5.1 Authorization To Adopt 2024-2044 Dakota County Solid Waste Management Plan

Renee Burman, Environmental Initiatives Supervisor, presented this topic and responded to questions.

Staff and committee members discussed budget constraints and the use of Environmental Legacy Funds (ELF) for waste management. The plan aims to reduce reliance on county funds by pursuing external grants, focusing on strategies like organic curbside collection to divert waste efficiently and cost-effectively. A key part of this strategy is to explore available external funding sources. Mr. Fischer emphasized the need to secure additional funding from the state solid waste management tax (SCORE funding) for essential county solid waste management activities.

WHEREAS, Minnesota counties are responsible for developing projects and programs to achieve state goals for waste management; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) adopted the 2022-2042 Metropolitan Solid Waste Management Policy Plan (Policy Plan) on January 30, 2024; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 473.803 requires each metropolitan county to revise its current solid waste management plan to implement the revised Policy Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Policy Plan prescribes strategies that must be incorporated into county-specific plans, including required strategies and optional strategies that must meet a minimum point threshold; and

WHEREAS, stakeholder engagement was conducted and comments were gathered on waste management barriers and opportunities, timing, and needs for a preliminary set of required and optional strategies from the MPCA Policy Plan; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 24-368 (July 30, 2024), the County Board authorized release of the draft 2024-2042 Dakota County Solid Waste Management Plan (2024-2024 Management Plan) for a 30-day public review and comment period; and

WHEREAS, the 2024-2044 Management Plan incorporates input from stakeholder engagement, public review, the Dakota County Planning Commission, and the County Board; and

WHEREAS, the 2024-2024 Management Plan was developed in accordance with Minn. Stats. §§ 473.803 and 115A; and

WHEREAS, the 2024-2024 Management Plan communicates Dakota County's vision, policies, strategies, and tactics for solid waste management over the next 20 years; and

WHEREAS, the 2024-2024 Management Plan includes Policy Plan required strategies and optional strategies that meet the minimum point value; and

WHEREAS, tactics and timelines have been included as required by Minn. Stat. § 115A.46; and

WHEREAS, revised Metropolitan county master plans must be submitted to the MPCA Commissioner for review and approval; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 24-514 (October 29, 2024), the County Board authorized submittal of the draft 2024-2044 Management Plan, dated October 2024, to the MPCA for review and approval; and

WHEREAS, the MPCA Commissioner approved the 2024-2044 Management Plan on August 22, 2025; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends adoption of the 2024-2044 Management Plan; and

WHEREAS, implementation and costs will be determined annually as part of the County Board of Commissioners' work plan priorities and approval of the Environmental Resources Department budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the 2024-2044 Solid Waste Management Plan.

5.2 Authorization To Execute Contract With McKinstry Essention, LLC, For Energy Improvements Project Phase Two Investment Grade Audit

Motion: Mike Slavik Second: Laurie Halverson

Mike Lexvold, Facilities Management Director, presented this item and responded to questions.

Staff and commissioners discussed a \$155,500 contract for an audit to validate potential energy projects expected to generate positive cash flow, with savings from reduced electrical bills covering the debt service. Phase one of energy improvements, completed in early 2025, is projected to yield about \$304,000 in annual energy savings. A potential second phase could include additional solar installations on up to five additional facilities, as well as other energy improvements county-wide. This contract will help determine the feasibility of those projects. If the project is determined to be feasible, staff will return with a request to move forward with the identified projects and seek \$4 million in capital through either nonprofit loans backed by energy savings or other financing options. Commissioners acknowledged the risks of solar projects but noted current incentives and potential cost savings.

WHEREAS, Dakota County operates over 1.6 million square feet of buildings, consuming \$2,300,000 in annual energy expenses in 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Phase 1 Energy Improvements project converted over 14,000 lights to LED, added approximately one megawatt of solar across four sites, and completed HVAC retrocommissioning work at the Northern and Western Service Centers; and

WHEREAS, the lighting and HVAC work was completed over the course of 2024, with the solar coming online in February and March 2025; and

WHEREAS, countywide facilities' energy data from 2023 to 2024 showed a decrease in consumption of 7.7 percent and a cost reduction of 18 percent; and

WHEREAS, building on the success of Phase 1, staff have continued the partnership with McKinstry to explore options to maximize the County's return on investment in additional energy projects; and

WHEREAS, McKinstry reassessed all County facilities and another set of projects estimated to save an additional 10 to 15 percent on top of Phase 1 savings; and

WHEREAS, these include solar at five sites, mechanical upgrades at eight to 10 buildings, HVAC retrocommissioning at more than 15 buildings, and building envelope sealing at 15 to 20 buildings; and

WHEREAS, this scope is estimated to cost between \$4,000,000 to \$4,500,000 and represents the best value to the County for the work to be performed; and

WHEREAS, the next step in the process is to sign a contract for an Investment Grade Audit with McKinstry Essention, LLC to position the project to seek utility rebates and state and federal funding sources, which will shorten the project return on investment and increase the net present value.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Facilities Management Director to execute a contract in an amount not to exceed \$155,500 with McKinstry Essention, LLC, to perform an Investment Grade Audit for Phase 2, subject to approval by the County Attorney's Office as to form.

5.3 Approval Of 2026 Proposed Eligible Projects List To Be Released For County Transportation Sales And Use Tax Funds Public Hearing

Jake Chapek, Assistant County Engineer, presented this item and responded to questions.

Staff and commissioners reviewed the proposed project list for eligible Transportation Sales and Use Tax proceeds. The list includes transportation maintenance facilities, county highway projects, trunk highway projects that impact county roads, transit service expansion, and regional trail projects. Current cost estimates were also provided. Based on the current draft Capital Improvement Program and the eligible list, staff estimate that the balance of Sales and Use funds will drop to roughly \$500,000 in 2030 before rebounding to around \$17.5M by the end of the ten-year project list. The draft project list maintains a Sales and Use Tax balance well above the County Board's established threshold (-\$100,000,000) to trigger further discussion on potentially increasing the Sales and Use Tax.

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 297A.993 (the Act) authorizes the Dakota County Board to levy up to one-half of one percent sales and use tax and an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle to fund statutorily defined transportation and transit projects; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 17-364 (June 20, 2017), the Dakota County Board enacted a quarter-cent sales tax and \$20 excise tax on new vehicle sales starting October 1, 2017, to fund identified transitway, transit expansion, regional County highway, trail, and trunk highway transportation projects; and

WHEREAS, staff has identified a proposed updated list of transportation projects eligible for Transportation Sales and Use Tax funds based on the needs identified in the Draft 2040 Transportation Plan and through the development of the 2026-2030 Draft Capital Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, Board approval of the proposed eligible list for utilization of the Transportation Sales and Use Tax will allow for a public hearing to be scheduled: and

WHEREAS, the Act allows the County Board to dedicate the proceeds of the Transportation Sales and Use Tax to a new enumerated project or projects by resolution after a public hearing; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends approval of the proposed eligible project list to be released for Dakota County's Transportation Sales and Use Tax Funds public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Sales and Use Tax Funds public hearing will be held on December 2, 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the proposed eligible project list to be released for the Dakota County's Transportation Sales and Use Tax Funds public hearing.

Adoption Of Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Adopt the Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resource Management Plan.

SUMMARY

By Resolution No. 17-274 (May 23, 2019), the County Board adopted the Dakota County Natural Resources Management System Plan, which demonstrates a need to develop Natural Resource Management Plans (NRMP) for all County Parks, Greenways, and Conservation Easements.

By Resolution No. 20-568 (November 17, 2020), the County Board adopted the Land Conservation Plan, which aims to improve County coordination and collaboration with other agencies and organizations regarding land protection and long-term natural resource management.

By Resolution No. 99-526 (September 21, 1999), the County Board adopted the Mississippi River Greenway master plan, which established a 28-mile preferred alignment from St. Paul to downtown Hastings.

A consultant was hired to develop a draft of the first NRMP for the Mississippi River Greenway. There are plans to potentially extend the greenway southeast along County Road 54 to the Goodhue County border, which would add approximately 9.5 miles of trail. The public lands along the greenway are owned by Dakota County, the Cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings. A stakeholder meeting was held on October 16, 2024, to solicit input on the NRMP. Participants included staff from the cities of South St. Paul, Inver Grove Heights, and Hastings, as well as staff from Mississippi Park Connection and the National Park Service.

The NRMP addresses the natural resource inventory, future vegetative cover goals, and recommended projects developed in cooperation with landowner partners. Ecologists conducted field work and identified 22 natural area nodes. These nodes were selected because they contain existing natural areas or parks where opportunities exist to increase habitat. Trail corridors between these nodes were also surveyed. An estimate of \$2,389,000 in projects was identified. \$589,000 has been secured, to date, from an Environment and Natural Resource Trust Fund Grant and a Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant to begin implementing the recommendations in the plan. External grant funding will be used to fund additional restoration projects, and grant match and cost share fiscal impacts will be established and individually brought to the County Board for review in the form of future joint powers agreements between partners prior to

project implementation.

The draft NRMP was presented to the Dakota County Planning Commission on June 26, 2025, at which time it voted to recommend to the Dakota County Board of Commissioners to release the draft plan for public review. By Resolution No. 25-360 (July 29, 2025), the County Board authorized the Mississippi River Greenway NRMP be released for a 30-day community review period, which occurred from July 29 through August 29, 2025. No comments were received from the public during the comment period.

During this time, County staff gave presentations about the NRMP to the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission of Inver Grove Heights (August 13) and to the Rosemount Parks and Natural Resources Commission (August 18).

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends adoption of the Mississippi River Greenway Natural Resources Management Plan

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

To date, \$589,000 has been secured for restoration projects. The implementation of restoration projects within an NRMP will continue to rely on external funds. Parks staff will not initiate these activities without secured external funding and will continue to come to the board to award each contract for restoration. Ongoing maintenance of the restored areas, with costs ranging from \$536/acre along the River to River Greenway to \$198/acre in Miesville Ravine Park Reserve, are budgeted annually in the Environmental Legacy Fund (ELF). External dollars to fund maintenance of restored areas will also be pursued to supplement and/or supplants ELF for these activities.

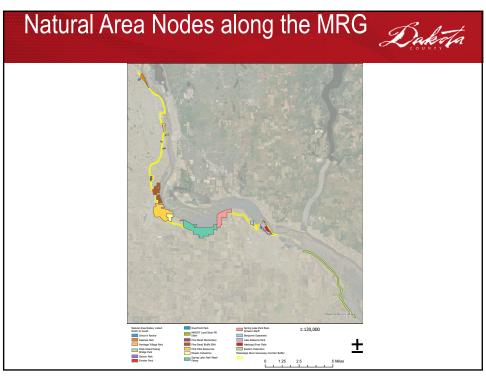
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Vision For Dakota County Parks

- Follow up maintenance has relied on Environmental Legacy Fund (ELF).



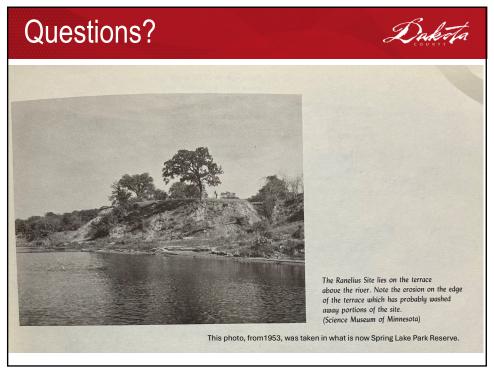

TITLE

Approval Of Unified Schematic Design And Authorization To Amend Professional Services Contract With ALLiiANCE For Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment Project

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Approve the unified schematic design for Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment as presented and authorize a second contract amendment with ALLiiANCE for the Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment.

SUMMARY

Improvements were completed at the Empire Maintenance Facility in 2020. These included additions to the West Building, changes to the East Building, and the creation of a new South Building. Due to budget constraints, not all of the South Building program was constructed. With the unmet needs previously identified, an addition to the South Building was included in the 2024-2028 Facilities Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget and its design funded in 2024.

In August of 2023, the schematic design was completed for the newly acquired Hampton property. During review, the County Board requested that Hampton facility not proceed. The County Board directed staff to present an alternate to the Hampton facility, which would meet its objectives of closing the existing Hastings and Farmington Shops through a phased approach.

ALLiiANCE was authorized by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners by Resolution No. 24-147 (March 26, 2024) to develop concept options and then, to develop a unified schematic design by Resolution No. 24-564 (December 3, 2024).

ALLiiANCE has worked with staff to develop a unified schematic design that achieves the project goals which was presented to the Physical Development Committee of the Whole on October 14, 2025 (Attachment: Presentation Slides). This action will increase the architect's fee to complete design in 2027, then bid work and construct in 2028.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends authorization to complete the design of an approximate 53,400 square foot storage addition to the South Building (Phase 1), to be constructed by mid-2029 with an estimated total project cost of \$21,050,000. Staff also recommends amending the professional services contract with ALLiiANCE to finish the design of this addition, which will be funded by Sales and Use Tax dollars.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The 2023 Facilities CIP Adopted Budget authorized \$250,000 of County funds for this project and the 2024 Facilities CIP Adopted Budget authorized another \$2,500,000 of Transportation Sales and Use Tax (SUT) for this project, bringing the current total project budget to \$2,750,000. The increased architectural fee of \$1,050,000 will be paid for with the SUT dollars. The construction work for the Empire Maintenance Facility Redevelopment will be funded with SUT pending County Board direction in future Facilities Capital Improvement Programs.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Improvements were completed at the Empire Maintenance Facility in 2020, including only part of the proposed South Building due to budget constraints; and

WHEREAS, with unmet needs identified, an addition to the South Building was included in the 2024-2028 Facilities Capital Improvement Program Adopted Budget and partially funded in 2024; and

WHEREAS, a previously proposed project to develop a new maintenance facility in Hampton was not approved to proceed; and

WHEREAS, the County Board instead directed staff to develop and present an alternate to the Hampton facility that would meet its objectives of closing the existing Hastings and Farmington Shops through a phased approach; and

Update On Right Of Way Acquisition And Direction On Alignment For Veterans Memorial Greenway

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Provide right of way acquisition updates and alignment analysis for the Veterans Memorial Greenway, County Project (CP) P00147.

SUMMARY

Dakota County is proceeding with Veterans Memorial Greenway County Project P00147 to construct approximately two miles of shared-use regional trail, including a bridge over Trunk Highway 3, with construction planned for 2025. Phase II of this project is being funded in part through federal funds, which require timely acquisition of right of way easements for authorization of project bidding.

County Project P00147 requires the acquisition of permanent regional trail easements and temporary construction easements over private property to accommodate trail construction and associated grading, restoration, and retaining wall construction. The Dakota County Board of Commissioners previously authorized acquisition through direct negotiation for four parcels by Resolution No. 24-594 (December 3, 2024). Easement acquisitions from the cities of Eagan and Inver Grove Heights for trail construction and maintenance on city property were also necessary.

The Dakota County Board of Commissioners directed staff at the July 22, 2025, Physical Development Committee meeting to investigate alternative alignments in front of the three remaining private properties along Atlantic Hills Drive that still require acquisition agreements. The Veterans Memorial Greenway Master Plan approved alignment, and staff recommended alignment, has completed final engineering, survey, and right-of-way activities behind the houses, and is also located within the existing 200-foot-wide Xcel Energy transmission line easement.

Since that time, updated survey and final design have modified the easement areas, and negotiations with property owners have continued. Easement acquisitions on city parcels have been successfully concluded. Acquisition of easements from Parcel 6 (Church of St. Thomas Becket) have also been successfully negotiated and concluded. Further offers and negotiations have not resulted in settlements for easements on Parcels 3, 4, and 5. These three parcels are the last remaining acquisition needs for the project to move forward.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The project has \$5,000,000 in secured State Bonding from the 2020 legislative session, \$5,000,000 in State Bonding from the 2023 legislative session, \$4,995,000 in Federal Congressional Directed funds, and \$1,000,000 federal appropriation for the Highway 3 grade-separated bridge. Successful completion of this project relies upon the \$5,995,000 Federal Congressionally Directed Spending allocation, which has September 30, 2026, expiration dates. The state bonding awards and federal appropriations included language that the funds will be used for acquisition of land and right-of-way, design, engineering, and construction for the Veterans Memorial Greenway, including pedestrian safety-related improvements, memorials, a community gathering space, and a new trail connection between Lebanon Hills Regional Park and the Mississippi River Greenway.
