Agreement without first obtaining authorization form their respective governing bodies. Any such modification or amendment shall not be effective until incorporated as a written amendment to this Agreement pursuant to section 7.1. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Parties may adjust the compensation rates provided for in Section 4.3.4 through a written addendum explicitly referencing this Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Modification of the maintenance obligations identified in the Exhibits to this Agreement made for the convenience of the Parties shall be considered a non-material amendment, provided that the Parties' Authorized Representatives determine that such modifications do not significantly impact the Party's approved budget for its obligations under this Agreement. Nothing in this Section 7.2 requires a Party to process an amendment administratively if, in the Party's sole discretion, the Party determines that a proposed amendment should be reviewed by its governing body.
- 7.3. Material Amendments. Any material changes to this Agreement, including but not limited to the addition or removal of any Greenway Improvement segments to or from Exhibit 1 or the modification of maintenance obligations that, in the view of an individual Party, significantly impact that Party's maintenance budget, including but not limited to costs of materials, equipment, and wages, shall require authorization and approval by the Parties' respective governing bodies. A Party may unilaterally choose to have its governing body approve an increase in compensation rates established in Section 4.3.4 of this Agreement. A decision by a Party to have its governing body approve one or more annual compensation rate increases shall not require the other Party to also request approval from its governing body.

ARTICLE 8 TERMINATION

- **8.1** With or Without Cause. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause, by either Party upon sixty (60) calendar days' written notice of intent to terminate.
- **8.2 Non-Appropriation of Funds.** Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, either Party may terminate this Agreement immediately in the event the Party determines that sufficient funds from City, County, State, or Federal sources are not appropriated at a level sufficient to allow for the performance of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9 AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES AND LIAISONS

Authorized Representatives. The following named persons are designated the Authorized Representatives of the parties for purposes of this Agreement. The Authorized Representative, or their successor, has authority to bind the Party they represent to the extent such authority has been granted by the Party's governing body. The parties shall promptly provide Notice to each other when an Authorized Representative's successor is appointed. All notice shall be provided to the following named persons and addresses unless otherwise stated in this Agreement:

9.2 <u>Liaisons</u>. To assist the parties in the day-to-day performance of this Agreement and to ensure compliance and provide ongoing consultation, a liaison shall be designated by the County and the City. ARTICLE 10 LIABILITY

Each Party to this Agreement shall be liable for the acts of their own officers, agents, volunteers, or employees and results thereof to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other Party, its officers, agents, volunteers, or employees. The parties mutually agree to indemnify and hold harmless each other from any claims, losses, costs,

expenses, or damages resulting from the acts or omissions of the respective offices, agents, or employees related to activities conducted by either Party under this Agreement. It is understood and agreed that the provisions of the Minn. Stat. § 471.59, the Municipal Tort Claims Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 466 and other applicable laws govern liability arising from the parties' acts or omissions. Each Party warrants that they are able to comply with this section through an insurance or self-insurance program and that each has minimum coverage consistent with the liability limits contained in Minn. Stat. Ch. 466. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to allow a claimant to obtain separate judgments or separate liability caps from the individual parties. The provisions of this Article 10 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11 GENERAL PROVISIONS

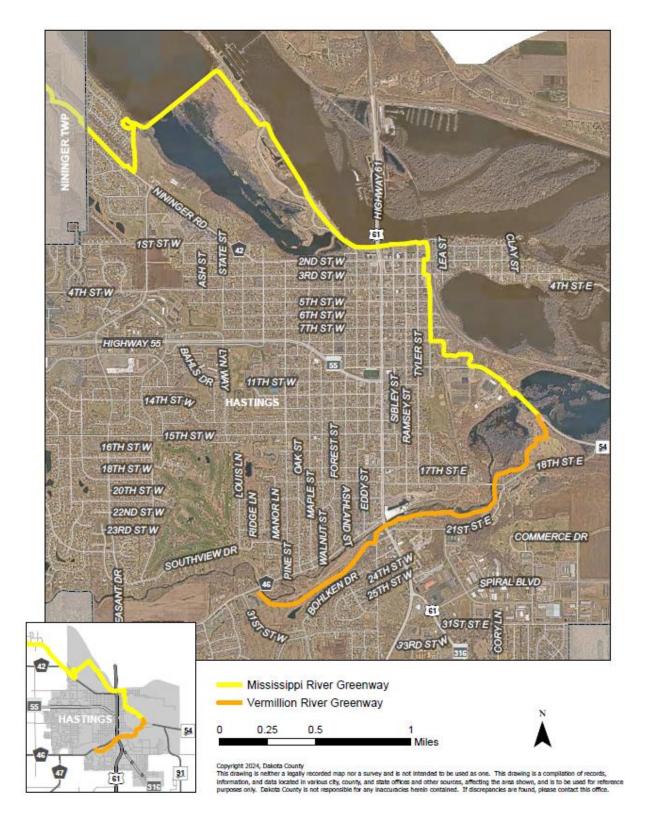
- **11.1** Conflict Resolution. The County and City will cooperate in the coordination of operations and maintenance of the Greenway Improvements, City Improvements, and any Additional Improvements. The City and County Authorized Representatives, or successors, will be responsible for resolving issues and conflicts. If the Authorized Representatives are unable to reconcile issues and conflicts the responsibility for resolution shall be forwarded to the County Manager and City Administrator.
- **11.2 No Joint Venture.** It is agreed that nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as creating the relationship of agents, partners, joint ventures, or associates between the parties or as constituting the County or the City as the employee of the other entity for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever.
- 11.3 <u>Data Practices</u>. The Parties agree that any information and data received from the other Party during the term of this Agreement shall be treated and maintained in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules and regulations governing same, including but not limited to the provisions of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13.
- **11.4** Notices. Any notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be delivered personally or sent by U.S. mail to the other Party's Authorized Representative. Mailed notice shall be deemed complete two business days after the date of mailing.
- 11.5 Audit. To the extent applicable as to any disbursement of public funds between the Parties for services provided under this Agreement, the Parties shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to costs incurred and services performed under this Agreement for a period of at least six (6) years after the termination of this Agreement. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, Subd. 5, each Party shall allow the other Party, the State Auditor, or their authorized representatives access to the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to the subject matter of the Agreement, for purposes of audit.
- **11.6** <u>Minnesota Law Governs</u>. The laws of Minnesota govern all matters related to this Agreement, without giving effect to the principles of conflict of law. Venue and jurisdiction for any litigation related to this Agreement must be in those courts located within the County of Dakota, State of Minnesota or U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota.

- **11.7 Survival.** The provisions of this Agreement which, by their terms, impose obligations that are continuing in nature and which must survive in order to give effect to their meaning will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- **11.8** Authority. The person or persons executing this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the City and the County represent that they are duly authorized to execute this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the respective Parties and represent and warrant that this Joint Powers Agreement is a legal, valid and binding obligation and is enforceable in accordance with its terms.
- **11.9 Severability.** In the event that any portion of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.
- **11.10** <u>Electronic Signatures</u>. Each Party agrees the electronic signatures of the Parties included in this Agreement are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as wet ink signatures.
- **11.11** <u>Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits</u>. The Recitals at the beginning of this Agreement and the Exhibits attached to this Agreement, including any addendum to an Exhibit, are each true and correct, and are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement.

The proposed Draft Maintenance Agreement is a new template that creates a standard city-wide maintenance agreement for Greenway segments and infrastructure, rather than multiple individual agreements for segments or separate projects. A primary goal is to create efficiencies for both the County and City. The proposed agreement will define maintenance responsibilities for the 2024 - 2025 County-led project P00146 which constructed 2.2 miles of new and reconstructed trail, including two new trail bridges over the North Creek and adjacent tributaries and wetlands in the cities of Lakeville and Farmington (Attachment: Project Location Map). Subsequent amendments to the agreement will be completed by adding or revising exhibits when new infrastructure is added, like future segments of the North Creek Greenway, Lake Marion Greenway, Vermillion River Greenway, Vermillion Highlands Greenway and Chub Creek Greenway, or if maintenance terms change.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends Dakota County execute a city-wide Maintenance Agreement with the City of Farmington for Greenway and trail segments within the city boundaries of Farmington for the North Creek Greenway that require maintenance and reimbursement responsibilities.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The City of Farmington will perform routine maintenance of the Greenway Regional trail, with the County responsible for deferred maintenance or replacement of Greenway Regional trail infrastructure. The County reimburses cities with funds from the Facilities Department operating budget, which is funded by Levy, General Fund and CPA funding sources. 2025 estimates include

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF DAKOTA AND THE CITY OF FARMINGTON FOR MAINTENANCE OF GREENWAYS. TRAILS AND ASSOCIATED IMPROVEMENTS

This Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") is between the County of Dakota, by and through Dakota County Parks ("County") and the City of Farmington ("City"). This Agreement uses the word "Parties" for both the County and the City.

WHEREAS, the County and City are governmental units as that term is defined in Minn. Stat. § 471.59.

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 471.59 authorizes local governmental units to jointly or cooperatively exercise any power common to the contracting parties.

WHEREAS, the Parties have cooperated and intend to continue to cooperate in the construction of various Greenway and other regional and local trail segments and associated improvements within the City.

WHEREAS, the City and County recognize that it may be efficient and cost-effective to share resources and cooperate in maintaining certain Greenway and trail segments and their associated improvements.

WHEREAS, the City and the County further recognize that it will be efficient to have a single master maintenance agreement for all Greenway and trail segments within the City, and to provide for that agreement to be modified over time as improvements are added or removed and as cooperative opportunities and maintenance efficiencies may change.

WHEREAS, the City and the County therefore desire to enter into this Agreement for the purpose of identifying cooperative maintenance opportunities and the responsibilities of the Parties for maintaining various regional and local improvements within the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to set out the respective duties and responsibilities of the County and the City for the maintenance of Greenways and other regional and local trail segments located within the City and their associated improvements, as more fully described herein.

ARTICLE 2 TERM

This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of the signatures of the Parties (the "Effective Date") and shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein, or until termination is required by operation of law or by decision of a court of competent jurisdiction.

ARTICLE 3 MAINTENANCE

- 4.1 County Maintenance Obligations. Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the County will be responsible for the routine maintenance, repair and replacement of the County's trail improvements located within the Greenway segment(s) shown on the attached Exhibit 1 (the "Greenway Improvements"), at no cost to the City. The County's maintenance obligations shall be limited to those Greenway Improvements constructed within areas for which the County has an easement or other right to use and maintain property for the Greenway Improvements, including through this Agreement, as determined by the County. The County will maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements according to the County's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the County in its sole discretion.
- **4.2** <u>City Maintenance Obligations.</u> Unless otherwise specified in this Agreement, including within any Exhibit to this Agreement, the City will be responsible for all routine maintenance, repair and replacement of any City-owned trail improvements connected to the Greenway Improvements (the "City Improvements"), at no cost to the County. The City will maintain the City Improvements according to the City's then-existing maintenance service standards, subject to available funding, and according to a schedule to be determined by the City in its sole discretion.

4.3 Cooperative Maintenance Responsibilities, Payment.

- 4.3.1 <u>City Greenway Maintenance</u>. The City will be responsible for routine maintenance for those Greenway Improvement segments shown on Exhibit 2 and any addendum to Exhibit 2 (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 2"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual Greenway segments shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 2. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 2, the City shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair or replacement of the Greenway Improvements but may notify the County if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.2 County Local Improvement Maintenance. The County will be responsible for all routine maintenance for those segments of any City Improvements shown on Exhibit 3 and any addendum to Exhibit 3, if any (collectively referred to herein as "Exhibit 3"). The specific tasks required for routine maintenance relating to individual City Improvements shall be identified on the applicable portion of Exhibit 3. Unless otherwise specified on Exhibit 3, the County shall not be responsible for any maintenance, repair and replacement of the City Improvements but may notify the City if repairs may be necessary.
- 4.3.3 Payment for Cooperative Maintenance. A Party assuming a maintenance obligation under this Agreement shall be compensated according to the amounts, if any, identified on the applicable Exhibit. By way of example, the Exhibits may identify a per mile charge for certain tasks (such as snow removal, cleaning, mowing) and/or a per unit or flat charge for certain asks (such as emptying trash receptacles), or any other appropriate compensation method agreeable to the Parties. In addition, the Parties may provide on the Exhibits that no compensation is appropriate if the Parties agree that their shared maintenance obligations for each other's improvements are roughly equal.

- 4.3.4 Adjustments for Cooperative Maintenance Payments. The City and the County will meet prior to June 1 each year as provided in Article 6 of this Agreement, to evaluate and establish the compensation rates that will be applicable to their respective maintenance obligations for the following calendar year, and the compensation rates may be modified by agreement of the Parties. Following the annual meeting, a Party proposing an increase in compensation rates shall provide written notice of such increase to the other Party's Authorized Representative. The Authorized Representative will respond in writing within 60 days and may request additional information or may, in its discretion, accept or reject the proposed rate increase. If the rate increase is accepted, the Parties shall memorialize a modification to the applicable Exhibit by amendment or by separate addendum referencing this Agreement. If the proposed compensation rate increase is rejected or if the proposed increase has not been accepted or rejected in writing within 60 days from the date the written proposal was submitted, the proposing Party may terminate this Agreement as set forth in Section 8.1.
- **New Improvements.** The Parties will coordinate on the installation of new Greenway improvements and new City improvements that may be connected to current or future Greenway improvements (the "Additional Improvements"). The Parties may include Additional Improvements within the cooperative maintenance responsibilities identified in this Agreement through a written amendment to the Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Any such amendment shall be considered a material amendment under Section 7.3 of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 5 ACCESS AND USE RIGHTS

- 5.1 <u>City Access to Greenway Easements</u>. The City may reasonably access the Greenway Improvements for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes related to routine work relating to the City Improvements. The City will contact the County prior to beginning any work that requires Greenway closure, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the County or the public's use of the Greenway Improvements. The City may be required to obtain a special use permit from the County for such extended access
- **County Access to City Right-of-Way and Property.** The County may reasonably access City right-of-way and other City-owned property for purposes of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and for other purposes in connection with routine work relating to improvements owned by the County and connected to City Improvements. The County will contact the City prior to beginning any work that requires any closure of City right-of-way, or the use of equipment that interrupts or interferes with the City's or the public's use of City right-of-way or other property. The County may be required to obtain a special use permit from the City for such extended access.
- **Perpetual License for Greenway Improvements.** The City grants a perpetual license for the County and its employees, agents and contractors to install, maintain, repair and replace the Greenway Improvements for those Greenway segments shown on Exhibit 1 that are located on City property or within City right-of-way. The perpetual license shall survive expiration or termination of this Agreement. The perpetual license shall be subject to the City's right to require relocation of the Greenway Improvements pursuant to applicable law. The City's right to require relocation shall also survive expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Permanent Easements for Greenway Improvements. At the County's request, and limited to City-owned property, the City will replace the license provided for in section 5.3 with permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements shown on Exhibit 1. The City will execute documents reasonably necessary to convey permanent easements for the Greenway Improvements. The County will provide all surveying and other documentation and information necessary for the City to grant the requested permanent easements.

ARTICLE 6 ANNUAL REVIEW

The parties shall confer annually to review the parties' respective maintenance obligations and to discuss any issues the parties may have relating to this Agreement. The annual meeting shall occur on or before June 1 of each year, unless a later date is agreeable to both parties for their convenience.

ARTICLE 7 AMENDMENTS

- **7.1** <u>Amendments.</u> No amendments or variations of the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties' Authorized Representatives.
- Administrative Amendments. The Authorized Representatives may make non-material alterations, amendments, variations, modifications, or waivers to this Agreement without first obtaining authorization form their respective governing bodies. Any such modification or amendment shall not be effective until incorporated as a written amendment to this Agreement pursuant to section 7.1. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Parties may adjust the compensation rates provided for in Section 4.3.4 through a written addendum explicitly referencing this Agreement and the applicable Exhibit(s). Modification of the maintenance obligations identified in the Exhibits to this Agreement made for the convenience of the Parties shall be considered a non-material amendment, provided that the Parties' Authorized Representatives determine that such modifications do not significantly impact the Party's approved budget for its obligations under this Agreement. Nothing in this Section 7.2 requires a Party to process an amendment administratively if, in the Party's sole discretion, the Party determines that a proposed amendment should be reviewed by its governing body.
- 7.3. Material Amendments. Any material changes to this Agreement, including but not limited to the addition or removal of any Greenway Improvement segments to or from Exhibit 1 or the modification of maintenance obligations that, in the view of an individual Party, significantly impact that Party's maintenance budget, including but not limited to costs of materials, equipment, and wages, shall require authorization and approval by the Parties' respective governing bodies. A Party may unilaterally choose to have its governing body approve an increase in compensation rates established in Section 4.3.4 of this Agreement. A decision by a Party to have its governing body approve one or more annual compensation rate increases shall not require the other Party to also request approval from its governing body.

ARTICLE 8 TERMINATION

- **8.1** With or Without Cause. This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause, by either Party upon sixty (60) calendar days' written notice of intent to terminate.
- **8.2 Non-Appropriation of Funds.** Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, either Party may terminate this Agreement immediately in the event the Party determines that sufficient funds from City, County, State, or Federal sources are not appropriated at a level sufficient to allow for the performance of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9 AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES AND LIAISONS

Authorized Representatives. The following named persons are designated the Authorized Representatives of the parties for purposes of this Agreement. The Authorized Representative, or their successor, has authority to bind the Party they represent to the extent such authority has been granted by the Party's governing body. The parties shall promptly provide Notice to each other when an Authorized Representative's successor is appointed. All notice shall be provided to the following named persons and addresses unless otherwise stated in this Agreement:

9.2 <u>Liaisons</u>. To assist the parties in the day-to-day performance of this Agreement and to ensure compliance and provide ongoing consultation, a liaison shall be designated by the County and the City. The parties shall promptly provide Notice to each other when a Liaison's successor is appointed. At the time of execution of this Agreement, the following persons are the designated liaisons:

ARTICLE 10 LIABILITY

Each Party to this Agreement shall be liable for the acts of their own officers, agents, volunteers, or employees and results thereof to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other Party, its officers, agents, volunteers, or employees. The parties mutually agree to indemnify and hold harmless each other from any claims, losses, costs,

expenses, or damages resulting from the acts or omissions of the respective offices, agents, or employees related to activities conducted by either Party under this Agreement. It is understood and agreed that the provisions of the Minn. Stat. § 471.59, the Municipal Tort Claims Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 466 and other applicable laws govern liability arising from the parties' acts or omissions. Each Party warrants that they are able to comply with this section through an insurance or self-insurance program and that each has minimum coverage consistent with the liability limits contained in Minn. Stat. Ch. 466. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to allow a claimant to obtain separate judgments or separate liability caps from the individual parties. The provisions of this Article 10 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11 GENERAL PROVISIONS

- **11.1** Conflict Resolution. The County and City will cooperate in the coordination of operations and maintenance of the Greenway Improvements, City Improvements, and any Additional Improvements. The City and County Authorized Representatives, or successors, will be responsible for resolving issues and conflicts. If the Authorized Representatives are unable to reconcile issues and conflicts the responsibility for resolution shall be forwarded to the County Manager and City Administrator.
- **11.2 No Joint Venture.** It is agreed that nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as creating the relationship of agents, partners, joint ventures, or associates between the parties or as constituting the County or the City as the employee of the other entity for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever.
- **11.3 Data Practices.** The Parties agree that any information and data received from the other Party during the term of this Agreement shall be treated and maintained in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules and regulations governing same, including but not limited to the provisions of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13.
- **11.4** Notices. Any notices required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be delivered personally or sent by U.S. mail to the other Party's Authorized Representative. Mailed notice shall be deemed complete two business days after the date of mailing.
- 11.5 Audit. To the extent applicable as to any disbursement of public funds between the Parties for services provided under this Agreement, the Parties shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to costs incurred and services performed under this Agreement for a period of at least six (6) years after the termination of this Agreement. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, Subd. 5, each Party shall allow the other Party, the State Auditor, or their authorized representatives access to the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to the subject matter of the Agreement, for purposes of audit.
- **11.6** <u>Minnesota Law Governs</u>. The laws of Minnesota govern all matters related to this Agreement, without giving effect to the principles of conflict of law. Venue and jurisdiction for any litigation related to this Agreement must be in those courts located within the County of Dakota, State of Minnesota or U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota.

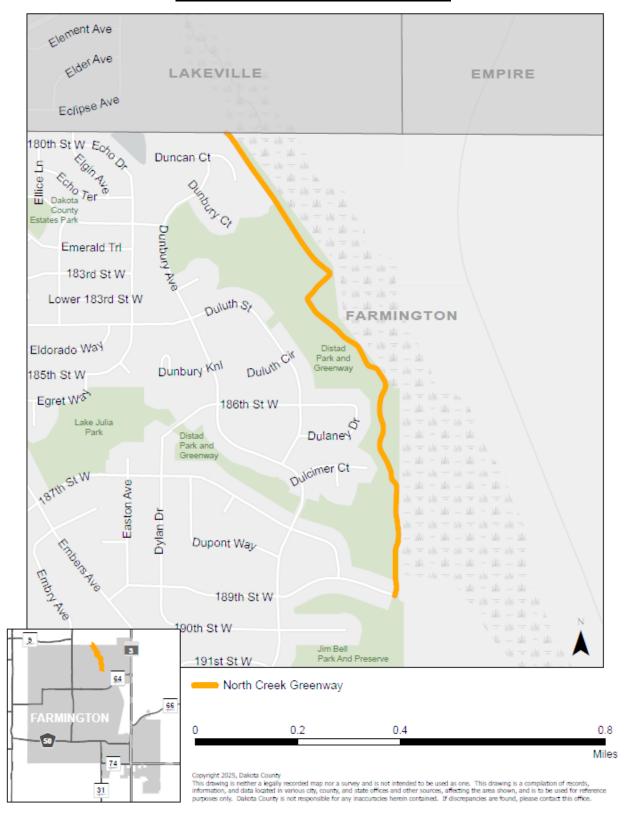
- **11.7 Survival.** The provisions of this Agreement which, by their terms, impose obligations that are continuing in nature and which must survive in order to give effect to their meaning will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- **11.8** Authority. The person or persons executing this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the City and the County represent that they are duly authorized to execute this Joint Powers Agreement on behalf of the respective Parties and represent and warrant that this Joint Powers Agreement is a legal, valid and binding obligation and is enforceable in accordance with its terms.
- **11.9 Severability.** In the event that any portion of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.
- **11.10** <u>Electronic Signatures</u>. Each Party agrees the electronic signatures of the Parties included in this Agreement are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as wet ink signatures.
- **11.11** <u>Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits</u>. The Recitals at the beginning of this Agreement and the Exhibits attached to this Agreement, including any addendum to an Exhibit, are each true and correct, and are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement.

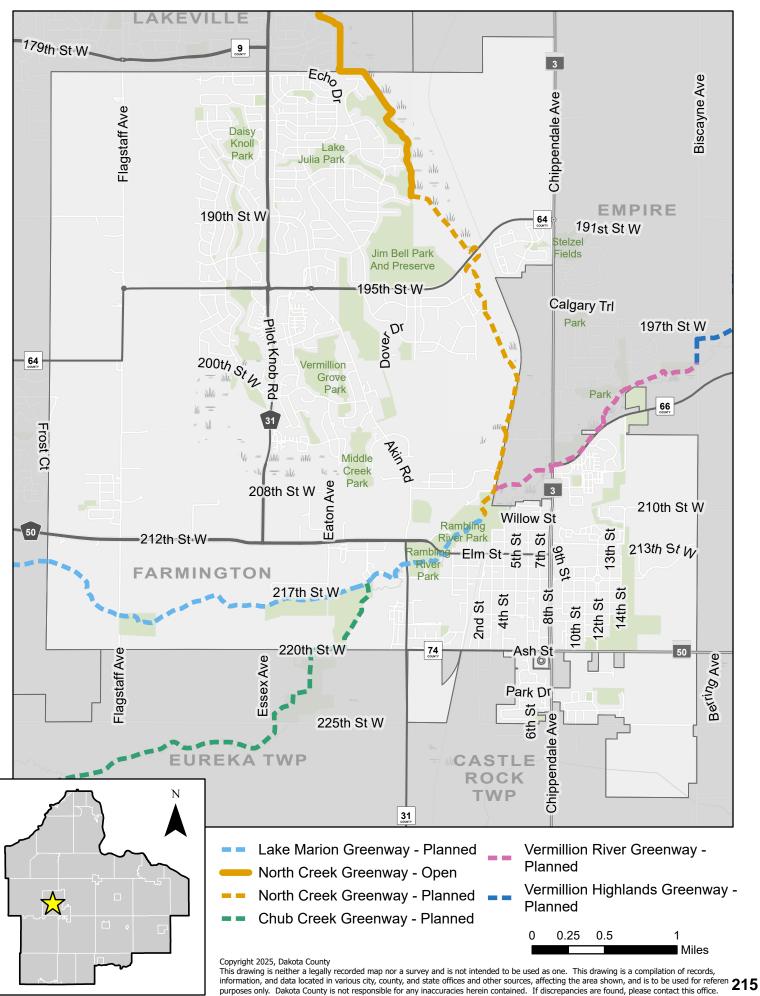

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

- Authorize execution of a new consultant contract with SRF Consulting Group, Inc. in the amount of \$186,902 for final design services related to pedestrian and bicyclist safety improvements on County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 56 and multi-use trail construction on CSAH 28, as part of County Projects (CP) 56-14 and 28-69 in Inver Grove Heights. The previous contract (Contract #C0035774) expired on December 31, 2024.
- Authorize an amendment to the 2025 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget for the construction of County Projects (CP) 56-14 and 28-69 in Inver Grove Heights.

SUMMARY

Dakota County is advancing two coordinated projects to support a safe and efficient multimodal transportation system. County Project 56-14 focuses on pedestrian and bicyclist safety improvements along CSAH 56 from Chestnut Street in South St. Paul to Coffman Path in Inver Grove Heights, including intersection upgrades, enhanced pedestrian crossings, and accessibility improvements. County Project 28-69 addresses a critical trail gap by constructing a multi-use trail and making associated crossing improvements along CSAH 28, from 500 feet east of Cahill Avenue to CSAH 56, thereby strengthening the County's trail network connectivity (See Attachment: Project Location Maps)

Additional Contract Request

By Resolution No. 22-354 (August 23, 2022), By Resolution No. 23-149 (April 11, 2023), and By Resolution No. 23-485 (October 24, 2024), the County Board authorized the execution of a contract and subsequent amendments with SRF Consulting Group, Inc., for design services related to CP 56-14 and CP 28-69. The original contract scope included public engagement, evaluation of pedestrian and bicyclist safety improvements along the corridor, and final design of basic crossing enhancements.

Amendment 1 expanded the scope based on preliminary engineering findings that identified additional safety improvements well-suited to the corridor. These elements were innovative within the Dakota County Transportation system and required additional coordination and iterations for staff approval. It also included roadway improvements not originally scoped, such as turn lane removals,

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which necessitated further preliminary and final engineering.

Amendment 2 was initiated following the award of a \$2,300,000 RAISE grant and \$500,000 in Active Transportation funding. These funds enabled Dakota County to pursue the full scope of improvements identified in the preliminary engineering for CP 56-14 and to construct the trail gap on CSAH 28 from 500 feet east of Cahill Avenue to CSAH 56 (CP 28-69).

The current contract request includes work that was not part of previous agreements due to the expiration of the prior contract, increased coordination needs stemming from County staff turnover. and expanded communication requirements with the City of Inver Grove Heights. To address these factors, the contract scope now includes tasks necessary to complete the final design and prepare the project bid package.

Out-of-Scope and Additional Work Included in the Contract Request

Task 1. Project Management - \$14,555

Additional coordination and contract administration for new design elements and modification of

Task 2. Public Engagement - \$4,988

One additional public open house to communicate recent project updates and construction schedules.

- Task 9. Plans, Specifications, and Estimates \$98,923
 - Evaluation of additional pedestrian crossings and roadway geometry were completed based on feedback from the second open house.
 - Plan changes were requested at three locations along the corridor:
 - 66th Street: Modifications to address queueing during train events.
 - North and South Dickman Trail intersections: Design revisions to accommodate heavy vehicle circulation.
- Task 12. 80th Street Trail \$21,090
 - Development of a tree-clearing/removal plan set to meet environmental permitting deadlines.
 - Evaluation of retaining wall alternatives and enhanced intersection crossings
- Task 13. Greenway Crossing Improvements \$9,420

Additional design for the greenway crossing on Nininger Road, added as part of the RAISE grantfunded improvements. This includes roadway paving and drainage modifications necessary to support the crossing

- Task 14. Construction Administration (Fixed Budget as Authorized) -\$20,000 an additional \$20,000 and representative hours for construction coordination activities, approval of shop drawings, preparation of change orders, supplemental instructions, and review of reports if such work is authorized by the county
- Task 15 Recent Plan Modification and Updates-\$6,000
- Permit Fees \$400
- **Previous Contract Unused Funds \$11,526**

Contract Value and Funding Summary

To complete the final design and prepare the project for construction, a new contract with SRF Consulting Group, Inc. is required. The total value of the new contract request is \$186,902. This includes \$11,526 of funds from the previous contract and \$175,376 for new services.

The total engineering cost for the project, including the new contract, will be \$781,896.

In accordance with the County's 2040 Transportation Plan cost participation policy, Dakota County will be responsible for 85 percent of the contract request for CP 28-69 multi-use trail construction and 100 percent of the cost-share for CP 56-14 pedestrian and bicycle improvements.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approving a new \$186,902 contract with SRF Consulting Group, Inc. to complete final design work for pedestrian and trail improvements on CSAH 56 and CSAH 28 in Inver Grove Heights. The contract replaces an expired agreement and covers added scope due to staff turnover, public feedback, and grant-funded enhancements.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The 2025 Transportation CIP adopted budget includes \$2,893,066 for CP 56-14 and \$1,459,986 for CP 28-69, carried over from previous years, for a combined total of \$4,352,652. However, these funds are primarily federal and state grant funds intended for construction costs and are not eligible to fund design costs. Therefore, a budget amendment is needed for the new contract scope of \$175,376 . Project 56-14 needs an additional \$80,145 coming from Transportation Sales and Use Tax and Project 28-69 needs an additional \$95,231 funded with a combination of Wheelage Tax and revenue from the City.

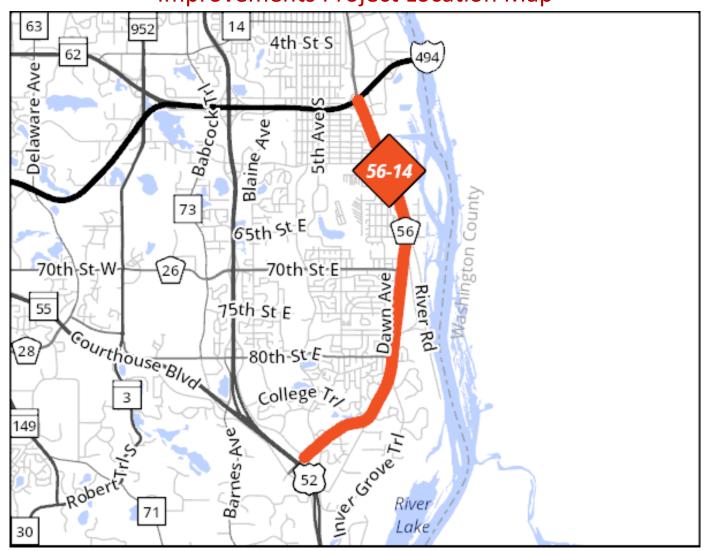

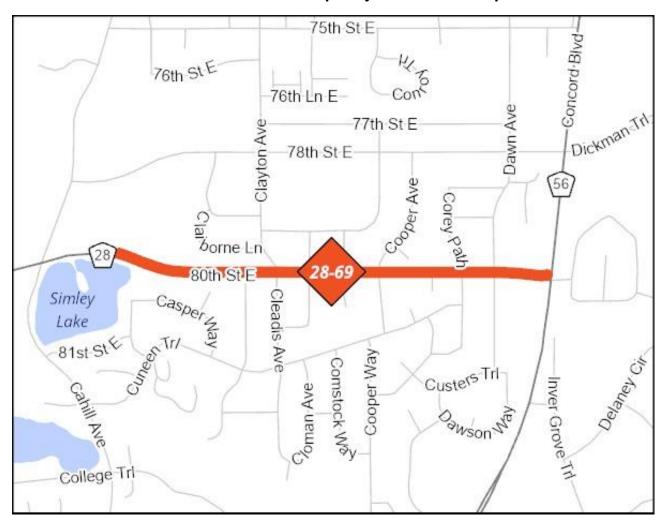

Dear Keelee Roggenbuck:

This contract request is respectfully requested for the Professional Services by and between Dakota County and SRF Consulting Group, Inc. This contract request is for continuing services for a previous contract that was entered on September 6, 2022 and expired December 31, 2024. The expired contract still contains \$11,525.71 of funds that are needed to complete the professional services for the project.

Additional Services

SRF Consulting Group has valued the opportunity to collaborate with Dakota County in developing concepts and design plans for this innovative pedestrian and greenway crossing enhancement project. The additional work encompasses five key tasks: project management, public involvement, and additional design work for the Concord Boulevard pedestrian crossings, 80th Street trail, and other Mississippi River Greenway crossing improvements.

The requested contract will cover the efforts made toward achieving the final 100% plans, as well as the additional work beyond the original scope outlined in the initial proposal, Amendment #1, and Amendment #2. The following provides the context and justification for additional design services under a new contract.

The contract extension in Amendment #2 moved the project deadline to December 31, 2025, with the goal of completing 100% plans and the project letting in the fall of 2025.

Additional Work Summary

Below is a summary of the services not included in our original scope, Amendment #1 or Amendment #2.

<u>Task 1 – Project Management</u>: The additional work has primarily involved increased coordination and meetings since the 90% plan submittal and last open house. This includes additional meetings with County staff (including a new county Project Manager), expanded contract administration, coordination on several new design elements, and efforts to potentially modify the current plan set.

<u>Task 2 – Public Involvement</u>: This work involves a planned Open House that goes beyond the original and previously amended scope. The purpose of this additional Open House is to present and discuss the final improvements and the construction schedule, if requested.

<u>Task 9 – PS&E</u>: This work involves adding enhanced crossings at 15 intersections along Concord Boulevard. However, three items were not included in the original and previously amended scope. **Concord Lane Conversion Design (Cahill to Corcoran):** Based on feedback from the open house and discussions with County staff, it was directed by county staff to develop a re-striping and signing plan to reduce the number of lanes in this roadway section. The additional work included concept drawings, coordination meetings, and the final plans to implement this change. Ultimately, due to sight line concerns caused by curvature in the road, the changes were not included in the final plans.

Concord Mid-Block Crossing (between Concord Ct and Cooper): While the original scope covered 15 intersections, it did not include a mid-block crossing. Following feedback from the open house, a mid-block crossing treatment was requested by county staff. This was added to the project at the 90% design stage and required additional design work, plans, and updates to the cost estimate.

Three Intersection revisions at 90% Plans: The intersections at 66th Street, 68th/Dickman, and 78th/Dickman underwent substantial design and redesign in the early stages of the project. Although a preferred alternative was selected and proceeded through design for the past 18 months with no major changes anticipated, at the 90% design stage it was requested by county staff that the overall design of these intersections be revisited. This additional work involved developing several alternative concepts and truck turning movements in response to city and county comments and additional coordination/concept updates along the way. Additional out of scope time was required to override the active base files with new geometry, revised removals, and updated storm design. Each intersection has alignments and profiles along curblines and proposed trail centerlines which were used to develop plan sheet elements including curb ramp points, slope labels, and intersection details. While minor revisions are typically anticipated between 90% and 100% submittals, the nature

of the requested changes by county staff at these intersections required substantial redesign of each intersection and rebuilding new alignments, profiles, and corresponding points and storm sewer.

Major revisions that impact curblines at 90% design leads to a greater number of revisions that ripple across all plan sheets within the entire plan set. This impacts overall plan sheet organization to ensure all plan sheets and tabulations, as well as the cost estimate are accurately completed.

 $\underline{\text{Task } 12 - 80^{\text{th}} \text{ Street Trail}}$: This work task involves adding a trail on the north side of the roadway. However, three key items were not included in the original and previously amended scope.

Tree Removal Plan and Specifications: Although tree removal would typically be covered in the removal section of the plan, the requirement to remove the trees during winter necessitated the development of separate tree removal plans, specifications, and bidding process. This led to modifications to the existing plan set and the creation of this additional plan set.

Retaining Wall: The project includes a large retaining wall at the far west side of the corridor, for which we were scoped to develop one (1) design alternative, specification, and estimate as scoped in Amendment #2. However, a more extensive and unplanned alternatives development and analysis process was requested by county staff. This involved developing, evaluating, coordinating, and estimating the cost of three (3) retaining wall concept designs, per the County's request to 1) reduce trail boulevard, 2) reconstruct the curbline closer to the travel lane as options to minimize right-of-way impacts and reduce the wall height, and 3) county standard 10' trail and 6' boulevard with required retaining wall to accommodate. Additional coordination and refinement with city and county staff selected a wall alternative which spans approximately 1,000 feet (option #3).

Enhanced Intersection Crossings: While the scope of Amendment #2 included a trail on the north side of the roadway and curb ramp upgrades only, it did not account for enhanced intersection crossings as requested by county staff – curb extensions and pedestrian refuge medians – at Cleadis, Cooper, and Dana Path. County staff requested modifications to all quadrants of Cleadis and Cooper (curb extensions) and a pedestrian refuge median at Dana Path. This additional design and plan preparation was not anticipated and led utility impacts and additional alignments, profiles, and three-dimensional design relative to curb ramp design only.

<u>Task 13 – Greenway Crossing Improvements (5)</u>: This task outlined in Amendment #2 involves improving five greenway crossings. However, the crossing at 125th Street/Nininger Road required more extensive design and improvements than what was scoped in Amendment #2. Due to the gravel roadway and existing drainage issues, the preferred solution selected by county staff involved paving approximately 800 feet of township roadway and implementing drainage enhancements. Extra effort included roadway alignment and profile, roadway typical section, ditch alignment and profile, culvert design, and additional plan sheet effort for removals, turf establishment, and utility coordination.

Task 15 Final Plan Modifications and Updates

These design and plan modifications were necessary to ensure the plans are ready for bidding with the proposed funding.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the execution of a joint powers agreement (JPA) with the City of Saint Paul Board of Water Commissioners to establish roles, responsibilities, and cost share for the incorporation of City utility improvements as part of the County's 2026 preservation activity occurring on County State Aid Highway 73 in the city of West St. Paul from 980' north of County State Aid Highway 14 to County State Aid Highway 8, County Project (CP) 73-044, and from County Road 4 to Annapolis Street East, County Project (CP) 73-045 (Attachment: Location Map).

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County is proceeding with the 2026 preservation of paved highway surface and miscellaneous projects. The 2026 preservation work includes pavement mill and overlay of County roadways, replacement of pedestrian curb ramps at intersections to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, application of pavement markings, and necessary repairs to city utilities. As seen in the Location Map attachment, CP 73-044 is on County State Aid Highway 73 from 980' north of County State Aid Highway 14 to County State Aid Highway 8, and CP 73-045 is on County State 73 from County Road 4 to Annapolis Street East.

As part of the County's preservation process, coordination occurs with the city partners to determine if any utility improvements are necessary on the segments of roadways being improved that would be advantageous to include with the preservation work. Incorporating these improvements saves the stakeholders time and money and reduces the burden on the traveling public as the traffic impacts are consolidated into one project versus multiple. These improvements often include repairs to the storm sewer, sanitary sewer, or water main facilities.

Coordination with the City of West St. Paul and Saint Paul Regional Water Services resulted in their desire to include utility improvements with the bid package for CP 73-044 and CP 73-045. In order to facilitate these improvements with the County's 2026 preservation activity, a JPA is necessary to establish the roles, responsibilities, and cost share for the work. According to the Dakota County 2040 Transportation Plan, the County will pay for required adjustments to city water systems at the surface due to the county highway pavement surface work. Saint Paul Regional Water Services is responsible for 100 percent of the costs associated with any water systems work beyond what is needed for the County to do the pavement preservation work. The governing body of Saint Paul

Regional Water Services is the City of Saint Paul Board of Water Commissioners.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends authorization to execute a JPA with the City of Saint Paul Board of Water Commissioners to formalize cost contributions and responsibilities for CP 73-044 and CP 73-045.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The Draft 2026-2030 Transportation Capital Improvement Program Budget includes \$9,020,000 for Paved Highway Surface preservation activity. Costs associated with the utility work will be split between the County and City of Saint Paul in accordance with the Cost Share Policy. The County will pay for surface adjustments of utilities only where needed for the pavement preservation work. The City will pay 100% for all additional replacements or repairs to the water systems. Funds will not be expended until fiscal year 2026, after the 2026-2030 Transportation Capital Improvement Program is adopted by County Board.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize execution of a contract with Bolton and Menk, Inc., (BMI) for preliminary and final design consulting services for a roundabout at County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 32 and Interstate 35 West (I-35W) East Frontage Road in Burnsville, County Project (CP) 32-113. Execute a joint powers agreement (JPA) with the City of Burnsville to establish cost share and project responsibilities.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County and the City of Burnsville are proceeding with CP 32-113, consistent with the adopted Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and project development needs at the intersection of CSAH 32 and I-35W East Frontage Road in Burnsville.

County Project 32-113 will address roadway safety and mobility needs at the intersection of CSAH 32 and the I-35W East Frontage Road. The project will also address roadway design and pedestrian/bicyclist needs approximately 1,000 feet along CSAH 32 from I-35W to the Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) crossing and approximately 800 feet along the I-35W East Frontage Road from CSAH 32 to the northern terminus just past 121st Street (Attachment: Project Location Map).

The project will replace the existing T-intersection with a roundabout at CSAH 32 (Cliff Road) and the I-35W East Frontage Road. It also includes pedestrian/bicyclist alternatives to improve connectivity with the Black Dog Trail. Planned improvements will address traffic safety and operations, close trail gaps, and improve connectivity between CSAH 32, the I-35W interchange, and adjacent land uses. Consultant services will include public engagement, environmental review/permits, traffic analysis, preliminary design, required technical reports, utility coordination, and final design (roadway, roundabout, and multi-use trails).

The project is currently planned for construction to bid in late 2027 and will require a contract for substantial planning and engineering work to meet current schedule goals.

A joint powers agreement (JPA) with the City of Burnsville is necessary to establish responsibilities and costs following the County's current adopted policy. Dakota County is the lead agency.

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Scope of Work and Issues to be Addressed. The scope of work for CP 32-113 includes public and agency coordination, traffic analysis, survey and data collection, pedestrian and bicyclist needs analysis, preliminary design alternatives for a roundabout and trail connection, stormwater systems design, utility coordination, right of way mapping, final engineering design, and environmental documentation approvals.

Consultant Selection. The Dakota County Transportation Department issued a Request for Proposal for comprehensive transportation project design services. Five proposals were received and evaluated by staff representing the County and the City of Burnsville. BMI was selected as the preferred professional engineering consultant based on the following criteria: project understanding, project approach, public involvement, project team expertise, quality control, performance on similar projects, and best-value cost. The proposal from BMI provided the most complete response to the services needed.

The review team selected BMI based on the detailed work plan provided in the firm's proposal, which presented a strong understanding of the project's key issues to be addressed and provided an integrated approach to delivering all tasks by a qualified team. The recommended proposal emphasized approaches to address the need for early coordination with stakeholders, combined with a thorough understanding of the constraints and required approval processes. The BMI proposal provided the best balancing of the tasks to be completed with the project-area issues and stakeholders to be addressed. The project issues will include coordination with the Minnesota Department of Transportation, Union Pacific Railroad, the City of Burnsville, and other agency representatives and stakeholders to confirm project support and approvals. The BMI proposal also most effectively addressed how project requirements can be anticipated and completed within the accelerated schedule.

A Consultant Evaluation Summary detailing the proposal process, review team, evaluation criteria, and results, and best-value cost evaluation is included (Attachment: Consultant Evaluation Summary).

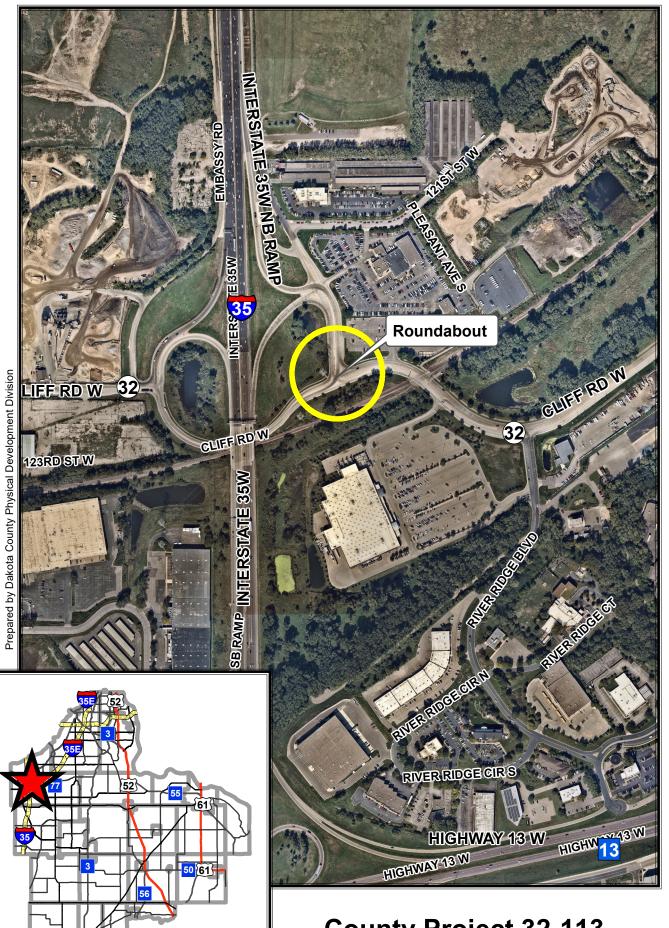

Summary of Consultant Proposal Evaluations and Selection Recommendation

County Project 32-113:

Consultant Services Description:

Dakota County, in partnership with the City of Burnsville, issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to qualified consultants to provide preliminary and final design engineering services to replace the existing T-intersection with a roundabout at County State Aid Highway 32 (CSAH 32 or Cliff Road) and Interstate 35 West (I-35W) East Frontage Road. It also includes pedestrian/bicyclist alternatives to improve connectivity with the Black Dog Trail.

The RFP was released on September 8, 2025, to five consultant firms: Bolton & Menk, CBS Squared, HDR, SRF, and WSB. These firms were invited to submit proposals based on their demonstrated expertise with roundabout design and successful coordination with public agencies. All five firms submitted proposals by the September 29, 2025, deadline.

Scope of Consultant Services:

Planned improvements will enhance traffic safety and operations, close existing trail gaps, and improve connectivity between CSAH 32, the I-35W interchange, and surrounding land uses. The proposed roundabout will be similar in design and functionality of the recently completed roundabout located on the west side of I-35W at the same interchange.

Key design constraints include:

- Avoiding relocation of high-voltage overhead powerlines and towers located on both the north and south sides of the existing intersection.
- Minimizing involvement with Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) by avoiding encroachment on UPRR
 right-of-way and modifications to the existing crossing, thereby reducing the risk of delays and
 additional costs.
- Maintaining uninterrupted access and traffic flow along the only roadway serving nearby businesses and the I-35W northbound interchange ramps.

Deliverables:

At completion of the contract, the consultant will have delivered complete plans, specifications, and estimates to bid the project for construction. Deliverables include technical reports and design layouts necessary to establish the final preferred design (roadway, roundabout, and multi-use trails) and project approvals as follows:

- project management and agency coordination,
- public engagement,
- survey and environmental data,
- traffic analysis,
- preliminary layouts addressing project limits, alternatives, approximate costs/impacts,
- preliminary and approved final environmental documentation,
- approved final geometric layout for the recommended roundabout alternative,
- geotechnical soils evaluation and pavement design,
- stormwater management and hydraulics design,
- Interchange Access Modification Request process and documentation (if needed),
- utility identification and coordination,
- railroad coordination,
- right-of-way mapping and parcel data,

- traffic management planning that addressing staging, detours, and roadway closures during construction,
- other supporting data and documents.

Public and Agency Engagement:

Public outreach and coordination work with agencies will include up to three rounds of open house style public information meetings to solicit input and share project updates. The selected consultant will coordinate with Dakota County to conduct up to five small-group meeting with property owners and stakeholders directly affected by the project. Dakota County staff, in collaboration with the selected consultant will work closely with the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT), the City of Burnsville, and property owners within the project area to ensure transparent communication and meaningful stakeholder engagement throughout the project.

Schedule and Funding:

The design contract schedule is planned to be underway from November 2025 through July 2027 (20 months). Construction is currently planned for late 2027 or early 2028 therefore a contract for preliminary and final design engineering is needed to meet the current schedule and funding requirements.

In 2023, Met Council awarded Dakota County \$1,901,760 of Regional Solicitation Funds (federal funding) to support project construction. Dakota County's 2025 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) includes budget of \$300,000 for design activities and \$500,000 for right of way activities.

Review Team and Proposal Evaluation Process:

The five proposals were reviewed by staff representing Dakota County, and the City of Burnsville, including staff representing expertise in traffic engineering, roadway design, and environmental review and approval processes. Proposals were reviewed and ranked independently by review team members. The review team members met on October 2, 2025, to discuss the proposals, share information regarding individual member evaluations, and reach consensus on a recommended consultant.

The proposals were evaluated and ranked based on the following 7 criteria:

- 1. Project Understanding and Approach (20%): Based on conceptual and technical understanding of the required scope/deliverables and the consultant's general approach.
- 2. Scope of Work, Deliverables, and Schedule (30%): Based on detailed approach and organization of the work to be completed, scheduling of the work, and approach to managing resources to successfully complete all tasks.
- 3. Public and Agency Involvement (10%): Approach to engaging the public and coordinating with agencies on its ability to facilitate acceptance of the preferred design alternative and secure necessary approvals within the project timeline.
- 4. Project Team and Key Staff (15%): Based on the project management team, technical specialists, roles/organization, and qualifications based on similar experience.
- Quality Control (10%): Demonstration of a proactive approach to risk identification and management, with strategies to ensure high-quality deliverables while balancing scope, schedule, and budget.
- 6. Past Performance (15%): Consideration to the firm's experience with similar projects, familiarity with Dakota County and stakeholder engagement, understanding of local issues, and use of innovative design approaches.

7. Fee Estimate: While not assigned a specific percentage, the fee estimate was evaluated in relation to the criteria above. Proposals needed to include a clear explanation of budget priorities, task relationships, and any special approaches or options for negotiation.

Using a Best Value approach the review team considered the quality and feasibility of the proposals and services for the proposed fees; the cost proposed vs. value to be provided; and the approach to complete the work within budget and schedule.

Achieving a high Best Value score required a balanced approach to quality, timeliness, and cost. The evaluation process identified the consultant that offers the best overall value to Dakota County, considering both qualifications and competitiveness of pricing.

Evaluation Results:

The consensus reached by the proposal reviewers supported negotiating the contract with Bolton & Menk.

The review team selected Bolton & Menk based on the detailed work plan provided in the firm's proposal, which presented a strong understanding of the project's key issues to be addressed and provided an integrated approach to delivering all tasks by a qualified team. The recommended proposal emphasized approaches to address the need for early coordination with stakeholders, combined with a thorough understanding of the constraints and required approval processes. The Bolton & Menk proposal provided the best balancing of the tasks to be completed with the project-area issues and stakeholders to be addressed. The project issues will include coordination with MnDOT, UPRR, the City of Burnsville, and other agency representatives and stakeholders to confirm project support and approvals. The Bolton & Menk proposal also most effectively addressed how project requirements can be anticipated and completed within the accelerated schedule.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends the consulting engineering firm Bolton & Menk be awarded a contract for CP 32-113, including preliminary and final design for a roundabout at CSAH 32 and I-35W East Frontage Road in Burnsville. Given the scope of the needed work and issues to be addressed, the Bolton & Menk proposal and contract negotiations offered the best combination of approach, detailed work plan, and balanced cost-to-value from among the five submitted proposals.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

- Authorize the execution of a second contract amendment with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. (Kimley-Horn) for additions and changes to final design engineering services for County Project (CP) 42-163.
- Amend the 2025 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget based on engineering design and related services.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County is proceeding with the design of CP 42-163, the reconstruction of County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 42 along a one-mile segment in the city of Apple Valley from Redwood Drive to 147th Street and vicinity (Attachment: Project Location Map). By Resolution No. 23-209 (May 23, 2023), the County Board authorized the project's preliminary and final design contract with consultant Kimley-Horn for an amount not to exceed \$959,920. By Resolution No. 25-048 (January 21, 2025), the County Board authorized the first contract amendment, adding \$619,285, for a total amended contract value of \$1,579,205 (Contract Number DCA20482).

In 2022, Dakota County applied for and received a federal grant of \$6,540,000 to support the project's construction; this was based on a conceptual early estimate of a total construction cost of approximately \$8,200,000, with the scope then assuming minimal reconstruction. Preliminary engineering work completed under the Kimley-Horn contract in 2024 confirmed the need for full reconstruction at an estimated construction cost of approximately \$17,300,000. Amendment No. 1 addressed scope changes based on added services in the preliminary engineering design stages, while additional services have now been identified for final engineering design. The estimated project construction cost, based on 60 percent engineering design, is now \$18,970,000. Staff has worked with the consultant on complex final engineering and right-of-way details and negotiated additional out-of-scope and expanded services by task totaling \$598,485, resulting in a total amended contract value of \$2,177,690. This total amended contract value for preliminary and final engineering design remains within industry norms to complete all preliminary and final engineering design services, with related services including public engagement, based on current construction estimates.

Additional out-of-scope professional services for final engineering and to support County and City of Apple Valley (City) right of way work on more than 80 parcels were tracked and documented in detail by the consultant (Attachment: Kimley-Horn Amendment Letter). The Amendment No. 2 work by task includes the following (with subtotals):

- Additional project management and support services for eight months, with the need to coordinate numerous technical details for engineering design elements led by both the County and City (\$39,570).
- Expanded survey work to support needed stormwater drainage and pond modifications in Apple Grove Park. This includes coordination of services to physically locate and survey points around the major Northern Natural Gas main crossing under the CSAH 42 roadway and a topographic survey needed to support final design plans in that area for the proposed roadway, stormwater, and utility designs (\$9,960).
- Additional work on preliminary design plans with emphasis on impacts to business properties around Garden View Drive and at residential properties near 147th Street and Elm Drive. This includes coordination of design with right-of-way impacts for both the CSAH 42 project and the City's coordinated water and sewer project (\$25,340).
- Geotechnical conditions and environmental sampling requiring special field investigations, including County staff teamwork on owner communications for required environmental drilling and sampling at the Garden View Drive corner properties. This task also includes additional geotechnical investigations along CSAH 42 next to Redwood Park, where the roadway grade will be raised on fill with a retaining wall to be modified (\$95,200).
- Coordination with the private and city utilities, including the anticipated replacement of major power line structures owned by Great River Energy (\$45,165).
- Expansion of scope for detailed engineering, including grading for the Redwood Park area, structure design for walls, and integration of City lighting design plans (\$256,730).
- Right of way mapping for 88 parcels, including coordination with the City's utility project and added easements. This was not previously scoped (\$95,260).
- Completion of environmental documentation based on findings through the Minnesota Department of Transportation Cultural Resources Unit, which now includes the recommended establishment of the large-area Orrin Thompson Apple Valley Historic District (District). The District's significance is based on the area's status as one of the largest communities designed by Orrin Thompson, demonstrating the early development of Apple Valley, postwar housing types, and the period's neighborhood design. The District was identified as eligible for listing under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act; however, no adverse impact is anticipated based on state-agency reviews of the CSAH 42 project. The additional work based on the District includes: preparation of documents for approval of easements required at most or all of the properties; notification and facilitation of a comment period and requests for concurrence with emphasis on Redwood Park; and expanded work to confirm Section 4(f) De Minimis Determinations (\$31,260).

The project's professional services, outside of the consultant contract, include work for real estate title research, appraisals, cultural resources, and specialty underground survey, with an estimated total of \$262,310 for all such services. County staff has worked with the City to estimate project cost shares in accordance with adopted Dakota County Transportation cost participation policies.

The County's team continues to work on specific cost components and joint powers agreement costshare formulas, including the City's unique responsibilities for right of way costs based on the concurrent water and sewer utility project.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends authorizing the second contract amendment with Kimley-Horn, which would increase the total from \$1,579,205 to \$2,177,690 (an increase of \$598,485) to include added scope and services through final design engineering for Contract Number DCA20482 for CP 42-163.

Staff further recommends amending the 2025 CIP budget based Amendments 1, 2 and additional services to be required, under seven contracts, including real estate title research, appraisals, cultural resources, and specialty survey work.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The cost share for CP 42-163 will follow the County's Cost Share Policy including an 85/15 percent County/City share for roadway modernization and other policies applicable to the City's design elements and preferences, including water and sewer utility work and aesthetics. To account for Amendments 1 (\$619,285) and 2 (\$598,485), plus the other supporting contract services (\$262,310), the project now requires a 2025 CIP budget amendment increase of \$1,480,080, for a design services budget total of \$2,440,000. The funding sources will include Transportation Sales Tax and City Funds.

Scope and Fee Memorandum

Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. (Kimley-Horn) has prepared the following Scope and Fee Memorandum to document the additional services requested by Dakota County in delivery of the Preliminary and Final Design of CP 42-163 (CSAH 42) project. Amendment No. 2 is necessary to account for the additional effort to complete the additional environmental and geotechnical investigation, increase in public/private utility coordination, project limit extensions, right-of-way services, and additional environmental documentation.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 – SCOPE OF SERVICES

TASK 1 PROJECT MANAGEMENT

As a result of the additional design, right-of-way, and agreement coordination, the project delivery schedule has been elongated by a total of 18 months from the original project schedule assumptions, and additional 8 months from the effort provided in Amendment No. 1. The following additional effort is anticipated to be required under this task:

- Additional 8 months of general project management including monthly scheduling, invoicing, and general/weekly project management meetings and coordination.
- Up to eight (8) additional PMT meetings.
- Up to sixteen (16) additional PM Check-In meetings
- Additional quality control and quality assurance effort in correlation to the expanded project scope.

TASK 5 SURVEY, WETLANDS, CULTURAL RES., AND DRAINAGE ASSESS

Additional topographic survey is needed to support the drainage design at Apple Grove Park and support the physical locating of the Northern Natural Gas Line that crosses the CSAH 42 corridor. The additional topographic survey will be completed to support final design plans for the proposed roadway, stormwater, and utility designs.

TASK 6 CONCEPT ALTERNATIVES AND PRELIMINARY DESIGN

As the project design has progressed, additional concept alternatives and preliminary design effort is required for impacts to private properties along the corridor. The design team will assist County staff in coordination with property owners, concept site planning, and preliminary design for the following properties where significant impacts are anticipated as a result of the project.

- Flowerama
- Boosch Tabacco
- Shell Gas Station
- Valvoline
- Frontage Road Business Center (formerly Broback Center)
- Theisen/Paulseth Residential Property



TASK 7 GEOTECHNICAL AND PAVEMENT EVALUATION (WITH PHASE I & PHASE II ESA)

Task 7.1 Additional Geotechnical Services

Braun Intertec will perform additional geotechnical services for the design and construction of the western end of CSAH 42 where grade will be raised and the existing sheet pile wall extended to accommodate. Braun will perform a staged surcharge analysis on this stretch of CSAH 42 using Plaxis 3D Connect Edition, version 2024.1.0.1060. The staged surcharge analysis will help determine the timeframe, lateral extents, staging requirements, and total settlement associated with the raise in grade in this area of the project site. In addition, we will also help determine how much additional loading will result on the existing wall and how tieback anchors will interact with the surcharge.

In addition to the surcharge analysis, Braun will review the provided sheet pile wall extension plans and provide the project team with information that can be used in final design of the sheet pile extension, including minimum length of tieback to exposed height of wall ratio for global stability, adhesion capacity of soil layers, recommended installation lengths and angles, and minimum bonded/unbonded anchor lengths. Following completion of the surcharge analysis and sheet pile extension review, a final geotechnical evaluation report will be compiled outlining the results of our additional work.

Task 7.3 Environmental Services - Limited Phase II

Based on the findings of the Modified Phase I ESA, numerous medium and high-ranked sites of concern were identified within a 500-foot buffer of the Project Corridor, particularly at the intersection of CSAH 42 and Garden View Drive. Braun Intertec, as a Kimley-Horn sub-consultant will complete a Limited Phase II Drilling Investigation. We assume up to 10 soil borings drilled to a depth of 25 feet below ground surface (bgs) with temporary monitoring wells at each location. Soils will be classified in the field and soil discoloration, odors, and indications of debris will be documented, if detected. Selected soil samples will be collected and chemically analyzed to determine the presence of impacts. For the purpose of this amendment, we assume that a maximum of 20 soil samples (two per boring) will be collected and analyzed the following parameters:

- Volatile organic compounds (VOCs) using United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Method 8260.
- Polyaromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) using EPA Method 8270.
- Eight Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) metals using EPA Methods 6020 and 7471.
- Diesel range organics (DRO) using the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) Method.
- Gasoline range organics (GRO) using the WDNR Method.

Temporary monitoring wells will be installed in each of the soil borings, assuming the groundwater table is encountered. Prior to sampling the temporary monitoring wells, static groundwater levels in each monitoring well will be measured to the nearest 0.01 foot and recorded. Groundwater samples will be placed directly into laboratory-supplied containers, preserved appropriately, and submitted to the laboratory for chemical analysis. For the purposes of this amendment, we assume that a total of 10 groundwater samples will be collected from the temporary monitoring wells and submitted to the laboratory for analysis of the following parameters:

- VOCs using EPA Method 8260.
- Semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs) using EPA Method 8270.
- Dissolved 8 RCRA metals using EPA Methods 6020 and 7470.
- DRO using the WDNR Method.
- GRO using the WDNR Method.

Braun Intertec will prepare a project-wide Request for a No Association Determination (NAD) for the



submittal to the MPCA Brownfield Program on behalf of Dakota County based on the results of the Limited Phase II and proposed ROW. Please note, with this enrollment, the MPCA will require an approved RAP/CCP prior to construction, a RAP Implementation Report after construction, and potentially additional documentation once the project is complete.

Braun Intertec will prepare a RAP/CCP for the project. The RAP/CCP will summarize existing environmental data, discuss impacts to soil and/or groundwater affecting the proposed construction, present a framework for managing contaminated media to be encountered during construction, and describe proposed response actions and required environmental monitoring and testing. The draft RAP/CCP will be sent to Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. (KHA) and Dakota County for review and comment in advance of MCPA submittal. Only an electronic copy of the RAP/CCP report will be submitted. Costs for Regulatory Assistance do not include MPCA document review fees required for Brownfield Program review. These will be billed to Dakota County directly from the MPCA.

TASK 8 PUBLIC AND PRIVATE UTILITY IDENTIFICATION AND COORDINATION

The development of the preliminary and final design of the CSAH 42 roadway and storm sewer improvements has identified significant additional effort to coordinate the City utility project improvements and potential impacts to private properties and private utilities within the corridor. The project team will also conduct additional individual private utility meetings with specific owners (GRE and Northern Natural Gas) to coordinate construction impacts and mitigation for their major utility infrastructure. The following additional effort is anticipated for the design and coordination of the private and public utility relocations.

- Private Utility Coordination
 - Additional materials, preparation, and attendance for specific GRE focused meetings
 - o Coordination on potholing and GRE structural design alternatives
- Public Utility Coordination
 - Development of typical section concepts to assist in coordination between final utility locations for public and private entities
 - Three public utility design/coordination workshops

TASK 10 FINAL ROADWAY AND GEOMETRIC DESIGN PLANS

Through the process of finalizing preliminary design and preparation of the 60% Plans, the following additional effort has been identified to complete final construction document for the expanded project scope. The additional efforts provided below are in addition to assumptions provided in the RFP and Amendment No. 1.

- Development of sheet pile wall and surcharge design details and plans for the Redwood Pond area
- Cast-in-place retaining wall design along CSAH 42 (previously assumed concrete barrier)
- Expansion of project limits to Pennock Avenue and Redwood Drive to accommodate additional City utility work and construction staging tie-ins
- Significant revisions to roadway geometrics and profiles for both CSAH 42 and frontage roads to minimize extents of retaining walls and provide appropriate driveway tie-in slopes along frontage roads.
- Additional plan sheet preparation and evaluation of construction staging to accommodate profile modifications, surcharging, and sheet wall construction not assumed as part of RFP.
- Additional cost estimating and preparation of cost splits in support of JPA with City of Apple Valley
- Integration of plans and specifications, including preparation of SEQ for City utility and lighting project improvements



TASK 13 RIGHT-OF-WAY (R/W) MAPPING

Following the development of construction limits, temporary easements, and permanent easement needs, Kimley-Horn will create parcel sketches detailing right-of-way impacts at affected parcels throughout the corridor. The original scope of work assumed the preparation of parcel sketched would be completed by others. The additional effort required to complete parcel sketches and support the County ROW acquisition process includes the following:

- Complete parcel sketches for up to eighty-eight (88) properties requiring temporary or permanent easement.
- Coordinate and update sketches/documents through the appraisal and right-of-way coordination phase with property owners.
- Prepare parcel sketch updates and comparison analysis for up to eighty-six (86) additional permanent and temporary easement needs for City utility project improvements.
- Up to three (3) workshops with City of Apple Valley and/or County ROW staff and appraisal consultants review easements needs and coordinate the easement acquisition process.

TASK 14 ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION, SECTION 4 (F), AND PERMITS/APPROVALS

As a result of the work of the MnDOT Cultural Resources Unit and progression in design of CSAH 42 in relation to Section 4(f) requirements, the following additional environmental documentation efforts will be required to attain necessary permits and approvals before finalizing plans:

- Preparation of a Section 4(f) Temporary Occupancy form for temporary easements required at approximately 74 properties located within the newly established Orrin Thompson Apple Valley Historic District. The form will be distributed to the Minnesota State Historic Preservation Office for concurrence. A signed form will be attached to the NEPA document.
- Preparation of a De Minimis Determination Notice of Intent Request form for MnDOT for permanent easements/ROW acquisition at approximately 74 properties located within the newly established Orrin Thompson Apple Valley Historic District. Preparation of a Request for Concurrence on Effects to Section 4(f) Resource Letter which summarizes comments received and how they have been considered. Includes advertisement for a public hearing and a 14-day comment period. The Request for concurrence of effects letter will be submitted to FHWA for review.
- Preparation of a De Minimis Determination Notice of Intent Request form for MnDOT for impacts
 to Apple Grove Park. Preparation of a Request for Concurrence on Effects to Section 4(f) Resource
 Letter which summarizes comments received and how they have been considered. Includes
 advertisement for a public hearing and a 14-day comment period. The Request for concurrence of
 effects letter will be submitted to FHWA for review.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize execution of a joint powers agreement (JPA) with the City of West St. Paul For County Project 08-035 for the design, right of way acquisition, and construction of a multi-use trail on County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 8 (Wentworth Avenue) between Trunk Highway 3 (Robert Street) and CSAH 73 (Oakdale Avenue) in West St. Paul.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, a multi-use trail along the south side of CSAH 8 between Robert Street and Oakdale Avenue is programmed for construction in 2027 (Attachment: Project Map). This work will build upon a design concept developed through a feasibility study completed by the County and West St. Paul in early 2025. A JPA between the County and West St. Paul will define responsibilities and funding obligations for the two parties through construction. In accordance with 2040 Transportation Plan policies, a funding split of 85 percent county/15 percent city is expected for all project elements at this time. The City is the lead agency for the project.

The Dakota County Pedestrian and Bicycle Study identified this segment of CSAH 8 as a medium-priority gap in the County's system of multi-use trails. Current facilities provide limited safe mobility for pedestrians and bicyclists in a high-volume segment of the County and state highway system. This project will expand on other recent trail projects within West St. Paul to provide a more comprehensive trail network comparable to other areas in the County.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends executing a JPA with the City to define cost contributions and responsibilities for the project through design, right of way acquisition, and construction.

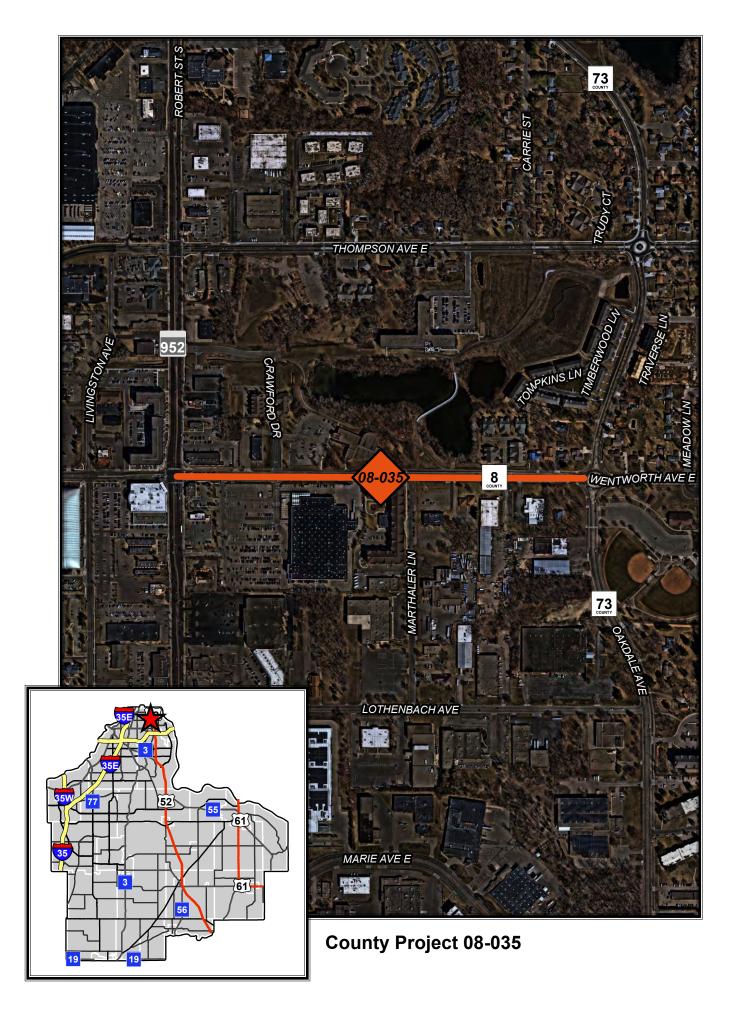
EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The estimated cost of design, right of way acquisition and construction for CP 08-035 is \$1,741,193. Funds from the Transportation Advancement Account will be used for final design and right of way services in 2026. The draft 2026-2030 CIP allocates \$233,750 in CSAH funding for right of way acquisition, and \$500,000 in CSAH funds and \$350,000 in Transportation Advancement Account funds towards construction.

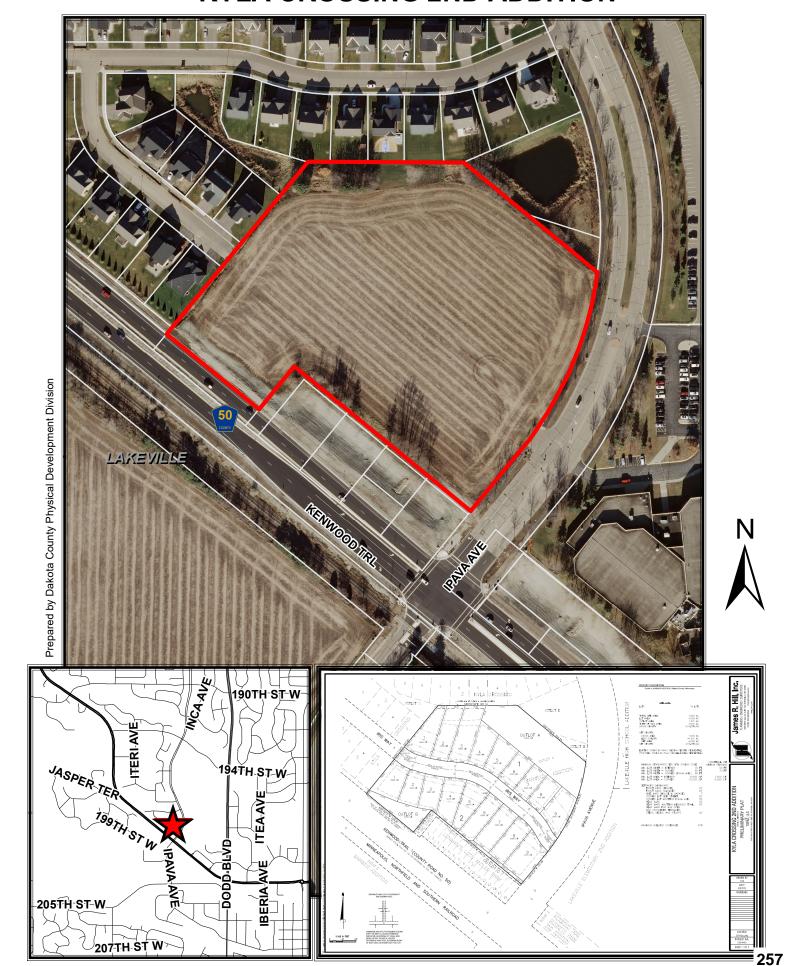

SUMMARY

Dakota County Veterans Services has a long and proud history of serving our nation's service members, veterans, and their families, whose contributions and sacrifices, including placing themselves in harm's way, have been vital in maintaining the freedoms and way of life enjoyed by our citizens. This legacy continues to this day as staff work with federal, state, and local partners to ensure that service members, veterans, and their families have access to the resources they need to thrive

Operation Green Light for Veterans is an initiative that was started by a collaboration of public agencies in New York State to show support for those who have served their nation and connect them with benefits. Approximately 200,000 service members transition to civilian communities annually. Studies indicate that 44-72 percent of service members experience high levels of stress during transition from military to civilian life, and active military service members transitioning from military service are at a high risk for suicide during their first year after military service.

Lighting up homes, businesses, and government buildings in green, the color that stands for "go" and symbolizes hope, renewal, and well-being, is a way to visibly show that the community honors the service and sacrifice of veterans, active military, and their families, and encourages veterans to reach out to their county veteran service officers. Authorization To Execute Metropolitan Council Contract With Dakota County For Geospatial Data Formatting To Continue Dakota County Participation In MetroGIS

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the Deputy County Manager to execute a contract with the Metropolitan Council for Geospatial Data Formatting to continue Dakota County's participation in the MetroGIS collaborative.

SUMMARY

Along with the other six metropolitan area counties, Dakota County entered into a formal agreement with the Metropolitan Council in 1996 forming MetroGIS (Resolution No. 96-783). The current agreement (Resolution No. 20-380), was due to expire on December 31, 2023, but was extended for two years and will expire on December 31, 2025.

A new agreement (Attachment) between the metropolitan area counties and the Metropolitan Council has been developed. The new agreement recognizes the importance of perpetuating a strong, productive and mutually beneficial relationship which highlights the shared responsibilities and the continued commitment in providing reliable, authoritative geospatial data to one another and the public in standardized formats that maximize its usefulness.

By Resolution No. 14-143 (March 25, 3014), a free and open geospatial data policy was adopted, along with similar resolutions by the other six metropolitan counties, a new era of collaborative geospatial work continues. The free and open geospatial data policy facilitates the positive result of greater data availability and continued work to standardize that data among data producers serves to magnify this benefit. This new agreement with the Metropolitan Council, and similar agreements by the other six metropolitan counties, affirms that continued collaborative work through participation in MetroGIS is beneficial to each entity's internal needs and their collective interest.

The new agreement will commence on January 1, 2026, and expire on December 31, 2028, with options to extend the agreement for a single two-year term.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board authorize the Deputy County Manager to execute a contract with the Metropolitan Council for Geospatial Data Formatting to continue Dakota County's participation in the MetroGIS collaborative.

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 471.59 authorizes local governmental units to jointly or cooperatively exercise any power common to the contracting parties; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council Board accepted a Business Plan for MetroGIS on June 14, 2000; and

WHEREAS, the Business Plan identified the need for the Council and the counties to collaborate to build regional GIS datasets for distribution to public sector stakeholders, such as state agencies, municipalities and watershed districts; and

WHEREAS, the counties subsequently entered into agreements with the Council to build regional GIS data sets; and

WHEREAS, in August 2020, the County entered into the current such agreement with the Council; and

WHEREAS, that agreement expires on December 31, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the new agreement shall commence on January 1, 2026, and remain in effect until December 31, 2028, with an option to be extended for a single, two-year term; and

WHEREAS, the County wishes to continue to participate in the MetroGIS collaborative; and

WHEREAS, under this agreement, the Metropolitan Council will provide \$4,000 per year to help cover costs of performing tasks defined in the agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Deputy County Manager to execute the Metropolitan Council Contract with Dakota County for Geospatial Data Formatting, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form; and

Dakota County and Metropolitan Council Contract for Geospatial Data Formatting

THIS CONTRACT is entered into by and between the Metropolitan Council, a public corporation and political subdivision of the State of Minnesota ("the Council") and Dakota County, a political subdivision of the State of Minnesota ("the County.")

WHEREAS:

- 1. The Council and the County participate in a voluntary collaborative known as MetroGIS and support the objectives of MetroGIS by standardizing, aggregating and publishing inter-jurisdictional geospatial datasets for the benefit of government and public data consumers; and
- 2. The Council has provided financial, technical, data assembly and distribution support for the partners participating in the MetroGIS collaborative since 1995; and
- **3.** The Council has developed datasets and related services and made them available to the County and other public parties at no charge; and
- **4.** The County has developed its own geospatial datasets and has resolved to provide this data in its native format at no cost to other governments and to the public; and
- 5. The Council intends to aggregate the County's geospatial data with data from other Counties in the metropolitan region to create MetroGIS Regional Datasets and to publish the datasets on a publicly accessible geospatial data clearinghouse site for public consumption and use; and
- **6.** The Council desires to compensate the County for the effort of translating its geospatial datasets from the native format in use by the County into standardized formats pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained in this Agreement, the Parties agree as follows:

I) SCOPE

The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the terms by which the County and the Council will expand upon their existing relationship in developing, standardizing, maintaining and publishing authoritative geospatial datasets and accompanying metadata. This is done to serve the needs of both the County and the Council and to provide valuable geospatial data to the public.

Through this agreement, the County agrees to provide the Council with the electronic geospatial datasets and up-to-date accompanying metadata in agreed upon standardized formats as described in **Exhibit A**, which is attached and incorporated by reference.

The Council will pay the County pursuant to the terms of this Agreement to assist the County in formatting its geospatial data into agreed upon regional and state data standards and for time and labor spent in providing updated accompanying metadata.

The Council agrees to aggregate the County's data with data from other counties of the metropolitan region to create MetroGIS Regional Datasets and publish these regionally standardized datasets on a suitable geospatial data clearinghouse site for public consumption and use. The Council's responsibilities are described in **Exhibit B**, which is attached and incorporated by reference.

The Council and the County acknowledge and agree to the Context, Purpose and Stipulations included in **Exhibit C**, which is attached and incorporated by reference.

1.2 Definitions.

- a. **Geographic Information System (GIS)** means a system capable of storing and processing geospatial data to analyze and display geographic relations between people, places, and things on the Earth's surface.
- b. Geospatial Data has the meaning of "electronic geospatial data" as defined by Minnesota Statutes Section 16E.30 Subd.10. "Geospatial data" means digital data using geographic or projected map coordinated values, identification codes, and associated descriptive data to locate and describe boundaries or features on, above, or below the surface of the Earth or characteristics of the Earth's inhabitants or its natural or human-constructed features. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 16.E.30 Subd. 11, the Parties acknowledge and agree that only public data, as defined by Minnesota Statutes, chapter 13, shall be included in "Geospatial Data."
- c. Metadata means data that describes and provides basic information about the Geospatial Data, as governed by the Minnesota Geographic Metadata Guidelines, version 1.2, data October 7, 1998, available online at: http://www.mngeo.state.mn.us/committee/standards/mgmg/metadata.htm and shall, at least, identify the original authoritative data source.
- d. MetroGIS means a regional geographic information systems initiative serving the seven-county Minneapolis-St. Paul (Minnesota) metropolitan area. It provides a regional forum to promote and facilitate widespread sharing of geospatial data. MetroGIS is a voluntary collaboration of local and regional governments, with partners in state and federal government, academic institutions, nonprofit organizations, and businesses.

II) TERM AND TERMINATION

2.1 <u>Term.</u> This Agreement will take effect on January 1, 2026, and expire on December 31, 2028.

- 2.2 Option. The Council may extend the term of this Agreement for a single, two-year term by submitting a written request for extension to the County 30 days prior to expiration of this Agreement. The extension of the agreement would commence on January 1, 2029, and would expire on December 31, 2030.
- 2.3 <u>Termination.</u> This Agreement may be terminated by mutual agreement of the Parties.

III) PAYMENT

- 3.1 <u>Maximum Total Compensation.</u> The maximum total compensation to be paid to the County by the Council for all work performed under this Agreement shall not exceed \$4,000 in any calendar year.
- 3.2 <u>Method of Payment.</u> During each calendar year of the agreement, upon provision of the fourth quarter geospatial data and completed metadata to the Council, the County shall issue an invoice referencing the Council's contract number to the Council. Upon verification and acceptance by the Council's representative of each invoice, the Council shall pay the County the verified amount within 30 days. The County shall not receive payment for work found by the Council to be incomplete, unsatisfactory, or performed in violation of federal, state, or local law, ordinance, rule, or regulation.

IV) GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Assignment.</u> The Parties shall not assign or transfer their rights or responsibilities under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party.
- 4.2 <u>Amendment.</u> Any alterations, variations, modifications or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment to this Agreement signed by the authorized representatives of both Parties.
- 4.3 <u>Governing Law.</u> The laws of the State of Minnesota shall govern all interpretations of this Agreement.
- 4.4 <u>Notice.</u> The individuals listed below or their successors in office will be the primary contact for their respective entity. Any notice or demand, which may or must be given or made by a party hereto, under the terms of this Agreement or any statute or ordinance, shall be in writing and shall be sent (i) certified mail, (ii) by e-mail, provided that the recipient of such notice acknowledges receipt by e-mail or otherwise in writing, or (iii) delivered in person to the other party addressed as follows:

4.5 <u>Dispute Resolution.</u> A dispute resolution process shall be used for any unresolved issue, dispute or controversy between the parties before any legal remedies are exercised. The dispute resolution process contains a three-level dispute resolution ladder that escalates a dispute from the project management level through the executive management level.

The County is represented from Level 1 to 3 in the following order:

County Level 1: GIS Manager

County Level 2: Operations Business Information Officers

County Level 3: Chief Information Officer

The Council is represented from Level 1 to 3 in the following order:

Council Level 1: GIS Manager

Council Level 2: Deputy Chief Information Officer

Council Level 3: Chief Information Officer

At each level, representatives of the Parties shall meet and continue to explore resolution until either party determines, in good faith, that effective resolution is not possible at the current level and notifies the other party that the process is elevated to the next level. If either or both parties make such a determination at any point during issue resolution at Level 3, then the dispute resolution process has been exhausted.

- 4.6 <u>Waiver.</u> One or more waivers of any provision, term, condition or covenant by either Party shall not be construed by the other Party as a waiver of a subsequent breach of the same.
- 4.7 <u>Liability.</u> Each Party agrees that it will be responsible for its own acts and the results thereof to the extent authorized by law and shall not be responsible for the acts of the other party and the results thereof. Both the County and Council's liability for the data is governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466.

Any and all employees of each of the respective Parties hereto, and all other persons engaged by each respective party in the performance of any work or services required or provided herein to be performed by the respective party shall not be considered employees of the other Party. Each Party shall be solely responsible for its own employees for any workers' compensation claims.

4.8 <u>Severability.</u> The provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed severable. If any part of this Agreement is rendered void, invalid, or unenforceable, such rendering shall not affect the validity and enforceability of the remainder of this Agreement unless the part or parts which are void, invalid, or otherwise unenforceable shall substantially impair the value of the entire Agreement with respect to the Parties. One or more waivers by one Party of any provision, term, condition, or covenant shall not be construed by the other Party as a waiver of a subsequent breach of the same by the other Party.

- 4.9 <u>Record-Keeping and Audit.</u> All records kept by the County and the Council with respect to this Agreement shall be subject to examination by the representatives of each party hereto. All data collected, created, received, maintained, or disseminated for any purpose by the activities of the County and the Council pursuant to this Agreement shall be governed by Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 13, as amended. Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Chapter 16C.05 Subd. 5, the Parties further agree that the books, records, documents, and accounting procedures and practices relevant to this Agreement are subject to examination by the other Party and the state or legislative auditors, as appropriate, for a minimum of six years from the end of this Agreement.
- 4.10 <u>Compliance</u>. The Parties agree to abide by all applicable state and local laws, including the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, in performing their obligations under this Agreement.
- 4.11 <u>Survival.</u> The provisions of Section 4.3, 4.4, 4.5, 4.7 and 4.9 will survive termination of this Agreement.
- 4.12 <u>Complete Agreement.</u> It is understood and agreed that the entire Agreement between the Parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the Parties relating to the subject matter hereof. All items referred to in this Agreement are incorporated or attached and are deemed to be part of this Agreement. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Agreement and any of the Exhibits attached hereto, the terms of this Agreement shall prevail.

Exhibit A Roles and Responsibilities of the County

Translation of County-generated electronic geospatial data into agreed upon standards and interval of delivery

Road Centerline Data: The County will convert its road and highway centerline data to the Minnesota Geospatial Advisory Council Road Centerline Data Standard format and deliver, or make it available through appropriate file transfer means, on a continual basis to the Council for automated harvesting, validation, aggregation and publishing as part of the Metro Regional Road Centerlines Dataset.

Address Point Data: The County, serving in the role of aggregator of the address point data from its constituent municipalities and addressing authorities, will convert a version of the data into the Minnesota Geospatial Advisory Council Address Point Data Standard format and deliver or make the converted data available through appropriate file transfer means on a continual basis for automated harvesting, validation, aggregation and publishing as part of the Metro Regional Address Point Dataset.

Tax Parcel Data: The County will convert its tax parcel data to the Minnesota Geospatial Advisory Council Parcel Data Standard format and deliver or make it available through appropriate file transfer means on a quarterly schedule within the first 5 days of business in the months of January, April, July and October.

Municipal and County Boundary Data: The County will provide its current municipal and county polygon boundary file in its native electronic format and deliver, or make it available through appropriate file transfer means, on a quarterly schedule by the first day of business in the months of January, April, July and October. The County will communicate known municipal boundary changes since the previous quarter.

Metadata and supporting documentation: The County will provide a thorough review and update of the MetroGIS Regional Parcel Dataset metadata record and the MetroGIS Regional Parcel Attributes document which accompanies the data. The County will further provide updated metadata records to accompany each additional dataset it provides as listed in this Agreement.

Validation, Data Quality and Completeness: Prior to data submission, the County will complete validation to ensure the data standard is met. The County will also complete data quality checks to ensure the data is confirmed as complete as expected. This includes checks for geometry, number of records and completeness of attributes.

File Transfer Format: Data shall be provided through a designated portal account provided by the Council. Each data set, metadata and supporting documentation should be provided as an

individual zip file using the following formats and naming conventions or subsequently agreed upon format.

Communication: The County shall designate one (1) County-contact for data submissions and notify the Council of staff changes within two (2) weeks of said change.

Data Issues: The County will respond within 2 business days to data issues reported by the Council or the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board (MESB) to address the integrity of the data for centerlines, address points, and parcels. This includes: 1) acknowledgement of receipt with timeline to review the issue; 2) confirmation of the issue and plan/timeline to address the issue; 3) direction to hold the publication of the dataset until correction is made or to publish without correction; 4) follow-up with the corrected dataset and any revised supporting documentation or an update to the timeline to address the issue.

Exhibit B Roles and Responsibilities of the Council

Aggregation of the County's data with those of other metropolitan Counties to produce and to publish the Metro Regional Datasets

File Transfer: The Council will provide a designated portal account to the County for uploading data. The Council will share a tool with the County to assist with data uploads. The Council does not support the implementation of the tool and will assist with or update the tool only as time allows. The Council acknowledges that its limited support of the tool may affect the County's ability to compile or submit the data outlined in Exhibit A.

Validation, Data Quality and Completeness: The Council will validate the data provided by the County to ensure the data standard is met. The Council will also complete data quality checks on the Tax Parcel data to ensure the data is complete as expected. This includes checks for geometry, number of records and completeness of attributes.

The Council uses validation and data quality tools for internal checks. The Council will share validation and data quality tools with the County as-is and when internal tools are updated. The Council does not support the implementation and use of these tools.

The Council maintains and supports the custom *MetroGIS 911 Data Sources Viewer* web mapping application. This multi-jurisdictional sponsored application was developed by the Council on behalf of MetroGIS in 2019 for the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board (MESB) to check the County's Road Centerline and Address Point data for incorporation into the regional 9-1-1 system.

Aggregation and Data Publishing: The Metropolitan Council agrees to aggregate the County's data with those of other metropolitan Counties to produce and publish the Metro Regional Datasets as follows:

- Road Centerline Data: Daily
- Address Point Data: Daily
- **Tax Parcel Data:** Quarterly, published by the end of the 3rd week of the months of January, April, July, October pursuant to receiving all data and corrections.
- Municipal and County Boundary Data: Quarterly. The Council does not re-distribute the dataset containing municipal and county boundaries, rather, it aligns the Council's existing Regional Municipal Boundary dataset to match the changes shown in the quarterly updates provided by the County. These are updated and published quarterly, subsequent to publishing the Regional Tax Parcel Data.

Metadata and supporting documentation: The Council will maintain regional metadata for each of the aggregated datasets and updates to the MetroGIS Regional Parcel Attributes document which accompanies the data.

Communication: The Council will provide reminders to the County 1 week prior to the quarterly due date for Tax Parcel and Municipal and County Boundary data.

Data Issues: The Council will reserve the right to hold submitted data from publication if data quality issues or standards are not addressed by the County.

Exhibit C Context, Purpose and Stipulations

The **County** and the **Council** recognize the importance of perpetuating a strong, productive and mutually beneficial, government-to-government relationship which highlights the shared benefits, responsibilities and continued commitment to providing authoritatively sourced, reliable and up-to-date geospatial data to one another and to the public in standardized formats that maximize its usefulness.

Context of the Agreement. The County and the Council have been partners in geospatial data needs assessment, data development and data publication since 1996 through the MetroGIS collaborative. This unique and innovative partnership has led to a heightened awareness of one another's roles, needs and challenges as a data producers and consumers. With the adoption of a free and open geospatial data policy by the County on the date listed below, a new era of collaborative geospatial work emerged. Freely and openly available geospatial data facilitates greater data availability and enhances the ability to standardize that data with that of other agencies to magnify this benefit.

- Anoka County on April 22, 2014
- Carver County on April 1, 2014
- Dakota County on March 11, 2014
- Hennepin County on February 11, 2014
- Ramsey County on February 11, 2014
- Scott County on October 6, 2015
- Washington County on November 18, 2014

Purpose of the Agreement. The purpose of this Memorandum of Agreement is three-fold. This first is to affirm that continued collaborative work through the participation of the County and the Council in the MetroGIS collaborative is beneficial to both their internal needs and collective interest. The second is an affirmation that the County and the Council remain committed to the MetroGIS collaborative as a means of defining and solving their shared needs for regionwide geospatial data. Third, is to articulate the formal terms by which the Council will remunerate the County for its efforts to convert its public geospatial data into agreed-upon and adopted geospatial data standards.

Stipulations of Agreement. The terms of this agreement are underpinned by the following stipulations:

- **Benefit:** Both the County and the Council acknowledge the continued benefit of the MetroGIS collaborative to explore, discuss, define and solve their shared issues of geospatial data development, standardization, usage and publication.
- **Participation:** Both the County and the Council agree to continue to participate in the MetroGIS collaborative by sending a representative staff member to advocate for, and articulate their agency's interests, to work in concert with other participating interests to help define shared needs, and to participate as needed in the constituent committees and work groups of the collaborative for the benefit of their own organization and of the regional geospatial professional community.

• **Dependencies:** Both the County and the Council acknowledge the downstream dependencies of timely, up to date, and accurate data submissions for the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board's oversight and management of the regional 9-1-1 system; the State of MN Geospatial Advisory Council's statewide geospatial data priorities being administered by the MN Geospatial Information Office; and the Council's and Metro Transit's operations, planning and policy responsibilities.
