Public Hearing To Receive Comments On 2026 Off-Sale Intoxicating Liquor License Applications And Approval Of 2026 Intoxicating Liquor Licenses

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Conduct a public hearing to receive comments on 2026 off-sale intoxicating liquor license applications and approve the 2026 intoxicating liquor licenses.

SUMMARY

County Ordinance 101 and state law require a public hearing to be held for all off-sale intoxicating liquor license applications. Two applicants applied for a 2026 off-sale intoxicating liquor license:

- Simman, LLC (dba Castle Rock Bar and Grill) applied for renewal of on and off-sale and Sunday sales intoxicating liquor license, and
- Woody's Liquor Box Inc. applied for renewal of off-sale intoxicating liquor license.

Notice of the public hearing was sent to all interested parties, Castle Rock Township Clerk, Randolph Township Clerk, and published in the County's Official Newspaper.

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 340A403, Dakota County is authorized to issue licenses for off-sale and on-sale licenses for the sale of 3.2 percent malt liquor within the County, and pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 340A.402, 405, Dakota County is authorized to issue licenses for on-sale and off-sale intoxicating liquor to qualifying establishments in the unorganized territories of the County. A county may not issue or renew a retail license to sell any alcoholic beverages until the County Board has received a written recommendation from the Sheriff and County Attorney stating that to the best of their knowledge the applicant is eligible to be licensed under Minn. Stat. § 304A.402. The Sheriff and County Attorney certify that as of this date, the following applicants satisfy the liquor license eligibility requirements. The applications have also been approved by the Townships in which they are located.

Public Hearing To Receive Comments On Eligible Projects For County Transportation Sales And Use Tax Funds

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Conduct a public hearing to receive comments on revisions to the list of transportation projects eligible for County Transportation Sales and Use Tax (SUT) funds and approve list of eligible projects for SUT funds.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient multi-modal transportation system, Dakota County identifies priority transportation projects needed to improve safety and mobility. To provide adequate funding for priority transportation projects, Dakota County enacted a quarter-cent sales tax and \$20 excise tax on new vehicle sales, effective October 1, 2017, by Resolution No.17-364 (June 20, 2017). The transportation SUT is authorized by Minn. Stat. § 297A.993 (The Act). The Act requires the County Board to designate the transportation projects that will use the Transportation SUT following a public hearing.

The SUT may be used on more than one project and may be dedicated to a new project by resolution after a public hearing (Attachment: Minn. Stat. § 297A.993).

The funds generated by the Transportation SUT have been identified for use on a list of transportation projects, including transportation maintenance facilities, transit, County highways, regional trails, and trunk highways. The proposed list of eligible projects requires an update to represent projected future transportation system needs identified in the 2040 Transportation Plan and included in the Draft 2026-2030 County Manager's Recommended Budget and Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The revised list of projects (Attachment: Draft SUT Project List) includes the following changes:

- Eliminating projects that have since been completed.
- Updating total project cost estimates and descriptions where new information is available.
- Adding highway and regional trail projects that were identified as needs in development of the Draft 2026-2030 County Manager's Recommended Budget and CIP.

The Transportation SUT generated approximately \$24 million in 2024. Revenues from the SUT over the next 10 years would not be sufficient to fund all projects on the SUT-eligible project list without external funding and cost share from partner agencies.

By Resolution No. 25-497 (October 21, 2025), the County Board scheduled a public hearing for December 2, 2025, to receive comments on the proposed list of eligible projects for the Transportation SUT. The public hearing was advertised in the *Hastings Journal* on November 13, November 20, and November 27, 2025 (Attachment: Public Hearing Notice), with additional information posted on the Dakota County website.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Dakota County Board of Commissioners conduct the public hearing to receive comments on the revised list of transportation projects eligible for Transportation SUT funds and approve the list of eligible projects after consideration of any public comments received.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

Adopting the proposed updates to the Transportation SUT-eligible project list ensures that the Draft 2026-2030 CIP is consistent with the SUT project list. Not all projects on the SUT-eligible project list are included in the five-year CIP. Projects on the list will be added to future CIPs as project development advances and external funding is secured.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 297A.993 (the Act) authorizes the Dakota County Board to levy up to onehalf of one percent sales and use tax and an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle to fund statutorily defined transportation and transit projects; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 17-364 (June 20, 2017), the Dakota County Board enacted a quartercent sales tax and \$20 excise tax on new vehicle sales, effective October 1, 2017, to fund identified transitway, transit expansion, regional County highway, trail, and trunk highway transportation projects; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County has identified a proposed updated list of transportation projects eligible for Transportation Sales and Use Tax funds based on the needs identified in the Draft 2040 Transportation Plan and through the development of the 2026-2030 Draft Capital Improvement Program; and

WHEREAS, the Act allows the County Board to dedicate the proceeds of the Transportation Sales and Use Tax to a new enumerated project by resolution after a public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the County Board held a public hearing on the date hereof following the publication of notice as required by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners dedicates the proceeds of the Dakota County Transportation Sales and Use Tax to the following projects:

297A.993 COUNTY TRANSPORTATION SALES AND USE TAX.

Subdivision 1. **Authorization; rates.** Notwithstanding section 297A.99, subdivisions 1, 2, 3, 5, and 13, or 477A.016, or any other law, the board of a county, or more than one county acting under a joint powers agreement, may by resolution of the county board, or each of the county boards, following a public hearing impose (1) a transportation sales tax at a rate of up to one-half of one percent on retail sales and uses taxable under this chapter, and (2) an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle, as defined in section 297B.01, subdivision 11, purchased or acquired from any person engaged in the business of selling motor vehicles at retail, occurring within the jurisdiction of the taxing authority.

- Subd. 2. **Allocation; termination.** The proceeds of the taxes must be dedicated exclusively to: (1) payment of the capital cost of a specific transportation project or improvement; (2) payment of the costs, which may include both capital and operating costs, of a specific transit project or improvement; (3) payment of the capital costs of a safe routes to school program under section 174.40; (4) payment of transit operating costs; or (5) payment of the capital cost of constructing buildings and other facilities for maintaining transportation or transit projects or improvements. The transportation or transit project or improvement must be designated by the board of the county, or more than one county acting under a joint powers agreement. Except for taxes for operating costs of a transit project or improvement, or for transit operations, the taxes must terminate when revenues raised are sufficient to finance the project. Nothing in this subdivision prohibits the exclusive dedication of the proceeds of the taxes to payments for more than one project or improvement. After a public hearing a county may, by resolution, dedicate the proceeds of the tax for a new enumerated project.
- Subd. 2a. **Uses reporting.** A metropolitan county, as defined in section 473.121, subdivision 4, that imposes the taxes under this section must annually submit financial information to the commissioner of transportation as provided under section 174.065 in the manner and by the dates prescribed by the commissioner.
- Subd. 3. **Administration, collection, enforcement.** The administration, collection, and enforcement provisions in section 297A.99, subdivisions 4 and 6 to 12, apply to all taxes imposed under this section.
- Subd. 4. **Bonds.** (a) A county may, by resolution, authorize, issue, and sell its bonds, notes, or other obligations for the purposes specified in subdivision 2. The county may also, by resolution, issue bonds to refund the bonds issued pursuant to this subdivision.
- (b) The bonds may be limited obligations, payable solely from or secured by taxes levied under this section, and the county may also pledge its full faith, credit, and taxing power as additional security for the bonds. A regional railroad authority within the county may also pledge its taxing powers as additional security for the bonds.
- (c) A county may issue and sell bonds in one or more series and without an election. The county may determine how the bonds shall be secured; how the bonds will bear interest, and the rate or rates, or variable rate; the rank or priority; how the bonds will be executed and be payable, and how they will mature; and how the bonds will be subject to any defaults, redemptions, repurchases, tender options, or other terms. The county may also determine how the bonds shall be sold.
- (d) The county may enter into and perform all contracts deemed necessary or desirable by it to issue and secure the bonds, including an indenture of trust with a trustee located within or outside of the state.
- (e) Before issuing bonds qualifying under this section, the county must publish a notice of its intention to issue the bonds and the date and time of a hearing to obtain public comment on the matter. The notice

must be published in the official newspaper of the county or in a newspaper of general circulation in the county. The notice must be published at least 14, but not more than 28, days before the date of the hearing.

- (f) Any project financed with bonds issued under this section must be included in a capital improvement plan as defined in section 373.40, subdivision 3. For purposes of this paragraph, "project" means any project described in subdivision 2, notwithstanding section 373.40, subdivision 1, paragraph (b).
- (g) Except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, the bonds must be issued and sold in the manner provided under chapter 475.

Dakota County Transportation Sales and Use Tax

The Dakota County Transportation Sales and Use Tax fund provides investments in regional and multimodal transportation projects as part of the broader county transportation system. The funds are collected through a quarter-cent sales tax and \$20 excise tax on new vehicle sales authorized under Minn. Stat. §297A.993. The tax was enacted by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners on October 1, 2017.

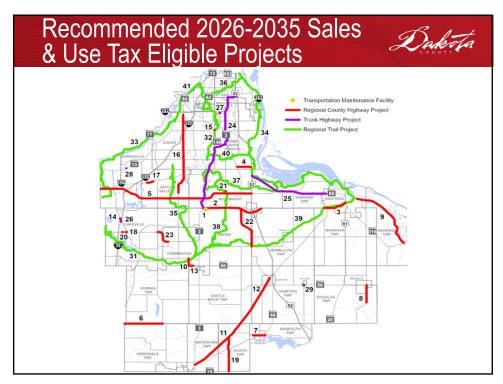

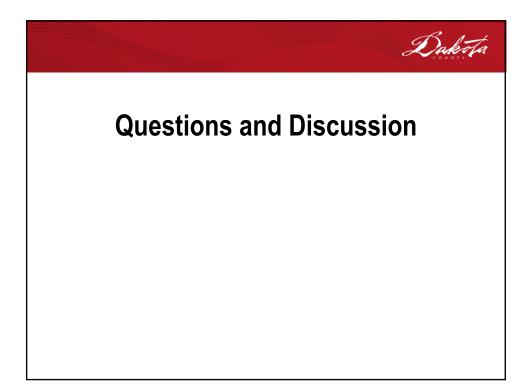

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Conduct a public hearing to receive comments regarding the County Manager's Recommended 2026 -2030 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Budget.

SUMMARY

The Dakota County CIP forecasts priorities and budgets for the capital needs of the County for the next five years. The CIP document is a planning tool, but expenditures presented in the first year will be consistent with the County's 2026 Adopted CIP Budget. The County Board is scheduled to consider the adoption of the 2026 Budget at its December 16, 2025, County Board meeting.

By Resolution No. 25-472 (October 7, 2025), the County Board authorized staff to submit the draft CIP to cities and townships for comments. Dakota County sent a letter to the cities and townships requesting their comments by November 14, 2025. Comments on those letters are included in Attachment: DRAFT 2026-2030 Dakota County Capital Improvement Comments and Responses. In addition, the County Board reviewed the draft 2026-2030 CIP on November 18, 2025, at the Budget Workshop.

Minn. Stat. § 373.40, subd. 3, requires the County to conduct a public hearing prior to the adoption of the County Manager's Recommended CIP. The CIP Public Hearing was scheduled by Resolution No. 24-476 (September 24, 2024) and was advertised on November 13 and November 20, 2025, in the Hastings Journal and the County's Website.

The 2026 County Manager's Recommended Budget will establish authority for the first year of the proposed 2026-2030 CIP Budget. The 2026 County Manager's Recommended CIP Budget totals \$143,314,072 (including Regional Rail Authority), and the five-year total is \$896,758,509.

WHEREAS, the Facilities Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget authorized the Recycling Zone Plus project; and

WHEREAS, the Recycling Zone Plus facility will be a 19,765-square-foot facility providing space for the sorting of reuse products from household hazardous waste, sorting by hazard categories, packing, bulking, weighing, and safe storage of hazardous waste. After check-in, patrons will have the option to drop off scrap metal, paper/cardboard, and tires themselves and then either exit the site or proceed to a covered drop-off area where staff will receive materials, including batteries, oil, paints, fluorescent lamps, and other household chemicals and products; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County's and Scott County's existing household hazardous waste and recycling centers are insufficient to meet current and future needs. The two facilities properly manage almost seven million pounds of material per year from over 80,000 participants. Dakota County's facility already handles four times the capacity it was designed to accommodate, and Scott County's program growth is projected to be 325 percent by 2030; and

WHEREAS, a presentation of the schematic design work was shared for approval at the November 21, 2023, Physical Development Committee of the Whole Meeting; and

WHEREAS, bid documents and specifications were prepared by LHB and advertised on September 25, 2025; and

WHEREAS, bid documents were prepared by LHB, which included strategic alternates to provide options to the County Board for consideration; and

WHEREAS, eight competitive bids were received on October 16, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Ebert Inc. dba Ebert Companies, with a business address of 23350 Co Rd 10, Loretto, MN 55357, has submitted a bid of \$12,930,000 for the base bid, including Alternates No. 1, 3, 4a, 4b, and 4c; and

WHEREAS, staff and LHB reviewed the qualifications of the bidder and recommend award to Ebert Inc. as the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, in an amount not to exceed \$12,156,000, including Alternates No. 3, 4a,

and 4b for the Recycling Zone Plus project; and

WHEREAS, funding for the project is within the approved CIP Adopted Budget total of \$24,000,000.

WHEREAS, in 2025, Dakota County received \$116,726 from DCYF; and

WHEREAS, this is a \$2,744 (2.3%) increase from the 2024 allocation; and

WHEREAS, ratification to the Board was delayed due to uncertainty in the budget forecast that required additional clarification prior to proceeding; and

WHEREAS, the OER funds must not be used to supplant current state or local funding received for child protection services for children and families affected by addiction; and

WHEREAS, use of the funds should promote optimal health, safety, and well-being for families and their children; and

WHEREAS, counties can target prevention interventions and work with at-risk families, which may include the following program areas: child protection, child welfare, Pathways to Prosperity, Parent Support Outreach Program (PSOP), prenatal exposure cases, minor parents, truancy, children's mental health, and juvenile justice; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County's plan, which DCYF has approved, includes, but is not limited to, the following services: prevention, conventional, flexible spending, additional staff, and training; and

WHEREAS, conventional services are services for families impacted by substance use disorder which may include, but are not limited to family recovery programs, Family Dependency Treatment Court, Family Group Decision Making, culturally specific services, parent support groups, and family out-of-pocket expenses related to treatment services; and

WHEREAS, contracted services include street outreach, emergency shelter, permanent supportive housing, apartment services and services at eviction court; and

WHEREAS, services are funded by various funding sources; and

WHEREAS, to ensure continued high-quality services, Dakota County conducts a routine Request for Proposal (RFP) process every four years; and

WHEREAS, in 2025, staff issued an RFP for emergency shelter services; and

WHEREAS, a review committee from Social Services reviewed and scored proposals; and

WHEREAS, Dakota Woodlands currently receives funding from three Dakota County sources: Emergency Assistance through Dakota County Employment

and Economic Assistance, a pass-through grant from the Minnesota Department of Human Services, and county levy through Dakota County Social Services; and

WHEREAS, Dakota County leadership received a request from Dakota Woodlands for additional operating funding; and

WHEREAS, Ehlers Public Finance Advisors completed an analysis of the Dakota Woodlands finances and determined that it costs \$213 per family per day for Dakota Woodlands to provide shelter in additional to transportation, childcare, food, etc.; and

WHEREAs, the annual revenues support \$166 per family per day; and

WHEREAS, providing an additional \$300,000 per year from Local Affordable Housing Aid (LAHA) will help fill that gap while Dakota Woodlands pursues additional foundation support; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends executing a contract with Dakota Woodlands for emergency shelter services for the term and amount listed below:

- Term of contract: January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2027
- Not to exceed amount \$915,000 (190% increase from previous contract period)
- Funding Source: \$315,000 from County Levy and \$600,000 from LAHA
- In 2024, served 69 households

WHEREAS, staff will continue to review Dakota Woodlands services and their funding situation on an ongoing basis to ensure they are providing the support requested and are on stable financial footing.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 25-456 (September 23, 2025), the County Board adopted the 2024-2044 Dakota County Solid Waste Management Plan (Solid Waste Management Plan); and

WHEREAS, the Solid Waste Management Plan includes a tactic for continued collaboration and assistance with municipalities for residential food scraps drop-off sites; and

WHEREAS, the Solid Waste Management Plan includes a tactic to continue to provide food scrap drop-off sites and expand to areas not served by curbside organics collection (e.g., apartment complexes); and

WHEREAS, the Solid Waste Management Plan includes a strategy for curbside organics collection to be available in suburban areas by 2030; and

WHEREAS, the County receives Select Committee on Recycling and the Environment (SCORE) funds from the State of Minnesota to implement landfill abatement programs; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 115A.557 requires the County to use a portion of the State SCORE funds on organics programming; and

WHEREAS, State-allocated SCORE funds are used for residential food scraps drop-sites at 11 locations in the County; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 21-264 (May 18, 2021), Dakota County and the City of Mendota Heights executed a joint powers agreement (JPA) to operate a residential food scraps drop-off site until December 31, 2027; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 24-457 (September 24, 2024), due to several factors, including increased costs for compostable bags and organics hauling, Dakota County and the City of Mendota Heights amended the JPA; and

WHEREAS, due to several additional factors, including initial JPA term limits and increased operational costs due to continued growth in residential participation levels, a second amendment to the JPA is necessary; and

WHEREAS, the original JPA with the City of Mendota Heights was signed for \$28,500; and

WHEREAS, the first amendment to the JPA with the City of Mendota was signed for an additional \$29,000, for a JPA maximum total of \$57,500; and

WHEREAS, the proposed second amendment to the JPA in the amount of \$81,100 requires County Board approval and will bring the amended JPA maximum to a total of \$138,600 over the nine-year term (2021-2030); and

WHEREAS, staff recommends executing a second amendment to the existing JPA with the City of Mendota Heights for continued operations at the residential food scraps drop-off site, including for construction of an enclosure, until December 31, 2030, for a maximum total of \$138,600; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Resources Operating Budget includes funds to provide the County's food scraps drop-off program using State of Minnesota SCORE grant funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners herby authorizes the Physical Development Director to execute a joint powers agreement amendment with the City of Mendota Heights for residential food scraps drop-site operations through December 31, 2030, in an amount not to exceed \$138,600 for the total joint powers agreement, subject to the approval of the County Attorney's Office to form.

Authorization To Amend Obligated American Rescue Plan Act Funding To Reclassify Obligated Costs Between Projects

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize amendments to obligated American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act funding to reclassify obligated costs between projects.

SUMMARY

On March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act was signed into law in response to the unprecedented impacts of the COVID-19 health emergency on the economy, public health, state and local governments, individuals, and businesses. ARP provided various new funding sources for the County's relief and response efforts related to COVID-19.

Dakota County received State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) funds in the amount of \$83,332,300. To date, the County Board has obligated the entire award of \$83,332,300 to 20 eligible programs and projects.

On December 31, 2024, the County was required to obligate any unspent ARP funds to be used from January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2026. Current rules would require the County to return to the Treasury any ARP funds that have not been obligated by the deadline of December 31, 2024. The County would also be required to return any ARP funds not expended by December 31, 2026.

On December 3, 2024, the Finance Director presented a plan for obligation of all remaining funds at the Dakota County General Government and Policy Committee meeting.

On December 17, 2024, the Board approved the obligation of the remaining ARP Funding and authorized the related budgets.

During 2025, certain projects reported as a lump sum under revenue replacement in the quarterly Project and Expenditure (P&E) Reports were completed and did not fully expend the approved obligated amounts, while several projects exceed their approved obligated amount. The guidance for the SLFRF program indicates that recipients may reclassify SLFRF funds from the original activity to another project that would be eligible under SLFRF program rules.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend the Dakota County Board of Commissioners approve the amendment of obligations

to reclassify \$22,461 of unspent obligations from Attorney Staffing/Criminal Case Backlog to Emergency Shelter and \$25,690 of unspent obligations from Time Limited FASII Positions (EEA) to Mendota Youth Shelter, with the remaining \$61,477 of unspent obligations from Time Limited FASII Positions (EEA) going to the Emergency Shelter.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

There are no additional costs to the County because of this action. The amendments ensure the County fully expends funds on prior obligated projects so that unexpended federal ARP funds do not need to be returned to the Treasury after December 31, 2026.

TITLE

Authorization To Execute Contract Extension For Investment Portfolio Management

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the Deputy County Manager to execute contract extension with PTMA Asset Management, LLC (PTMA) for external investment portfolio management.

SUMMARY

Prudent management of public funds on behalf of the citizens of Dakota County is a County Board objective. Funds shall be invested in accordance with Minn. Stat. § 118A and County Policy 2254 to ensure safety, liquidity, and yield of the County's financial assets. Minn. Stat. § 118A.04 provides a list of types of securities in which local governments may invest public funds. Unrestricted public funds are limited to the securities available in the bond market and commercial paper that are fully insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. The portfolio will be actively managed to achieve growth of capital through appreciation of securities held and reinvestment of interest income.

Currently, the County utilizes three separate external investment partners for investment portfolio management. The current contracts are set to expire on December 31, 2025, with the option to extend individual contract for three one-year extensions. Staff recommend streamlining all external investment management responsibilities by consolidating them under PTMA, a single strategic partner. PTMA was chosen because it was the most cost-effective option and was successfully meeting its investment benchmark measures. The consolidation will allow Finance to streamline administrative oversight and reduce the complexity of compliance and reporting requirements. The consolidation also provides a more favorable unified fee structure. The consolidation of investment portfolio managers to a single manager is anticipated to save the County approximately \$60,000 in management fees annually.

This contract extension will provide investment portfolio management services to Dakota County's portfolio which will cost an estimated \$116,000 annually. This cost will vary based on the value of the County's portfolio throughout the year and PTMA's fee schedule.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend the Board authorize the Deputy County Manager to execute the option to extend the contract with PTMA for investment management services for the period of January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2026. Total expense will be based on the County's portfolio value according to PTMA's proposed fee schedule.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the Deputy County Manager to extend a contract with AGC Networks, Inc. dba Black Box, Inc. to support the Avaya telephony environment.

SUMMARY

In 2024, Dakota County Information Technology (IT) contracted AGC Networks, Inc.to support the Avaya environment for the Criminal Justice (CJDN) Departments including County Attorney's Office, County Sheriff's Office and Community Corrections. These departments need a different phone system to satisfy security requirements for accessing and using Criminal Justice Information (CJI). The County's Cisco Webex telephony platform is not approved by the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) for use of CJI.

Dakota County purchased a one-year support contract through AGC Networks, Inc. This support contract ends on December 31, 2025. Dakota County will be dependent on the Avaya system for the better part of 2026 as Dakota County IT begins a project to transition these County business units to a new telephony platform. The proposed new support contract for \$132,790 will provide support for Avaya phone system, Xima Chronicall reporting suite, Intrado E911 service, Enghouse Call Recording service, Audio Codes media gateway service and Blackbox support services through December 31, 2026.

Authorization To Purchase Annual Replacement Network Equipment For Dakota County Network

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the Deputy County Manager to purchase replacement networking equipment and contract for services to assist in replacing the network equipment to ensure continued connectivity of computers and telephones to Dakota County's core network resources.

SUMMARY

The Dakota County Information Technology (IT) Department operates hundreds of pieces of networking hardware in County facilities which connect computers and telephones to core network resources. Dakota County IT has implemented a regular schedule to proactively replace older equipment incrementally, thus keeping the network operational and spreading replacement costs out over several years.

Dakota County IT proposes to replace network equipment including:

- Switches (73) Switches connect devices in a network to each other and allow them to communicate by exchanging data.
- Professional Services to include assistance in replacing of the 73 network switches throughout the Dakota County service centers.

Dakota County IT has sought multiple quotes from the State Cooperative Contract T-653(5) for the proposed network equipment. Insight Public Sector provided the lowest quote of \$562,732.18 for the network equipment. The other quote received included Computer Discount Warehouse-Government (CDW-G) at \$565,959.33.

Dakota County IT sought a quote from Cablecloud LLC, d/b/a Telesystems, Inc. for assistance in replacing network equipment of \$23,990.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board authorize the Deputy County Manager to purchase the network hardware from Insight Public Sector for \$562,732.18 to upgrade aging network equipment and contract services to replace network equipment from Cablecloud LLC, d/b/a Telesystems, Inc. for \$23,990. The total cost of the project is \$586,722.18.

SUMMARY

The 2025 DPC joint powers agreement amends and supersedes the original 2003 JPA and the restated 2016 JPA for the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee JPA.

Established in 2003, the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee (DPC) is comprised of 11 cities within Dakota County and the County. The DPC is the governing entity responsible for coordinating response to large-scale disasters or emergencies within and outside of Dakota County and is responsible for maintaining the Special Operations Team (SOT). The SOT responds to large-scale disasters or emergencies within Dakota County and to external jurisdictions. SOT response operations include but are not limited to structural collapse, technical rope rescue, hazardous materials, wildland rescue, confined space rescue, trench rescue, water rescue, and vehicle/machinery disentanglement.

The DPC has completed a review of the current JPA and is proposing several administrative related changes to better align the document with the operations of the DPC. The proposed agreement has been reviewed and approved by the various city attorneys representing the membership and the County Attorney's Office. The JPA with the associated changes highlighted is included as an attachment. The JPA with the signature page is also included as an attachment.

RECOMMENDATION

The Office of Risk Management recommends the Board execute the 2025 Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee Joint Powers Agreement.

DOMESTIC PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE

2025 JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT

The parties to this Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") are units of government responsible for response to large-scale disasters or emergencies in their respective jurisdictions. This Agreement is made pursuant to the authority conferred upon the parties by Minnesota Statutes § 471.59. This Agreement amends and supersedes the FIRST AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT FOR THE DAKOTA COUNTY DOMESTIC PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE, 2016 JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT, and shall become effective only upon the approval and execution hereof by duly authorized officers of all parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, the undersigned governmental units, in the joint and mutual exercise of their powers, agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Name.</u> The Parties hereby establish the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee. ("Committee").
- 2. <u>Parties.</u> The Parties to this Agreement shall consist of the following entities:

City of Apple Valley

City of Burnsville

City of Eagan

City of Farmington

City of Hastings

City of Inver Grove Heights

City of Lakeville

City of Mendota Heights

City of Rosemount

City of South St. Paul

City of West St. Paul

County of Dakota

3. Purpose. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the joint exercise, of the Parties' powers to plan for and to respond to the need of first responders for special response operations caused by the occurrence of Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies, as defined in paragraph 10.2, both within Dakota County and to other jurisdictions external to Dakota County by providing assistance as requested pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Chapter 12. The joint exercise of the Parties' powers pursuant to this Agreement is intended to supplement and complement but not supplant the Parties' joint and individual powers to plan for and respond to the occurrence of other emergency or unforeseen events occurring within Dakota County, as provided in the Parties' respective emergency operations plans and similar plans.

4. Governance.

4.1 <u>Governing Board.</u> The governing board formed pursuant to this Agreement shall be known as the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee Board ("Board"). The Board shall be constituted as follows:

4.1.1 Voting Board Members.

One member and one alternate member appointed by each entity that is a Party to this Agreement listed in paragraph 2. Voting will be allocated as provided in paragraph 5.7.

4.1.2 **Non-Voting Board Members.**

All additional members, and other entities under contract shall be non-voting members of the Board and shall not be counted for quorum purposes.

- Representative of Dakota County Emergency Management.
- Representative of Dakota County City Managers / Administrators.
- Representative of Dakota County Emergency Medical Services Council.
- Representative of the Dakota County Special Operations Team.
- Representative of Dakota County Public Health.
- Representative of the Dakota County Attorney.
- Representative of Public Works Directors / Superintendents within Dakota County.
- Representative of Dakota 911.
- Representative of each entity that has entered into a contract pursuant to paragraph 8.2.1.
- 4.2 <u>Documentation.</u> Resolutions or other documentation of appointments shall be filed with Dakota County Emergency Management Division.
- 4.3 <u>Members not Employees.</u> Members of the Board or Committee shall not be deemed to be employees of the Committee and will not be compensated by the Committee for serving on the Committee.
- 4.4 <u>Terms; Vacancies.</u> Members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing Party and may be removed only by the appointing Party. Vacancies may be filled only by the appointing Party. Incumbent members serve until a successor has been appointed.

5 Meetings and Elected Officers.

- 5.1 In January of each year, the Board shall elect from its members a chair, vice-chair, and secretary to conduct its meetings and affairs. Officers shall serve for a term of one (1) year or until the officer ceases to be a board member, whichever is shorter. In the event of a vacancy mid-term, an appointment to fill the vacancy will be made during the next regular meeting of the Board.
- 5.2 <u>Chair.</u> The Chair shall preside over all meetings of the Board and shall perform other duties and functions as determined by the Board.
- 5.3 <u>Vice Chair.</u> The Vice-Chair shall preside over and act for the Board during the absence of the Chair.
- 5.4 <u>Secretary.</u> The Secretary shall assist the Chair in overseeing the keeping of the record of all proceedings of the Committee's actions.
- 5.5 <u>Treasurer.</u> A representative of Dakota County Emergency Management shall serve as Treasurer for the Committee. The Treasurer shall assist the Chair in overseeing the Committee's budget and finances.
- 5.6 <u>Meetings.</u> The Board shall schedule regular meetings at such times and places as the Board shall determine. No action may be taken unless a quorum is present. The presence of a majority of the Voting Members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. All meetings are subject to the Minnesota Open Meeting Law, Board Officers will be responsible for determining where all meeting notices and information will be posted.
 - 5.6.1 Special meetings may be held on reasonable notice by the Chair or Vice Chair. The presence of a majority of the voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. No action may be taken unless a quorum is present.
- 5.7 <u>Voting.</u> Each Voting Board Member shall be entitled to one (1) vote per Party. Proxy votes are not permitted. The Board shall function by a majority vote of the Board members present.

6 <u>Duties of the Committee.</u>

- 6.1 <u>Program.</u> The Board shall formulate a program to carry out the Committee's purpose. The Committee shall carry out and implement its programs to the extent possible. The program shall include the following:
 - 6.1.1 Promote the development and awareness of response plans and enhance the planning capabilities at all levels of government within Dakota County to prevent, respond to, and recover from Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives ("CBRNE") threats, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters.

- 6.1.2 Establish a process to efficiently use funding to address identified priorities with countywide benefits and meet all grant reporting requirements.
- 6.1.3 Promote the hardening and development of response preplans for critical public and private sector infrastructure within Dakota County based on risk and capability gaps.
- 6.1.4 Develop and enhance countywide capabilities to respond to the consequences of CBRNE threats, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters through training and equipment acquisition.
- 6.1.5 Demonstrate the countywide capacity and ability to respond to CBRNE events, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters through drills, tabletop and functional exercises.
- 6.1.6 Promote interoperability of emergency voice and data communications throughout Dakota County by incorporating interoperability into plans and exercises.
- 6.1.7 Promote the public's understanding of emergency warning and notification capabilities within Dakota County.
- 6.1.8 Promote the development of plans and exercises to ensure the continuity of county and local governments.
- 6.1.9 Promote the capability of Dakota County's and the cities' Emergency Operations Centers ("EOCs") to manage, communicate, and coordinate in the event of CBRNE events, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters.
- 6.1.10 Identify and develop agreements to render mutual aid with political subdivisions outside of Dakota County pursuant to Minnesota Statute §12.27.
- 6.1.11 Develop a process for requesting and to provide for rendering local assistance to other political subdivisions outside of Dakota County upon request pursuant to Minnesota Statutes §12.29, 12.33, 12.331, 12.37, and any other applicable laws enabling an emergency aid response.

6.2 Special Operations Team.

6.2.1 <u>Establishment.</u> The Committee shall establish a Special Operations Team ("SOT") with the capability of providing specialized response operations for which specific training and equipment are required, and which are not currently available to all the Parties. The Committee will ensure that the SOT is established, that its members are trained to applicable federal and state standards, and that the necessary and appropriate equipment is purchased and made available for use by the SOT.

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- 6.2.2 <u>Procedures.</u> The Committee will ensure that procedures are established so that the SOT is able to respond to Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies occurring anywhere within the jurisdictions of the Parties to this Agreement. Procedures of the SOT are subject to the review and approval of the Board.
- 6.2.3 <u>Members.</u> The Parties agree to assign employees and make equipment available to the SOT. Members of the SOT will remain employees of their employing agency and will not be deemed employees of the Committee, the Board, or the SOT.
- 6.2.4 <u>Team Manager.</u> The Board shall appoint a Team Manager who will be responsible for ensuring that the Committee accomplishes the duties described in paragraph 6.2. The Team Manager is authorized to make budgeted expenditures in accordance with the Dakota County Procurement Policy. The Team Manager shall be an employee of a Party.
- 6.3 <u>Subcommittees.</u> The Board may create subcommittees to carry out the duties of the Committee as needed to support the Committee. The actions of all subcommittees are subject to approval by the Board.
- Reservation of Authority. All responsibilities not specifically set out to be jointly exercised by the Committee under this Agreement are hereby reserved to the Parties and each of them.

8 Powers of the Committee.

8.1 <u>General Powers.</u> The Committee is hereby authorized to exercise such authority as is necessary and proper to fulfill its purposes and perform its duties. Such authority shall include the specific powers enumerated in paragraph 8.2.

8.2 Specific Powers.

- 8.2.1 The Committee may enter into any contract necessary or proper for the exercise of its powers or the fulfillment of its duties and enforce such contracts to the extent available in equity or at law with units of local government in Dakota County that are not Parties to this Agreement, to provide such entities with the opportunity to assign members to the SOT. The Committee may approve any contract relating to this Agreement up to the amount approved in the annual budget and may authorize the Chair to execute those contracts. No payment on any contract invoice shall be authorized unless approved by at least two (2) of the three (3) officers elected pursuant to paragraph 5.1. The Treasurer shall report to the Board any such payments at its next meeting.
- 8.2.2 The Committee may disburse funds in a manner that is consistent with this Agreement and with the method provided by law for the disbursement of funds by Dakota County.

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- 8.2.3 The Committee may apply for and accept gifts, grants, or loans of money or other property or assistance from the United States government, the State of Minnesota, or any person, association, or agency for any of its purposes; enter into any agreement in connection therewith; and hold, use and dispose of such money or other property and assistance in accordance with the terms of the gift, grant or loan relating thereto.
- 8.2.4 The Committee shall maintain liability coverage for the actions of the Committee with the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust ("LMCIT") with a limit of coverage equal to or greater than the liability limits under Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466, under standard LMCIT liability coverage forms. The Committee shall also obtain tail coverage following termination of the Agreement to cover the statute of limitations during which a claim could be made against the Committee. Such insurance shall name each Party as a covered party. The Committee may in its discretion procure coverage for automobile liability and damage to or loss of property.
- 8.2.5 All powers granted herein shall be exercised by the Committee in a fiscally responsible manner and in accordance with the requirements of law. The purchasing and contracting requirements of Dakota County shall apply to the Committee.

9 Budgeting and Funding.

- 9.1 <u>Budget Adoption.</u> By April 30th of each year, the Board shall adopt an annual work plan and operating and capital budgets for the following calendar year including a statement of the sources of funding.
- 9.2 <u>Budget and Accounting Services.</u> Dakota County agrees to provide all budgeting and accounting services necessary or convenient for the Committee. Such services shall include but not be limited to management of all funds, payment for contracted services and other purchases, and relevant bookkeeping and recordkeeping. Dakota County contracting and purchasing requirements shall apply to transactions of the Committee.
- 9.3 Expenses. The Parties understand and acknowledge that the activities and duties of the Committee are to be funded first by grant monies from the federal government, state government, or other associations and agencies. Nevertheless, the Parties agree to contribute to funding, if necessary, for the expenses of the Committee, to the extent not covered by grant funds. Each Party agrees annually to appropriate funds for the expenses of the Committee not covered by grant funds, on a population basis, subject to each city council's or the county board's adoption of a resolution authorizing any such appropriation. For purposes of this paragraph, each Party's population would be calculated to include the city(s) and/or township(s) they provide police protection for. Population basis means the most current decennial federal census or the most recent Metropolitan Council population estimate, whichever is the most recent.

- 9.4 Federal and State Grant Funds Available to Counties. The Parties understand and acknowledge that federal and state grant funds have been and may continue to be made available for improving and enhancing local government units' capabilities in responding to the occurrence of Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies. The Parties further understand and acknowledge that some such federal and state grant funds may be made available directly to counties with the intention that the funds be expended for the benefit also of cities within the county. Dakota County specifically agrees that federal and state grant funds for such purposes which the Dakota County Board of Commissioners, pursuant to Committee recommendation and proposed budget, applies for and receives will be applied for and received on behalf of the cities who are Parties to this Agreement and will be appropriated to the Committee for expenditure in accordance with the terms of the applicable grant agreement and budget approved by the County Board. The Committee will expend any such funds only in accordance with the terms of any applicable grant agreement, approved budget, laws, and rules. This paragraph does not prohibit Dakota County from unilaterally applying for, receiving, and expending grant funds made available for the purposes identified in this paragraph.
- 9.5 <u>Accountability.</u> All funds shall be accounted for according to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP"). A report on all receipts and disbursements shall be forwarded to the Parties in advance of each Committee meeting and on an annual basis.

10 Special Operations Team Activation and Use.

10.1 <u>Purpose.</u> The purpose of this section is to provide for the deployment of the SOT established pursuant to paragraph 6.2, so that the SOT may be utilized by any Party to this Agreement in the event of a Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency within their jurisdiction. It is not the purpose of this section to provide for or address in any way requests by one Party of another Party for other services, or to supplant other mutual aid agreements to which any of the Parties may be signatory.

10.2 <u>Definitions.</u>

- <u>SOT Manager</u> the person designated by the Board who is responsible for exercising tactical control of personnel and equipment provided by the SOT.
- <u>Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency</u> an unforeseen exigent circumstance requiring specialized response operations.
- <u>Requesting Party</u> a Party to this Agreement who has requested that the SOT provide specialized response operations.
- <u>Special Operations Team (SOT)</u> a group of personnel assigned by the Parties who will be trained and organized to provide special response operations to any Party who requests them, and which may include personnel of other entities that have entered into an agreement with the Committee pursuant to paragraph 8.2.1.

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- <u>Specialized Response Operations</u> specialized rescue services for problem-specific emergencies, including, but not limited to structural collapse, technical rope rescue, hazardous materials, wildland rescue, confined space rescue, trench rescue, water rescue, vehicle/machinery disentanglement, and the like, including training events for such services.
- 10.3 Requests for Assistance by a Party to the Committee. Whenever a Party, in its sole discretion, determines that the conditions within its jurisdiction cannot be adequately addressed by that jurisdiction because of a Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency, the Party may request orally or in writing that the SOT provide specialized response operations to the Party.
 - 10.3.1 Emergency Management Assistance Compact ("EMAC"). The SOT Manager may submit a Mission Ready Package ("MRP") in response to an EMAC request after consultation and approval from the Chair or Vice-Chair.
- 10.4 Requests for Assistance through Mutual Aid Agreement. For any Mutual Aid Agreement that the Committee is party to, requests for aid from the Committee shall be made by following the terms for activation as outlined and identified in the specific Joint Powers Agreement.
- 10.5 Requests for Assistance by Political Subdivisions Outside of Dakota County. Any political subdivision from outside of Dakota County in order to request assistance from the Committee, shall follow the Committee procedure developed for rendering local assistance to other political subdivisions outside of Dakota County, consistent with the requirements of Minnesota Statutes §12.29, 12.33, 12.331, 12.37, and any other applicable laws regarding requesting emergency aid response from a political subdivision.
- 10.6 Response to Request for Assistance from a Party to the Committee. Upon a request for assistance of the Committee, the SOT Manager, or designee, may authorize, direct, and permit the SOT to assist the requesting Party following the SOT activation process. Whether the SOT shall provide such assistance, and the extent of such assistance, shall be determined by the SOT Manager, or designee. Failure to provide assistance in response to a request made pursuant to this Agreement will not result in any liability to the SOT or to any other Party. The SOT Manager, or designee, shall notify the Chair or Vice-Chair any time consent to assist a governmental unit, is granted.
- 10.7 <u>Recall of Assistance.</u> The SOT Manager, or designee, may at any time and in its sole judgment terminate and recall the SOT or any part thereof. The decision to recall the SOT provided pursuant to this Agreement will not result in liability to the SOT.
- 10.8 <u>Direction and Control.</u> Personnel and equipment of the SOT shall remain under the direction and control of the SOT Manager.

10.9 <u>Exercise of Police Power.</u> Any member of the SOT who is a licensed peace officer and who is assisting pursuant to this Agreement has the full and complete authority of a peace officer as though appointed by the requesting Party and licensed by the State of Minnesota provided the officer meets the requirements set forth at Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, subds. 12(1) and (2).

10.10 Compensation.

- 10.10.1 Parties to this Agreement. When the SOT provides services to a requesting Party, the personnel of the SOT shall be compensated by their respective employers just as if they were performing the duties within and for the jurisdiction of their appointing Party. Except as provided in paragraph 10.10.2., no charges will be levied by the Committee for specialized response operations provided to a requesting Party pursuant to this Agreement unless that assistance continues for a period exceeding twenty-four (24) consecutive hours. If assistance provided pursuant to this Agreement continues for more than twenty-four (24) consecutive hours, the Committee shall submit to the requesting Party an itemized bill for the actual cost of any assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials, and supplies incurred following the initial 24-hour period. The requesting Party shall reimburse the Committee for the billed amount. When received by the Committee those funds will be paid out to each appropriate entity in the amounts documented in the itemized bill.
- 10.10.2 Private Third Parties. In the event that the SOT is activated and deployed at the request of a Party to this Agreement, to provide specialized response operations at a Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency for which a private third party may bear financial responsibility, the Committee shall submit to the requesting Party without delay an itemized bill for the actual cost of assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials, and supplies. The requesting Party shall reimburse the Committee its proportionate share of funds received from any private third party, if any, for the full cost of the assistance.
- 10.11 <u>Workers' Compensation.</u> Each Party to this Agreement shall be responsible for injuries to or death of its employees. Each Party shall maintain workers' compensation coverage or self-insurance coverage, covering its personnel while they are assisting a member of the SOT. Each Party to this Agreement waives the right to sue any other Party for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its employee or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other Party or its officers, employees, or agents.
- 10.12 <u>Damage to Equipment.</u> Each Party shall be responsible for damage to or loss of its equipment occurring during deployment of the SOT. Each Party waives the right to sue any other Party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other Party or its officers, employees, or agents.

11 <u>Liability.</u>

The Committee is a separate and distinct public entity to which the Parties have transferred all responsibility and control for actions taken pursuant to this Agreement.

With the exception of workers' compensation liability, which is addressed in paragraph 10.11 of this Agreement, the Committee shall defend and indemnify the Parties, and their officers, employees, volunteers, and agents, from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees, arising from Committee activities or operations, including deployments of the SOT, and decisions of the Committee.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, actions by the Parties to this Agreement are intended to be and shall be construed as a "cooperative activity" and the Parties intend that they shall be deemed a "single governmental unit" for the purposes of liability, as outlined in Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, subd. 1a (a), provided further that for purposes of that statute, each Party to this Agreement expressly declines responsibility for the acts or omissions of any other Party. The Parties to this Agreement shall not be liable for the acts or omissions of another Party to this Agreement except to the extent they have agreed in writing to be responsible for the acts or omissions of the other Parties.

Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of the statutory liability limits outlined in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466, or a waiver of any available immunities or defenses. Under no circumstances shall the Committee or a Party be required to pay on behalf of itself and any other Parties any amounts over the limits of liability established in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466 applicable to any third-party claim. The statutory limits of liability for some or all of the Parties may not be added together or stacked to increase the maximum amount of liability for any third-party claim.

Any excess or uninsured liability shall be borne equally by all the Parties, but this does not include the liability of any individual officer, employee, or agent that arises from his or her own malfeasance, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

Nothing herein shall be construed to provide insurance coverage or indemnification to an officer, employee, or volunteer of any member for any act or omission for which the officer, employee, or volunteer is guilty of malfeasance in office, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

12 <u>Term.</u> The term of this Agreement shall be effective only when all the parties have signed this Agreement. The Chair of the Board shall notify the Parties in writing of the effective date of this Agreement. This Agreement shall continue in effect until terminated in accordance with paragraph 13.2 or December 31st, 2030, whichever first occurs.

Withdrawal and Termination.

13.1 <u>Withdrawal.</u> Any Party may withdraw from this Agreement upon 12 months' advanced written notice to the other Parties. Withdrawal by any Party shall not terminate this Agreement with respect to any Parties who have not withdrawn. Withdrawal shall not discharge any liability incurred by any Party prior to withdrawal. Such liability shall continue until discharged by law or agreement.

- 13.2 <u>Termination.</u> This Agreement shall terminate upon the occurrence of any one of the following events: (a) when necessitated by operation of law or as a result of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction; or (b) when a majority of Parties agrees to terminate the Agreement upon a date certain.
- 13.3 <u>Effect of Termination.</u> Termination shall not discharge any liability incurred by the Committee or by the Parties during the term of this Agreement. Upon termination property or surplus money held by the Committee shall then be distributed to the Parties in proportion to the contributions of the Parties.

14 Miscellaneous.

- 14.1 <u>Amendments.</u> This Agreement may be amended only in writing and upon the consent of the governing bodies of all of the Parties.
- 14.2 Records, Accounts and Reports. The books and records of the Committee shall be subject to the provisions of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13 and Minnesota Statutes § 16C.05, subd. 5. All books and records shall be retained by Dakota County pursuant to a data retention policy adopted by the Committee.
- 14.3 <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument. Counterparts shall be filed with <u>Dakota County Emergency Management</u>.
- 14.4 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. During the performance of this Agreement, the Parties shall not discriminate against any individual necessary to perform the services under this Agreement because of race, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, disability, sexual orientation or age.
- 14.5 <u>Severability.</u> Should a court of competent jurisdiction rule any portion, section or subsection of this Agreement invalid or nullified, that fact shall not affect or invalidate any other portion, section or subsection, and all remaining portions, sections or subsections shall remain in full force and effect.
- 14.6 <u>Assignment.</u> The Parties may neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this Agreement without the written agreement of all Parties.
- 14.7 <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties and supersedes all prior communications, understandings and agreements relating to the subject matter hereof, whether oral or written.
- 14.8 Governing Law. This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed according to the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 14.9 <u>Venue.</u> The venue for all legal proceedings out of this Agreement must be in the appropriate court with competent jurisdiction in Dakota County, Minnesota.

2025 JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT

The parties to this Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") are units of government responsible for response to large-scale disasters or emergencies in their respective jurisdictions. This Agreement is made pursuant to the authority conferred upon the parties by Minnesota Statutes § 471.59. This Agreement amends and supersedes the FIRST AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT FOR THE DAKOTA COUNTY DOMESTIC PREPAREDNESS COMMITTEE, 2016 JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT, and shall become effective only upon the approval and execution hereof by duly authorized officers of all parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, the undersigned governmental units, in the joint and mutual exercise of their powers, agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Name.</u> The Parties hereby establish the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee. ("Committee").
- 2. <u>Parties.</u> The Parties to this Agreement shall consist of the following entities:

City of Eagan

City of Farmington

City of Hastings

City of Inver Grove Heights

City of Lakeville

City of Mendota Heights

City of Rosemount

City of South St. Paul

City of West St. Paul

County of Dakota

3. Purpose. The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the joint exercise, of the Parties' powers to plan for and to respond to the need of first responders for special response operations caused by the occurrence of Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies, as defined in paragraph 10.2, both within Dakota County and to other jurisdictions external to Dakota County by providing assistance as requested pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Chapter 12. The joint exercise of the Parties' powers pursuant to this Agreement is intended to supplement and complement but not supplant the Parties' joint and individual powers to plan for and respond to the occurrence of other emergency or unforeseen events occurring within Dakota County, as provided in the Parties' respective emergency operations plans and similar plans.

4. <u>Governance.</u>

4.1 <u>Governing Board.</u> The governing board formed pursuant to this Agreement shall be known as the Dakota County Domestic Preparedness Committee Board ("Board"). The Board shall be constituted as follows:

4.1.1 <u>Voting Board Members.</u>

One member and one alternate member appointed by each entity that is a Party to this Agreement listed in paragraph 2. Voting will be allocated as provided in paragraph 5.7.

4.1.2 <u>Non-Voting Board Members.</u>

All additional members, and other entities under contract shall be non-voting members of the Board and shall not be counted for quorum purposes.

- Representative of Dakota County Emergency Management.
- Representative of Dakota County City Managers / Administrators.
- Representative of Dakota County Emergency Medical Services Council.
- Representative of the Dakota County Special Operations Team.
- Representative of Dakota County Public Health.
- Representative of the Dakota County Attorney.
- Representative of Public Works Directors / Superintendents within Dakota County.
- Representative of Dakota 911.
- Representative of each entity that has entered into a contract pursuant to paragraph 8.2.1.
- 4.2 <u>Documentation.</u> Resolutions or other documentation of appointments shall be filed with Dakota County Emergency Management Division.
- 4.3 <u>Members not Employees.</u> Members of the Board or Committee shall not be deemed to be employees of the Committee and will not be compensated by the Committee for serving on the Committee.
- 4.4 <u>Terms; Vacancies.</u> Members shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing Party and may be removed only by the appointing Party. Vacancies may be filled only by the appointing Party. Incumbent members serve until a successor has been appointed.

5 Meetings and Elected Officers.

- 5.1 In January of each year, the Board shall elect from its members a chair, vice-chair, and secretary to conduct its meetings and affairs. Officers shall serve for a term of one (1) year or until the officer ceases to be a board member, whichever is shorter. In the event of a vacancy mid-term, an appointment to fill the vacancy will be made during the next regular meeting of the Board.
- 5.2 <u>Chair.</u> The Chair shall preside over all meetings of the Board and shall perform other duties and functions as determined by the Board.
- 5.3 <u>Vice Chair</u>. The Vice-Chair shall preside over and act for the Board during the absence of the Chair.
- 5.4 <u>Secretary.</u> The Secretary shall assist the Chair in overseeing the keeping of the record of all proceedings of the Committee's actions.
- 5.5 <u>Treasurer.</u> A representative of Dakota County Emergency Management shall serve as Treasurer for the Committee. The Treasurer shall assist the Chair in overseeing the Committee's budget and finances.
- 5.6 <u>Meetings.</u> The Board shall schedule regular meetings at such times and places as the Board shall determine. No action may be taken unless a quorum is present. The presence of a majority of the Voting Members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. All meetings are subject to the Minnesota Open Meeting Law, Board Officers will be responsible for determining where all meeting notices and information will be posted.
 - 5.6.1 Special meetings may be held on reasonable notice by the Chair or Vice Chair. The presence of a majority of the voting members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. No action may be taken unless a quorum is present.
- 5.7 <u>Voting.</u> Each Voting Board Member shall be entitled to one (1) vote per Party. Proxy votes are not permitted. The Board shall function by a majority vote of the Board members present.

6 <u>Duties of the Committee.</u>

- 6.1 <u>Program.</u> The Board shall formulate a program to carry out the Committee's purpose. The Committee shall carry out and implement its programs to the extent possible. The program shall include the following:
 - 6.1.1 Promote the development and awareness of response plans and enhance the planning capabilities at all levels of government within Dakota County to prevent, respond to, and recover from Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosives ("CBRNE") threats, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters.
 - 6.1.2 Establish a process to efficiently use funding to address identified priorities

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- with countywide benefits and meet all grant reporting requirements.
- 6.1.3 Promote the hardening and development of response preplans for critical public and private sector infrastructure within Dakota County based on risk and capability gaps.
- 6.1.4 Develop and enhance countywide capabilities to respond to the consequences of CBRNE threats, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters through training and equipment acquisition.
- 6.1.5 Demonstrate the countywide capacity and ability to respond to CBRNE events, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters through drills, tabletop and functional exercises.
- 6.1.6 Promote interoperability of emergency voice and data communications throughout Dakota County by incorporating interoperability into plans and exercises.
- 6.1.7 Promote the public's understanding of emergency warning and notification capabilities within Dakota County.
- 6.1.8 Promote the development of plans and exercises to ensure the continuity of county and local governments.
- 6.1.9 Promote the capability of Dakota County's and the cities' Emergency Operations Centers ("EOCs") to manage, communicate, and coordinate in the event of CBRNE events, acts of terror, or natural and manmade disasters.
- 6.1.10 Identify and develop agreements to render mutual aid with political subdivisions outside of Dakota County pursuant to Minnesota Statute §12.27.
- 6.1.11 Develop a process for requesting and to provide for rendering local assistance to other political subdivisions outside of Dakota County upon request pursuant to Minnesota Statutes §12.29, 12.33, 12.331, 12.37, and any other applicable laws enabling an emergency aid response.

6.2 Special Operations Team.

- 6.2.1 <u>Establishment.</u> The Committee shall establish a Special Operations Team ("SOT") with the capability of providing specialized response operations for which specific training and equipment are required, and which are not currently available to all the Parties. The Committee will ensure that the SOT is established, that its members are trained to applicable federal and state standards, and that the necessary and appropriate equipment is purchased and made available for use by the SOT.
- 6.2.2 <u>Procedures.</u> The Committee will ensure that procedures are established so that the SOT is able to respond to Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies

- occurring anywhere within the jurisdictions of the Parties to this Agreement. Procedures of the SOT are subject to the review and approval of the Board.
- 6.2.3 <u>Members.</u> The Parties agree to assign employees and make equipment available to the SOT. Members of the SOT will remain employees of their employing agency and will not be deemed employees of the Committee, the Board, or the SOT.
- 6.2.4 <u>Team Manager</u>. The Board shall appoint a Team Manager who will be responsible for ensuring that the Committee accomplishes the duties described in paragraph 6.2. The Team Manager is authorized to make budgeted expenditures in accordance with the Dakota County Procurement Policy. The Team Manager shall be an employee of a Party.
- 6.3 <u>Subcommittees.</u> The Board may create subcommittees to carry out the duties of the Committee as needed to support the Committee. The actions of all subcommittees are subject to approval by the Board.
- Reservation of Authority. All responsibilities not specifically set out to be jointly exercised by the Committee under this Agreement are hereby reserved to the Parties and each of them.

8 Powers of the Committee.

8.1 <u>General Powers.</u> The Committee is hereby authorized to exercise such authority as is necessary and proper to fulfill its purposes and perform its duties. Such authority shall include the specific powers enumerated in paragraph 8.2.

8.2 Specific Powers.

- 8.2.1 The Committee may enter into any contract necessary or proper for the exercise of its powers or the fulfillment of its duties and enforce such contracts to the extent available in equity or at law with units of local government in Dakota County that are not Parties to this Agreement, to provide such entities with the opportunity to assign members to the SOT. The Committee may approve any contract relating to this Agreement up to the amount approved in the annual budget and may authorize the Chair to execute those contracts. No payment on any contract invoice shall be authorized unless approved by at least two (2) of the three (3) officers elected pursuant to paragraph 5.1. The Treasurer shall report to the Board any such payments at its next meeting.
- 8.2.2 The Committee may disburse funds in a manner that is consistent with this Agreement and with the method provided by law for the disbursement of funds by Dakota County.
- 8.2.3 The Committee may apply for and accept gifts, grants, or loans of money or other property or assistance from the United States government, the State of

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Minnesota, or any person, association, or agency for any of its purposes; enter into any agreement in connection therewith; and hold, use and dispose of such money or other property and assistance in accordance with the terms of the gift, grant or loan relating thereto.

- 8.2.4 The Committee shall maintain liability coverage for the actions of the Committee with the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust ("LMCIT") with a limit of coverage equal to or greater than the liability limits under Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466, under standard LMCIT liability coverage forms. The Committee shall also obtain tail coverage following termination of the Agreement to cover the statute of limitations during which a claim could be made against the Committee. Such insurance shall name each Party as a covered party. The Committee may in its discretion procure coverage for automobile liability and damage to or loss of property.
- 8.2.5 All powers granted herein shall be exercised by the Committee in a fiscally responsible manner and in accordance with the requirements of law. The purchasing and contracting requirements of Dakota County shall apply to the Committee.

9 Budgeting and Funding.

- 9.1 <u>Budget Adoption.</u> By April 30th of each year, the Board shall adopt an annual work plan and operating and capital budgets for the following calendar year including a statement of the sources of funding.
- 9.2 <u>Budget and Accounting Services.</u> Dakota County agrees to provide all budgeting and accounting services necessary or convenient for the Committee. Such services shall include but not be limited to management of all funds, payment for contracted services and other purchases, and relevant bookkeeping and recordkeeping. Dakota County contracting and purchasing requirements shall apply to transactions of the Committee.
- 9.3 Expenses. The Parties understand and acknowledge that the activities and duties of the Committee are to be funded first by grant monies from the federal government, state government, or other associations and agencies. Nevertheless, the Parties agree to contribute to funding, if necessary, for the expenses of the Committee, to the extent not covered by grant funds. Each Party agrees annually to appropriate funds for the expenses of the Committee not covered by grant funds, on a population basis, subject to each city council's or the county board's adoption of a resolution authorizing any such appropriation. For purposes of this paragraph, each Party's population would be calculated to include the city(s) and/or township(s) they provide police protection for. Population basis means the most current decennial federal census or the most recent Metropolitan Council population estimate, whichever is the most recent.
- 9.4 <u>Federal and State Grant Funds Available to Counties.</u> The Parties understand and acknowledge that federal and state grant funds have been and may continue to be

made available for improving and enhancing local government units' capabilities in responding to the occurrence of Large-Scale Disasters or Emergencies. The Parties further understand and acknowledge that some such federal and state grant funds may be made available directly to counties with the intention that the funds be expended for the benefit also of cities within the county. - <u>Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency</u> an unforeseen exigent circumstance requiring specialized response operations.
- <u>Requesting Party</u> a Party to this Agreement who has requested that the SOT provide specialized response operations.
- <u>Special Operations Team (SOT)</u> a group of personnel assigned by the Parties who will be trained and organized to provide special response operations to any Party who requests them, and which may include personnel of other entities that have entered into an agreement with the Committee pursuant to paragraph 8.2.1.
- <u>Specialized Response Operations</u> specialized rescue services for problem-specific emergencies, including, but not limited to structural collapse, technical rope rescue, hazardous materials, wildland rescue, confined space rescue, trench

rescue, water rescue, vehicle/machinery disentanglement, and the like, including training events for such services.

- 10.3 Requests for Assistance by a Party to the Committee. Whenever a Party, in its sole discretion, determines that the conditions within its jurisdiction cannot be adequately addressed by that jurisdiction because of a Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency, the Party may request orally or in writing that the SOT provide specialized response operations to the Party.
 - 10.3.1 Emergency Management Assistance Compact ("EMAC"). The SOT Manager may submit a Mission Ready Package ("MRP") in response to an EMAC request after consultation and approval from the Chair or Vice-Chair.
- 10.4 Requests for Assistance through Mutual Aid Agreement. For any Mutual Aid Agreement that the Committee is party to, requests for aid from the Committee shall be made by following the terms for activation as outlined and identified in the specific Joint Powers Agreement.
- 10.5 Requests for Assistance by Political Subdivisions Outside of Dakota County. Any political subdivision from outside of Dakota County in order to request assistance from the Committee, shall follow the Committee procedure developed for rendering local assistance to other political subdivisions outside of Dakota County, consistent with the requirements of Minnesota Statutes §12.29, 12.33, 12.331, 12.37, and any other applicable laws regarding requesting emergency aid response from a political subdivision.
- 10.6 Response to Request for Assistance from a Party to the Committee. Upon a request for assistance of the Committee, the SOT Manager, or designee, may authorize, direct, and permit the SOT to assist the requesting Party following the SOT activation process. Whether the SOT shall provide such assistance, and the extent of such assistance, shall be determined by the SOT Manager, or designee. Failure to provide assistance in response to a request made pursuant to this Agreement will not result in any liability to the SOT or to any other Party. The SOT Manager, or designee, shall notify the Chair or Vice-Chair any time consent to assist a governmental unit, is granted.
- 10.7 <u>Recall of Assistance.</u> The SOT Manager, or designee, may at any time and in its sole judgment terminate and recall the SOT or any part thereof. The decision to recall the SOT provided pursuant to this Agreement will not result in liability to the SOT.
- 10.8 <u>Direction and Control.</u> Personnel and equipment of the SOT shall remain under the direction and control of the SOT Manager.
- 10.9 <u>Exercise of Police Power.</u> Any member of the SOT who is a licensed peace officer and who is assisting pursuant to this Agreement has the full and complete authority of a peace officer as though appointed by the requesting Party and licensed by the State of Minnesota provided the officer meets the requirements set forth at

Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, subds. 12(1) and (2).

10.10 <u>Compensation.</u>

- 10.10.1 Parties to this Agreement. When the SOT provides services to a requesting Party, the personnel of the SOT shall be compensated by their respective employers just as if they were performing the duties within and for the jurisdiction of their appointing Party. Except as provided in paragraph 10.10.2., no charges will be levied by the Committee for specialized response operations provided to a requesting Party pursuant to this Agreement unless that assistance continues for a period exceeding twenty-four (24) consecutive hours. If assistance provided pursuant to this Agreement continues for more than twenty-four (24) consecutive hours, the Committee shall submit to the requesting Party an itemized bill for the actual cost of any assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials, and supplies incurred following the initial 24-hour period. The requesting Party shall reimburse the Committee for the billed amount. When received by the Committee those funds will be paid out to each appropriate entity in the amounts documented in the itemized bill.
- 10.10.2 <u>Private Third Parties.</u> In the event that the SOT is activated and deployed at the request of a Party to this Agreement, to provide specialized response operations at a Large-Scale Disaster or Emergency for which a private third party may bear financial responsibility, the Committee shall submit to the requesting Party without delay an itemized bill for the actual cost of assistance provided, including salaries, overtime, materials, and supplies. The requesting Party shall reimburse the Committee its proportionate share of funds received from any private third party, if any, for the full cost of the assistance.
- 10.11 <u>Workers' Compensation.</u> Each Party to this Agreement shall be responsible for injuries to or death of its employees. Each Party shall maintain workers' compensation coverage or self-insurance coverage, covering its personnel while they are assisting a member of the SOT. Each Party to this Agreement waives the right to sue any other Party for any workers' compensation benefits paid to its employee or their dependents, even if the injuries were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other Party or its officers, employees, or agents.
- 10.12 <u>Damage to Equipment.</u> Each Party shall be responsible for damage to or loss of its equipment occurring during deployment of the SOT. Each Party waives the right to sue any other Party for any damages to or loss of its equipment, even if the damages or losses were caused wholly or partially by the negligence of any other Party or its officers, employees, or agents.

11 <u>Liability.</u>

The Committee is a separate and distinct public entity to which the Parties have transferred all responsibility and control for actions taken pursuant to this Agreement.

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With the exception of workers' compensation liability, which is addressed in paragraph 10.11 of this Agreement, the Committee shall defend and indemnify the Parties, and their officers, employees, volunteers, and agents, from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including reasonable attorney fees, arising from Committee activities or operations, including deployments of the SOT, and decisions of the Committee.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, actions by the Parties to this Agreement are intended to be and shall be construed as a "cooperative activity" and the Parties intend that they shall be deemed a "single governmental unit" for the purposes of liability, as outlined in Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, subd. 1a (a), provided further that for purposes of that statute, each Party to this Agreement expressly declines responsibility for the acts or omissions of any other Party. The Parties to this Agreement shall not be liable for the acts or omissions of another Party to this Agreement except to the extent they have agreed in writing to be responsible for the acts or omissions of the other Parties.

Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of the statutory liability limits outlined in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466, or a waiver of any available immunities or defenses. Under no circumstances shall the Committee or a Party be required to pay on behalf of itself and any other Parties any amounts over the limits of liability established in Minnesota Statutes Chapter 466 applicable to any third-party claim. The statutory limits of liability for some or all of the Parties may not be added together or stacked to increase the maximum amount of liability for any third-party claim.

Any excess or uninsured liability shall be borne equally by all the Parties, but this does not include the liability of any individual officer, employee, or agent that arises from his or her own malfeasance, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

Nothing herein shall be construed to provide insurance coverage or indemnification to an officer, employee, or volunteer of any member for any act or omission for which the officer, employee, or volunteer is guilty of malfeasance in office, willful neglect of duty, or bad faith.

Term. The term of this Agreement shall be effective only when all the parties have signed this Agreement. The Chair of the Board shall notify the Parties in writing of the effective date of this Agreement. This Agreement shall continue in effect until terminated in accordance with paragraph 13.2 or December 31st, 2030, whichever first occurs.

Withdrawal and Termination.

- 13.1 <u>Withdrawal.</u> Any Party may withdraw from this Agreement upon 12 months' advanced written notice to the other Parties. Withdrawal by any Party shall not terminate this Agreement with respect to any Parties who have not withdrawn. Withdrawal shall not discharge any liability incurred by any Party prior to withdrawal. Such liability shall continue until discharged by law or agreement.
- 13.2 <u>Termination.</u> This Agreement shall terminate upon the occurrence of any one of the following events: (a) when necessitated by operation of law or as a result of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction; or (b) when a majority of Parties agrees to terminate the Agreement upon a date certain.

13.3 <u>Effect of Termination.</u> Termination shall not discharge any liability incurred by the Committee or by the Parties during the term of this Agreement. Upon termination property or surplus money held by the Committee shall then be distributed to the Parties in proportion to the contributions of the Parties.

14 Miscellaneous.

- 14.1 <u>Amendments.</u> This Agreement may be amended only in writing and upon the consent of the governing bodies of all of the Parties.
- 14.2 <u>Records, Accounts and Reports.</u> The books and records of the Committee shall be subject to the provisions of Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13 and Minnesota Statutes § 16C.05, subd. 5. All books and records shall be retained by Dakota County pursuant to a data retention policy adopted by the Committee.
- 14.3 <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument. Counterparts shall be filed with Dakota County Emergency Management.
- 14.4 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. During the performance of this Agreement, the Parties shall not discriminate against any individual necessary to perform the services under this Agreement because of race, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, disability, sexual orientation or age.
- 14.5 <u>Severability.</u> Should a court of competent jurisdiction rule any portion, section or subsection of this Agreement invalid or nullified, that fact shall not affect or invalidate any other portion, section or subsection, and all remaining portions, sections or subsections shall remain in full force and effect.
- 14.6 <u>Assignment.</u> The Parties may neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this Agreement without the written agreement of all Parties.
- 14.7 <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties and supersedes all prior communications, understandings and agreements relating to the subject matter hereof, whether oral or written.
- 14.8 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement shall be interpreted and construed according to the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 14.9 <u>Venue.</u> The venue for all legal proceedings out of this Agreement must be in the appropriate court with competent jurisdiction in Dakota County, Minnesota.
- 14.10 <u>Electronic Signatures</u>. Each party agrees that the electronic signatures of the parties included in this Contract are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as wet ink signatures.

Authorize renewal of the contract for subscription service with SuccessFactors, Inc., to access webbased performance management subscription service, effective January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026

SUMMARY

The web-based performance management subscription service for SuccessFactors, Inc., has been approved for use by the County Board since December 31, 2001. The subscription software is integral in facilitating the County's objective to create a performance management system that can be monitored for equitable application and provide management with cumulative data for continuous improvement of the process. Dakota County's experience with the vendor has been very positive. They have delivered a stable product and have been responsive to ongoing requests for expanded functionality and adaptation of the product to meet Dakota County's organizational and user needs.

The current contract for subscription service with SuccessFactors, Inc., expires December 31, 2025. Human Resources has negotiated a new one-year contract for the period beginning January 1, 2026 and ending December 31, 2026 (Attachment). The new 2026 annual cost represents a no increase to the per user cost from 2025. However, the new agreement does include a needed increase in the number of users, which has not increased since at least 2006, and an overall cost increase of 4.7 percent as a result.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Board of Commissioners authorize the Human Resources Director to renew the County's contract with SuccessFactors, Inc. for web-based performance management services at a cost of \$101,000 for the period January 1, 2026 through December 31, 2026

Summary Of Conclusions Of Closed Executive Session To Evaluate Performance Of County Manager

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

The Open Meeting Law requires a public body to summarize its conclusions regarding a closed performance evaluation at an open meeting.

SUMMARY

The Open Meeting Law, Minn. Stat. § 13D.05, subd. 3(a), permits a public body to close a meeting to evaluate the performance of an individual subject to its authority. On November 18, 2025, the Dakota County Board of Commissioners held a closed executive session to evaluate the performance of the County Manager.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize execution of contract with Ally Supportive Services (Ally) for street outreach services.

SUMMARY

The Social Services Department manages a continuum of housing services funded through an array of levy, state grants, federal grants, and Affordable Housing Aid (AHA). Some services are operated through direct service delivery, such as social workers working with families and adults in shelter and supportive housing. Other services such as street outreach to homeless individuals, emergency shelter, permanent supportive housing, apartment services, and services at eviction court are delivered though contracts.

This contract pays for outreach to people in Dakota County experiencing homeless, living outdoors or couch-hopping. Services include coordinating with service providers; outreach to community locations (libraries, police departments, county buildings); developing working relationships with system partners; and facilitating referrals to housing, job training, mental health and other human services. Homeless outreach meets people where they are at, serving an estimated 200 people each quarter (Attachment: Outcomes).

An RFP for street outreach services was conducted earlier in 2025 (Attachment: Solicitation Summary). Based on the RFP review, staff recommends contracting with Ally for a period of two years in an amount not to exceed \$322,000 in levy funds. This is a 59 percent increase (\$120,000) from previous contracts. The increase is needed to continue the same level of street outreach service for three reasons: (1) state grant funding that flows from the county to Ally was cut by around \$62,000 for the 2026-2027 grant cycle; (2) the cost for delivering services has increased with inflation; and (3) the number of people experiencing street homelessness is likely to increase as economic conditions continue to deteriorate. The following summarizes funding from all sources for street outreach from the 2024-2025 to the 2026-2027 contract period.

The \$120,000 recommended increase for this contract would come from cuts to other areas of the housing and homeless services budget. Overall, the 2026 County Manager's Recommended Budget includes a reduction of \$556,000 in levy-funded housing services contract expenses.

- 1. How much? Number of households served

SUMMARY

The Lebanon Hills Maintenance Facility construction is complete. The total change orders issued to the general contractor, Rochon Corporation, did not exceed \$245,000. This is less than 1.7 percent of the \$14,333,000 general construction contract amount. This is a positive result that reflects the quality of the design documents prepared by UrbanWorks Architecture LLC.

Staff was authorized to enter into a contract with UrbanWorks Architecture LLC for the completion of the Lebanon Hills Maintenance Facility design by Resolution No. 23-170 (April 11, 2023). During construction, UrbanWorks Architecture LLC provided additional services to assist with a dry cooler and fuel island procurement, as well as additional construction administration for greenhouse construction and paving evaluation. These services were outside of the scope of the original agreement and require an amendment to the contract of \$20,905.

The contract with UrbanWorks Architecture LLC was amended multiple times throughout the project via County Board Resolutions Amendment No. 5 will increase the contract amount by \$20,905 from \$950,000 to \$970,905.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Board approve the contract increase for UrbanWorks Architecture LLC for a contract not to exceed total of \$970,905.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The Facilities Capital Improvement Program Adopted Budget includes a total approved budget for the Lebanon Hills Ground Maintenance Shop of \$22,843,711. This amendment is paid for by county debt. Sufficient budget is available for this design contract amendment.

Authorization To Amend Contract With Avant Energy, Inc., For Byllesby Dam Services

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize an amendment to the existing contract with Avant Energy, Inc., for market operation services and execute Service Schedule 3 for CleanCounts registration for sale of renewable energy credits created at Byllesby Hydroelectric Facility.

SUMMARY

Dakota County owns the Byllesby Dam and operates the hydroelectric facility under the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) safety regulations. Since 1987, the County coordinated dam operations and maintenance with Neshkoro Power Associates (NPA) through a lease agreement. The County Board authorized replacing NPA's lease agreement with an operating agreement to provide hydropower operation services at Byllesby Dam by Resolution No. 11-305 (June 21, 2011), beginning May 1, 2011, and running through March 2021. The March 2021 agreement termination date was selected because it coincided with the expiration of the Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) between NPA and Xcel Energy for the Byllesby Dam. The PPA stipulated that it would expire in March 2021 or on the date the facility's existing turbine equipment was shut down as part of the turbine upgrade project, with no option to renew the existing PPA.

After consultation with local power sales experts, the County Board authorized by Resolution No. 20-295 (June 16, 2020) a submittal of an application to the Midcontinent Independent System Operator for sales of energy, which allows the County to sell power generated by the Byllesby Dam to other utilities in the Midwest.

On July 19, 2022, the Dakota County Board of Commissioners authorized by Resolution No. 22-288 (July 19, 2022) the Physical Development Director to execute a contract with Avant Energy, Inc. to provide capacity market services for the sale of power. The contract term was established for five years, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$111,500. The contract was not formally executed until August 1, 2024, to align closer with the energy production timeline. The original budget did not account for annual inflationary escalators written into the contract, which are tied to the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The proposed amendment aims to capture these annual escalations through the term of the contract. Because the CPI varies from year to year, a five percent annual inflationary rate has been assumed through 2029.

Additionally, the Byllesby Dam facility can generate additional revenue through the sale of Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) created from power generation activities. Staff proposes to Item Number: DC-4626 Agenda #: 10.3 **Meeting Date:** 12/2/2025

execute an additional service schedule (Service Schedule 3) within the existing contract with Avant Energy, Inc., to facilitate registration and sale of the County's RECs through CleanCounts. CleanCounts is a nonprofit organization that provides a web-based platform to track renewable energy generation. Registration through the CleanCounts system is a required process for the sale of RECs, as the software is able to issue digital certificates for each megawatt-hour of renewable energy generated. These certificates are required for the physical sale of the RECs.

Current projections estimate that RECs generated by the Byllesby Hydroelectric Facility could generate between \$25,000 and \$100,000 annually, depending on REC value and power generation. The proposed budget for the contract encompasses REC sales through the end of 2029, as well as a one-time cost for registration with the CleanCounts system.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests the County Board to authorize the Environmental Resources Director to amend the existing contract and execute Service Schedule 3, with Avant Energy, Inc.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The original contract is \$111,500. The proposed amendment adds \$68,500, resulting in a total not-toexceed amount of \$180,000. The amendment allocates \$42,500 to account for inflationary escalations in Service Schedule 1 and \$26,000 for Service Schedule 3. These costs are incorporated into the County Manager's 2026 Recommended Budget for Byllesby Dam and are paid for by revenues earned from energy sales.

The scope of services to be provided by Avant to Dakota County for startup of Renewable Energy Credit (REC) Management services ("Startup RS") is listed below:

- Register generation resource in Midwest Renewable Energy Tracking System (M-RETS)
- Setup file documentation and processes to complete REC Management services

Ongoing Activities

The scope of services to be provided by Avant to Dakota County for ongoing REC Management services ("Ongoing RS") is listed below:

As a carbon-free resource, the hydro project will generate Renewable Energy Credits (RECs) that can be used to meet regulatory requirements. Avant shall perform the following activities to assist Dakota County with REC management:

- Report monthly renewable energy generation to M-RETS
- Assist Dakota County in marketing RECs to Counterparties (if desired by Dakota County). Avant will work with Dakota County to determine a quantity and price for REC marketing efforts and transactions.

Fee Arrangement – Service Schedule 3

Startup Activities

Avant shall receive a one-time fee of \$1,250 plus reimbursement for any direct expenses paid by Avant to M-RETS at cost, for the initial work to provide the Startup RS to Dakota County.

Ongoing Activities

Avant shall receive a monthly fee of \$250 per month plus reimbursement for any direct expenses paid by Avant for submitting the generation to M-RETS (including the per MWh M-RETS administrative fee) for the Ongoing RS described above.

The monthly fees shall be adjusted annually for inflation using the CPIU inflator for the most recent December to December twelve month period with the first annual adjustment to be made on January 1, 2027, for the calendar year commencing on

January 1, 2027, with adjustments to be made each January 1 thereafter for the duration of this Agreement.

SUMMARY

In 2014, the Minnesota Legislature passed a tax bill that appropriates funds annually for AIS prevention, which is distributed to Minnesota counties. The funding must be used to prevent or limit the spread of AIS. Annual AIS Prevention Aid allocations are formula-based, with 50 percent based on the number of watercraft trailer launches and 50 percent based on the number of watercraft trailer launch parking spaces. In order to become eligible to receive AIS Prevention Aid, a county must establish, by resolution or through adoption of a plan, guidelines for the use of the funding.

Dakota County's AIS prevention activities to-date have included AIS watercraft inspectors at boat launches, early detection waterbody surveys, purchase and staffing of a mobile watercraft decontamination station at Lake Byllesby Regional Park, a grant program to support local prevention efforts by lake associations and local government units within Dakota County, development and distribution of AIS education and outreach materials, and support for AIS law enforcement through the Dakota County Sheriff's Office.

The draft five-year plan outlines having the AIS Advisory Committee work with division leadership and program partners to prioritize funding or explore supplemental funding strategies based on future reductions.

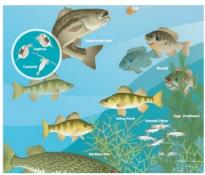

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Introduction

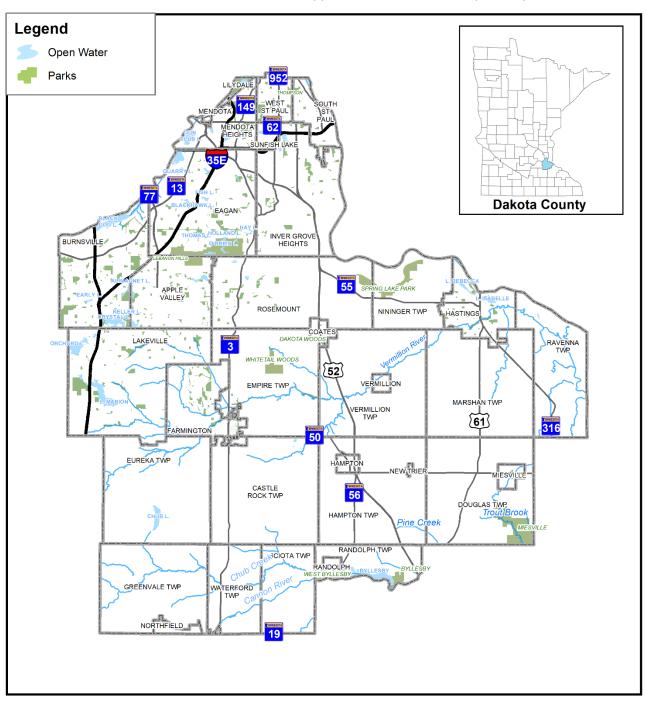


Figure 1. Dakota County waterbodies

Since the early 2000s, the introduction and spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS) has occurred at an alarming rate throughout Minnesota and continues to be a growing concern across the state. Residents in Dakota County are not immune to these concerns. The county is bisected by the Vermillion River (Figure 1), many lakes and wetlands pocket suburban neighborhoods, and three major rivers define all or portions of the County's northern, eastern, and southern borders (the Minnesota, Mississippi, and Cannon Rivers, respectively).

The introduction of non-native species (fish, plant, invertebrate, and viruses and disease-causing microorganisms), unhindered by natural predators or disease, can cause quick, permanent, and detrimental alterations to a waterbody's ecosystem. As a result, these changes can have a negative impact on the recreational suitability of the waterbody which in turn, can impact the economic viability of the local community. AIS have already been detected in numerous Dakota County lakes and wetlands, as well as the Vermillion (including its tributaries), Minnesota, and Mississippi Rivers, though it can be assumed that undetected individuals or populations are present. There are several invasive species not currently found in Minnesota that have the potential to negatively impact the health of waters in Dakota County.

The Dakota County Aquatic Invasive Species Plan (Plan) serves to guide the use of annual funding provided to Dakota County from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources' (MN DNR) Local AIS Prevention Aid program. The plan outlines the strategies utilized by the Dakota County AIS Program to help prevent and manage the spread of AIS, within the county and greater Minnesota. Through this program, Dakota County aims to support existing monitoring and implementation efforts by local government units (LGUs), including lake associations and watershed organizations, fill gaps by monitoring waterbodies not currently covered by LGUs, assess AIS suitability within the County parks system (particularly Lake Byllesby), and promote County-wide outreach efforts.

The AIS program is overseen by the Dakota County Environmental Resources Department. In 2015, the Dakota County AIS Advisory Committee (Committee) was formed to provide ongoing management, oversight, and implementation of programs supported by the state AIS Prevention Aid funding. The Committee consists of Dakota County and Dakota County Soil and Water Conservation District (DCSWCD) staff members, with additional input from a broad range of stakeholders.

The Committee works with local, state and federal governments, as well as nonprofit and private organizations operating in Dakota County, to develop, implement, and support AIS prevention programs. Organizations and interested residents assist the Committee to better prioritize resources and develop workable strategies to prevent the spread of AIS in local waters. The Plan promotes engagement with stakeholders by a variety of methods including developing and coordinating outreach tools, providing training opportunities, and supporting strategies that adhere to best management practices to increase AIS awareness, monitoring, and management.

Dakota County Profile

Dakota County is 587 square miles in area and has a population of approximately 400,000. Situated in the southeast corner of the Twin Cities Metropolitan area, Dakota County is the third most populous county in the state of Minnesota. Founded in 1849, Dakota County was one of the original nine counties created by the Minnesota Territory Legislature, thus, it was established before Minnesota was considered a state. The County seat was first established in Kaposia in 1853, was moved to Mendota in 1854, and then moved to Hastings in 1857, where it currently resides. Mendota, directly across the river from Fort Snelling, became the first European settlement in Minnesota. Before European settlement, Dakota County was part of an expansive territory of the Dakota tribe of American Indians.

Dakota County features a land use ratio of approximately one-third urban, one-third suburban, and one-third rural. The confluence of two major rivers (the Mississippi and Minnesota) that form the county's northern and eastern borders further compliments Dakota County's unique geography. The County's development and history have been greatly influenced by its proximity to these rivers. Between 1990 and 2000, Dakota County's population grew by nearly 30 percent. Development has continued to move outwards from the urban core of Minneapolis and St. Paul into suburban municipalities (Burnsville, Eagan, Inver Grove Heights, Apple Valley, Farmington, Lakeville, and Rosemount), resulting in the dramatic increase in population in recent years.

What are Aquatic Invasive Species

According to the MN DNR, AIS are aquatic organisms that are non-native to Minnesota and cause harm to both the economic prosperity and natural resources of a given community or waterbody, as well as have potentially negative impacts on human health. Not all non-native species become 'invasive.' Some species fail to thrive in their new environment and naturally die off without harming the ecosystem. Others survive, but are unable to outcompete the native species, thus they ultimately coexist without destroying or displacing the native species.

Commonly found invasive aquatic plant species in Dakota County include curlyleaf pondweed, Eurasian watermilfoil, and purple loosestrife. Although less common, aquatic invasive invertebrates such as zebra mussels, rusty crayfish, and mystery snails are also present within the County.

The introduction and subsequent spread of AIS typically results in habitat alteration, ecosystem degradation, and a loss of biodiversity due to intensified competition for resources. AIS typically have few natural predators, reproduce rapidly, and are more aggressive than native species (which ultimately diminishes the success of native species). Along with negatively affecting aquatic wildlife, AIS have the potential to impede recreational opportunities and disrupt industrial, municipal, and agricultural uses of public waters.

AIS infestations often span geographic and jurisdictional boundaries; thus, it is critical to coordinate management and prevention strategies across watershed and political boundaries to address and mitigate the spread of AIS.

Pathways of Introduction and Spread

The means and routes by which species are introduced into new environments are called 'pathways' or 'vectors.' Invasive species introductions can be both unintentional and intentional by nature. Some invasive species are

unintentionally imported, arriving through livestock and produce, by transport equipment such as packing material or in a ship's ballast water, or attached to an engine or boat trailer when moving between waterbodies. Other species are intentionally transported as an organism of trade or introduced to a lake or river for various purposes, often either escaping from captivity or carelessly released into the environment.

Other pathways by which AIS can be introduced to an ecosystem include:

 Docks and lifts (moved from an infested waterbody to an uninfested waterbody)



Pathways of Spread

- Water recreational equipment (i.e. water trampolines, rafts) and vehicles (i.e. tubes or jet skis)
- Waterfowl hunters/angler gear (i.e. waders and boots)
- Aquariums, water gardens or shoreline restorations
- Bait buckets
- Wildlife

Although several attempts are often made to eradicate AIS from an infested waterbody, it is typically impractical to completely remove a population once it has been established. Working to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species is the most effective way of protecting healthy, non-infested ecosystems.

Laws and Regulations

Current Minnesota state law prohibits the transportation of most aquatic plants. This law not only helps prevent the spread of Eurasian watermilfoil and other aquatic plants, but it also reduces the risk of zebra mussels or other invasive animal species from being transported while attached to aquatic plants. In addition, it reduces the inadvertent transport of other harmful plants into or within the state.

Under state law, it is unlawful to:

- Transport aquatic plants, except as allowed in <u>statutes</u>
- Transport zebra mussels and other prohibited species of animals
- Place or attempt to place into waters of the state a boat, seaplane, or trailer that has aquatic plants,
 zebra mussels, or other prohibited invasive species attached

Certain invasive species that can threaten natural resources and their use have been designated as <u>prohibited</u> <u>invasive species</u> in Minnesota. According to the <u>MN DNR</u>, it is a misdemeanor to possess, import, purchase, transport, or introduce these species except when under a <u>permit</u> for disposal, control, research, or educational purposes. Some of the prohibited invasive species found in Dakota County include Eurasian watermilfoil, curlyleaf pondweed, and purple loosestrife.

Other invasive species are considered <u>regulated invasive species</u>. It is legal to possess, sell, buy, and transport regulated invasive species, but they may not be released or planted in public waters. Both the rusty crayfish and the common carp are examples of regulated invasive species found in Dakota County. Other regulated species not currently found in Dakota County (as of 2025) include water hyacinth and spiny waterflea. A complete list of prohibited, regulated, and unregulated invasive species (both aquatic and terrestrial), as well as information regarding the transport of water and regulated activities in infested waters, can be found on <u>MN DNR's website</u>.

As of July 1, 2012, a boat lift, dock, swim raft, or associated equipment that has been removed from any waterbody may not be placed in another waterbody until a minimum of 21 days have passed. Regulations relating to the transportation of water in boats and other water-related equipment by boaters from all waters in the state include:

- A person leaving waters of the state must drain all water from water-related equipment, including bait containers, live wells, and bilges. They must also remove the drain plug before transporting the watercraft and equipment from the water access or riparian property
- Drain plugs, bailers, valves, or other devices used to control the draining of water from ballast tanks, bilges, and live wells must be removed or opened while transporting watercraft and water-related equipment
- Emergency response vehicles and equipment may be transported on a public road with the drain plug or other similar device replaced only after all water has been drained from the equipment upon leaving the waterbody
- The following are exempt:
 - o Portable bait containers used by licensed aquatic farms
 - Portable bait containers used when fishing through the ice, except on waters designated infested for viral hemorrhagic septicemia (VHS)
 - Marine sanitary systems

Businesses that are defined by Minnesota <u>law</u> as lake service providers must attend an aquatic invasive species training and apply for a lake service provider <u>permit</u> every three years. Employees are also required to take an online training to be certified to work in Minnesota waters. More information about the lake service provider training and permitting process can be found on <u>MN DNR's website</u>.

AIS Best Management Practices

The MN DNR promotes several best practices that everyone can follow to help stop the spread of AIS:

- Clean all aquatic plants, zebra mussels, and other invasive species from watercraft, trailers, and water-related equipment before leaving any water access or shoreland
- Drain water-related equipment (boat, ballast tanks, portable bait containers, motor) and drain bilge, livewell, and baitwell by removing drain plugs before leaving a water access or shoreline property. Keep drain plugs out and water-draining devices open during transport
- Dry docks, lifts, and rafts for 21 days before moving them from one waterbody to another

• *Dispose* of unwanted bait, including minnows, leeches, and worms, in the trash; refill the bait container with bottled or tap water if planning on keeping bait

Some invasive species are small and difficult to see at the access. To properly remove AIS from your watercraft or other equipment, take one or more of the following precautions before moving to another waterbody, especially after leaving zebra mussel and spiny waterflea infested waters:

- Spray with high-pressure water
- *Rinse* with very hot water (120°F for at least 2 minutes; or 140°F for at least 10 seconds to kill zebra mussels)
- Dry for at least 5 days before using on another waterbody

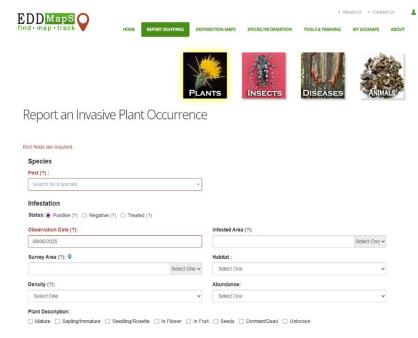
Dakota County has partnered with the MN DNR to make decontamination units available for public use in Dakota County and at other locations around the state. During a decontamination, DNR-authorized watercraft inspectors help boaters comply with invasive species laws and reduce the risk of spreading aquatic invasive species by thoroughly inspecting and cleaning boats, trailers, and other water-related equipment. More information about the decontamination process and locations can be found on the MN DNR's Courtesy Decontamination website.

Reporting AIS

Potential new AIS findings are to be reported to the MN DNR using <u>EDDMapS Midwest</u>, the invasive species reporting platform. The EDDMapS (Early Detection and Distribution Mapping System) is accessible through a desktop website, as well as a smartphone/tablet app to make it easy to report locations of invasive species while out in the field.

All data submitted through EDDMapS is reviewed by state verifiers at the MN DNR to ensure the accuracy of submissions. Once confirmed, infestation reports are freely available to scientists, researchers, land managers, landowners, educators, conservationists, ecologists, farmers, foresters, and state and national parks.

EDDMapS combines data from other databases and organizations, as well as volunteer observations, to create a national network of invasive species distribution data which is used by the MN DNR to track the spread of AIS in Minnesota. Local AIS Prevention Aid Program

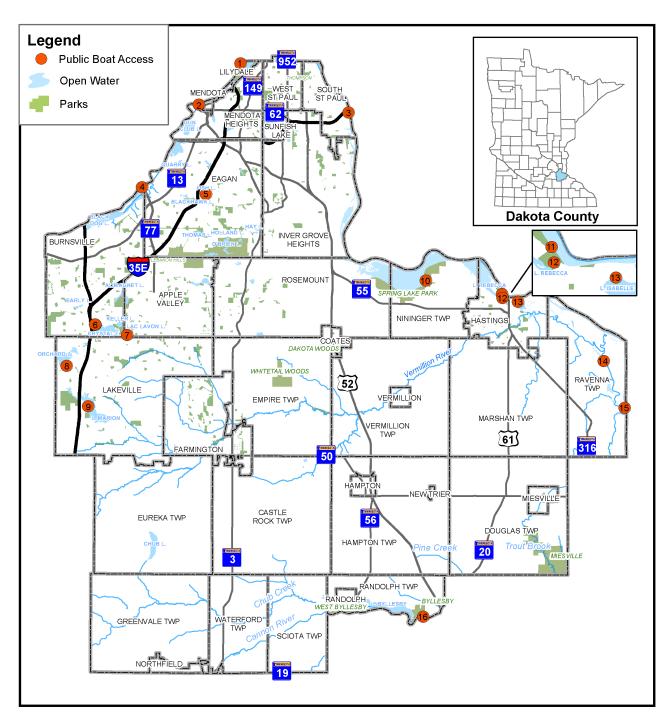


Figure 2. Watercraft launches in Dakota County

In 2014, the Minnesota state legislature passed a county aid tax bill (Chapter 308, HF3167: Omnibus tax bill. Article 1: Property Tax Aids and Credits. Section 11) providing \$10 million annually to Minnesota counties to help prevent the spread of AIS. The distribution of funds through the Department of Revenue is based on a calculation that considers each county's share of watercraft trailer launches and watercraft trailer parking spaces. Dakota County is credited with having 16 watercraft trailer launches and 372 watercraft trailer parking spaces (Figure 2).

In July 2014, \$4.5 million dollars was distributed to 87 Minnesota counties. In 2015 and thereafter, that value was increased to \$10 million per annum. In accordance with the legislative directive (Minnesota State Statute 477A.19, Appendix D), Dakota County received \$1,391,420 in state funding between 2014 and 2025.

In 2025, the legislature amended the AIS funding law, altering the available funding available henceforth. For aid payable in 2025 and 2026, \$10,000,000 each year is annually allocated, whereas for 2027 and annually thereafter, \$5,000,000 will be appropriated. The amount allocated to Dakota County will be consistent with past funding levels for 2025 and 2026 and is expected to be halved starting in 2027.

In the future, if the state legislature were to end support for the Local AIS Prevention Aid Program, the Dakota County AIS Committee would work with local stakeholders and the Dakota County Board of Commissioners to secure funding to support the long-term goals of this program at the local level.

Counties are required by statute to establish and submit guidelines, either by resolution or through the adoption of a county plan, that detail how the Local AIS Prevention Aid funding will be used. Counties must use the funds to prevent or limit the spread of AIS at all accesses within the county. Funds may be appropriated directly, or a portion of the funds can be directed towards LGUs, park districts, joint powers boards, watershed districts and watershed management organizations (WMOs), as well as lake associations and non-profit groups located in the county, to be used for AIS prevention.

Each county is responsible for deciding how to best use the funds while abiding by all current laws and regulations at the state level. See more information about the <u>Local AIS Prevention Aid Grant</u>.

Plan Development and Program History

The purpose of the County's AIS program is to prevent the introduction of new AIS, prevent further spread of existing AIS, and reduce the potential for environmental and economic impact brought on by AIS infestations. To this effect, in 2015 the Dakota County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution (14-587) adopting the following guidelines for using the AIS Prevention Aid grant:

- Prepare a comprehensive inventory of boat launches and waterbodies at risk
- Undertake an awareness campaign
- Develop early detection and response procedures
- Manage existing populations of aquatic invasive species
- Establish partnerships with local units of government, water management organizations, Soil and Water Conservation District, or lake associations

2017-2020 First-Generation Plan Development

Dakota County's first-generation plan was approved by the Dakota County Board of Commissioners in December 2016 for the duration of 2017-2020. When the plan was in development, the Committee reviewed existing AIS plans by other Minnesota counties and the MN DNR, hosted a stakeholder roundtable to gather perspectives on AIS work that was being done and what gaps existed. The committee also communicated with the MN DNR AIS Prevention Planner and Invasive Aquatic Plant Specialist to make sure the Dakota County plan included key elements, including current AIS infestations, program goals, and a proposed budget, and did not duplicate existing efforts by the MN DNR or other water-related agencies.

2017-2020 First-Generation Plan Activities

From 2014 to 2020, Dakota County received \$797,510 to undertake projects and implement programs to prevent the spread of AIS. During this period, efforts progressed through a multi-faceted approach that included early detection, management and treatment, prevention, outreach. First efforts included enhancement of AIS signage at motorized boat launches, supported using gas station signage and roadside billboards and website development for broader outreach. A consultant was hired to conduct early detection surveys on lakes within

the <u>Dakota County Parks</u> system, while youth education efforts received a boost through events like the <u>Metro Children's Festival</u> and the <u>Dakota County Fair</u>. A partnership was established with the <u>Dakota County Sheriff's Office</u> to coordinate and enhance watercraft inspection efforts, ensuring comprehensive coverage at public launches. <u>Goodhue</u> and Dakota Counties worked together on Lake Byllesby related issues including watercraft inspections, aquatic vegetation assessments, and lake association support.

These efforts were complemented by support for volunteer monitoring programs like the <u>Wetland Health</u> <u>Evaluation Program</u> (WHEP) and <u>Starry Trek</u> (statewide AIS monitoring event), reinforcing community engagement and awareness in protecting local water bodies from invasive species. Additionally, the creation of various outreach materials, such as a tabletop outreach display, a maze and handhelds featuring AIS, and

tear-proof maps, furthered the efforts of the Committee in reaching the public with information using a variety of means.

2021-2025 Second-Generation Plan Development and Outreach

The development of the second-generation plan for 2021-2025 involved a comprehensive engagement process with stakeholders to ensure the updated strategies and goals met community needs. County and SWCD staff prioritized stakeholder input, initiating discussions in 2019 with representatives from cities, WMOs, and lake associations. A key outcome from these discussions was the affirmation of the effectiveness of existing educational resources and the County-supported inspector program, along with the grant program. Suggestions for improvement included a focused education strategy on specific issues like bait management and more collaboration opportunities.

In 2020, an online survey expanded the audience's reach, gathering feedback on AIS management activities from 65 participants. The survey highlighted strong support for early detection, rapid response, and prevention as top priorities, with the inspection program receiving high praise. These insights were integral to revising the plan, which was reviewed by stakeholders before final submission to the County Board.

2021-2025 Second-Generation Plan Activities

From 2021 to 2025, Dakota County received \$474,389 to undertake projects and implement programs to prevent the spread of AIS. During this period, AIS related programming continued with early detection, management and treatment, prevention, and outreach activities. Watercraft inspections continued with local government units (LGUs) and the Dakota County Sheriff's office supporting inspections stations at lakes in Burnsville, Cannon Falls, and Lakeville. The AIS grant program strategically focused on aiding projects that addressed existing infestations through surveys, treatment, and public education, thus prioritizing waterbodies listed as infested. Fostering community involvement and increasing public knowledge about AIS continued to be a major goal of the program. Collaborations with educational institutions and support of volunteer programs like AIS Detectors, WHEP, and Starry Trek amplified these efforts, as well as a new partnership with Dakota County Library.

2026-2030 Third-Generation Plan Development and Outreach

Stakeholder input was key to updating plan strategies and goals so that the plan addressed the needs of the community. The Committee engaged with stakeholder groups during a roundtable meeting in spring 2025 to discuss the current plan and gain insight into desired priorities to be address in the third-generation plan. Attendees included City and WMO representatives, as well as local lake associations and Committee members.

Current strategies to manage existing invasives involve a combination of chemical treatments, harvesting, and replanting native species. Partners expressed interest in reducing chemical reliance and enhancing native plant

communities. However, barriers such as inconsistent funding, regulatory challenges, lack of resources, and limited staff time hinder these efforts. The organizations recognize the importance of ongoing monitoring and treatment programs, while recognizing the need for more effective management strategies that incorporate native restoration and better resource availability for post-removal planting. Collaboration with state agencies and improvement in regulatory frameworks are seen as necessary steps to overcome existing barriers and ensure sustainable AIS management.

Adaptive Management

This plan serves as a working document to guide activities and the use of the Local AIS Prevention Aid funds by Dakota County. The fluid nature of this plan provides a framework from which to establish programs that can best deal with new infestations or promote new outreach opportunities with community partners.

The management of AIS continues to grow as an important field in water resource management, particularly at the County level. With that, experience and research findings will be incorporated into future actions to prevent and manage the presence of AIS. As such, this plan will be reviewed by the Dakota County AIS Advisory Committee on a yearly basis; any necessary amendments will be made to plan priorities at that time.

Inventory and Assessment

Various types of AIS have been present in Minnesota over the last 200 years, but the rate of reported infestations is increasing at an alarming rate. Since the 1950s, public awareness of the importance of preventing new AIS introductions into Minnesota and managing existing infestations also increased. Public demand for AIS research, management, and education strategies has grown over the last 20 years.

For management and prevention activities to be as effective as possible, the types and extent of AIS within Dakota County and surrounding areas must be known. This section highlights known AIS infestations in the state and specifically Dakota County, focusing on priority species currently studied by state researchers, and provides information about the MN DNR's Infested Waters List.

AIS Infestations in Minnesota

At this time, there are 22 species of aquatic animals and invertebrates and 11 species of aquatic plants known to be invasive in Minnesota. Many of these species, such as the common carp, have been present in Minnesota for several decades. Others, such as the spread of zebra mussels, along with growing concerns about the spread of invasive carp, have brought AIS-related issues to the forefront more recently.

As of October 2025, the MN DNR Infested Waters list includes 9 percent of Minnesota's public waters. The Infested Waters List features selected *prohibited invasive species* (including Brazilian elodea, brittle naiad, Eurasian watermilfoil, faucet snails, flowering rush, New Zealand mud snails, round goby, ruffe, white perch, and zebra mussels), selected *regulated invasive species* (spiny waterflea), and *diseases* (Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS)). Lakes, rivers, ponds, and wetlands are added to the infested waters list by the MN DNR if it contains an aquatic invasive species that could spread to other waters. The MN DNR may also list a lake, river, pond or wetland as infested if it is connected to a body of water where an aquatic invasive species is present.

Current AIS Research in Minnesota

Researchers at the Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC), a research center based in St. Paul and working in cooperation with the MN DNR and University of Minnesota Extension, study detection, prevention and control techniques for a variety of AIS. Several of the key species being studied by MAISRC are considered high-risk for Minnesota increasing in distribution across the state.

The following tables identify AIS of concern for 2026, grouped by fish, plant, invertebrate, and disease species (Tables 1-4 respectively). Researchers evaluated each species' existing distribution throughout (or near) Minnesota, their distribution potential, and their potential to adversely impact ecosystems once established. MAISRC focuses its research efforts on species that have been prioritized based on their proximity to Minnesota, pathway of spread, and impact and in need of research into their detection, prevention and control.

AIS Infestations in Dakota County

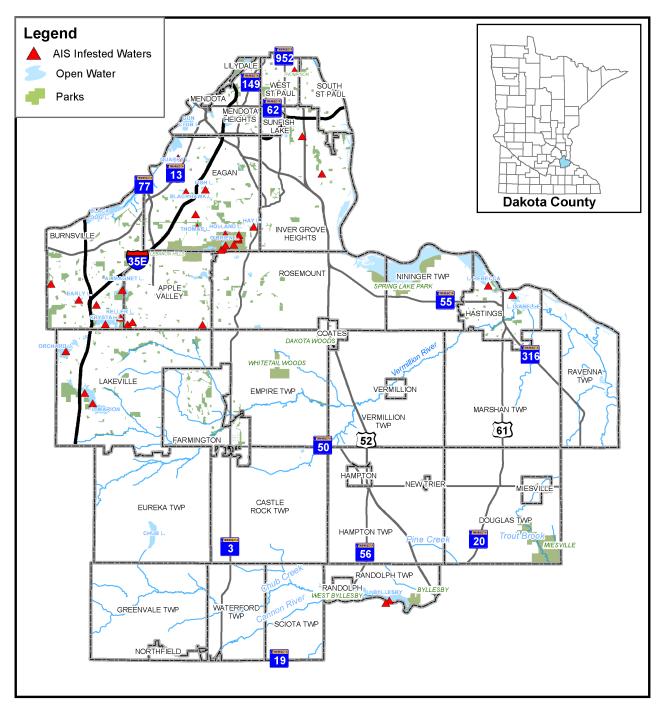


Figure 3. Dakota County Aquatic Invasive Species Infested Waters

As of October 2025, there are 32 waterbodies in Dakota County listed on the MN DNR's <u>Infested Waters List</u> (Figure 3; Table 5). Three waterbodies (Byllesby, Lac Lavon, Marion) are listed twice for two different species. Since 2021, four new infestations have been recorded around the county.

It is important to note that not all AIS identifications will trigger a listing on the infested waters list by the MN DNR. The MN DNR reserves that designation for a limited number of high-risk species that pose a severe threat of spreading to new waters and having a greater impact once in the new waterbody. Many Invasive species that do not trigger a listing includes curlyleaf pondweed, reed canary grass, yellow iris, purple loosestrife, rusty crayfish, and mystery snail species. Findings of these species should still be reported in EDDMapS as that helps the MN DNR and local AIS managers better understand the population distribution allowing for targeted treatment and outreach activities to occur when appropriate.

Many of these species have been found in Dakota County, and like in so many other locations, are so widely established that listing every waterbody they inhabit would be impractical. Curlyleaf pondweed, reed canary grass, and purple loosestrife have been present in the County for a significant number of years, whereas rusty crayfish and Chinese mystery snails were first known to have been identified by by volunteer groups in 2016. Rusty crayfish were found in the Vermillion River (Farmington and Hastings) and North Creek (Farmington) in the fall of 2016. Specimens were collected as part of routine biomonitoring activities performed by DCSWCD staff and by Hastings High School students participating in the VRWJPO's Vermillion River Watch program. Mystery snails were discovered while monitoring Thompson Lake (West St. Paul) by volunteers participating in Dakota County's Wetland Health Evaluation Program (WHEP).

Several other prohibited and regulated AIS are known to be present within Dakota County or are in adjoining or high use lakes in other parts of the state. These species (Table 6) are a growing concern due to their potential to spread to new waterbodies in Dakota County.

Management of AIS on the Mississippi and Minnesota Rivers is a collaborative effort between several state and federal agencies including the MN DNR, the US Army Corps of Engineers, the National Parks Service, and others. The MN DNR leads all AIS management and monitoring activities on the Mississippi River within Minnesota's jurisdiction, so management of those species identified as inhabiting the Mississippi River around Dakota County (namely the three carp species listed in Table 6) will not be addressed here.

Coordinating AIS efforts in Dakota County

Since its inception, the Committee has sought input from external partners to make the AIS program as productive and comprehensive as possible. Engagement focused on monitoring and outreach efforts as these are integral to preventing activity overlap and identifying AIS-related programmatic gaps that could be filled with financial, logistical, or programmatic support from the County through Local AIS Prevention Aid funding.

The Committee has used online surveys and roundtable meetings to learn about local efforts for AIS management and outreach. These have guided the development of this plan, strategies for dealing with AIS, and determining management responsibilities. To prevent overlap, LGUs and Dakota County Parks lead AIS management activities on all waterbodies (lakes, stormwater ponds, and wetlands with a MN DNR identification number) within their jurisdiction. Dakota County directs the grant program and coordinates outreach material development and purchasing. Dakota County is also responsible for managing the watercraft inspection program at County-owned launches as well as partnering with LGUs to support inspectors at local launches.

Implementation Plan

This section of the Plan describes strategies proposed by Dakota County to prevent, detect, and manage AIS infestations and increase public awareness. Proposed strategies are divided into the following categories:

- Prevention watercraft inspections and lake service provider
- Early Detection monitoring and assessments
- Rapid Response Plan and funding
- Outreach and Education material development, outreach events, volunteer program support
- Grant Program

Using funds made available through Local AIS Prevention Aid, as well as supplemental funds from Dakota County, Dakota County will work to prevent the infestation and spread of AIS in the county by supporting watercraft inspection and decontamination activities, as well as annual monitoring surveys, public awareness campaigns, and volunteer programs.

Local interest in efforts to counteract the spread of AIS within Dakota County has led to the development of monitoring, management, and outreach partnerships between lake associations, city and county governments, local watershed management organizations, and the MN DNR. Funding from the Local AIS Prevention Aid will also be used to support AIS-related projects undertaken by LGUs and non-profits that operate in Dakota County through the grant program.

As mentioned previously, it is important to consider this plan to be fluid in nature, in that implementation activities discussed in this plan are subject to change over time due to advances in research on AIS management, the detection and potential establishment of new AIS in the county, and future opportunities for various educational or outreach programming or partnerships.

Local AIS Prevention Aid Funding Allocation

The Local AIS Prevention Aid annual funding amounts are not set for 2027 – 2030, but an overall reduction in funds for a portion of this period is expected. With the expenditures shown in the proposed budget in the Appendix, the current budget level will be maintained for 2026 and 2027 (~\$120,000). As the reduction of state funds expected starting in 2028, the proposed annual budget for 2028-2030 was halved (\$60,000). If Dakota County receives less than that amount in the coming years, fewer funds will be allocated to the grant program to maintain the budget.

Prevention

AIS can be spread via numerous pathways including via recreational watercraft, fishing equipment, contaminated water, ballast, maintenance equipment, wind, and water. Each pathway poses varying levels of risk depending on the water body and the AIS of interest. The highest risk pathways through which AIS spread include boat accesses, docks and boat lifts, and attached to water recreational gear.

To prevent the spread of AIS in Dakota County, watercraft inspections at County-owned watercraft launches and support of inspections at launches owned by LGUs will be continued. Dakota County Parks will also maintain their

lake service provider certification and Dakota County will work with LGUs and other entities to ensure compliance within their organizations.

Watercraft inspection

Since 2017, Dakota County has implemented a watercraft inspection program using contractors to hire and train inspectors on MN DNR inspection protocols. Level 1 inspectors have been deployed at the motorized watercraft boat launch at Lake Byllesby Regional Park and at motorized watercraft launches in Burnsville (Crystal) and Lakeville (Marion and Orchard).

The Committee views watercraft inspections and boater education as key to preventing the spread of AIS. Interactions at the access serve to teach people about invasive species, to provide information on how to properly clean, drain and dry their watercraft or other water-related equipment after each use, and to dispose of unwanted bait in the trash.

Partnership with the Dakota County Sheriff's Department

The Committee formed a strategic partnership with the Dakota County Sheriff's Department beginning in 2019. Sheriff's Deputies were trained to perform AIS inspections and enforce regulations at various boat launches and through roadside checks in key areas. As Lake Byllesby is key recreation resource in the southern part of the County, partnering with Goodhue County's law enforcement program would further bolster the program's impact at Lake Byllesby.

Lake Service Provider Certification

In 2011, the Minnesota state legislature introduced a law related to the prevention and management of AIS that apply to <u>lake service providers businesses</u> (marinas, dock haulers, lawn irrigators and others who install or remove equipment; 2013 update includes businesses that rent or lease any type of boats or other water-related equipment). The law requires service providers to obtain a MN DNR permit to legally work in lakes and rivers throughout the state. Service providers can obtain the permit by attending an AIS training hosted by the MN DNR and passing the certification test. Re-certification is required every three years.

The Dakota County Parks Department has various watercrafts (canoes, kayaks, paddleboards) available for rent during the summer season at the Lebanon Hills Visitor Center for use in Lebanon Hills Regional Park. In accordance with the updated law, County parks staff continue to attend certification trainings every spring and are in possession of the MN DNR service provider permit. Dakota County will also work with LGUs and other entities in Dakota County to ensure compliance within their organizations.

Early Detection

Early detection monitoring provides opportunities to detect new AIS introductions before they become established in a waterbody, ultimately increasing the feasibility of a rapid response/eradication effort. Significant cost-savings can be realized by adopting an effective early detection monitoring program in the form of reduced long-term control and management expenses, in addition to protecting existing natural resource investments.

Dakota County recognizes LGUs and WMOs as the responsible entities for primary management of the water resources within their boundaries. Such responsibilities include surface water monitoring and tracking water quality trends, vegetation surveys (in-water and riparian), and implementing other lake and river water quality management actions. Because of the high level of water resources management currently undertaken by LGUs and WMOs, Dakota County staff will prioritize AIS monitoring and detection efforts on waterbodies that are within the County Parks system (particularly Lake Byllesby). Dakota County continues to support LGUs with their monitoring activities and will assist with monitoring and assessment activities if assistance is requested.

Monitoring and Assessments

Early detection monitoring activities on lakes with County-owned accesses have included:

- Aquatic vegetation surveys (point-intercept)
 - Species of interest: Eurasian watermilfoil, curlyleaf pondweed, flowering rush
 - Visual observations for cylindro (blue-green algae), common carp, zebra mussels
- Suitability Assessments with reference to lake bottom sediments for AIS
 - Hydrilla, purple loosestrife, rusty crayfish, spiny waterflea, starry stonewort, Chinese and banded mystery snail, faucet snail, invasive carp, and snakehead
- Installation of zebra mussel plate samplers at boat launches or fishing accesses



Aquatic vegetation monitoring

The goal of the program is to monitor the presence of AIS in county parks and assess the potential for spread between waterbodies within the parks system. Plans for upcoming monitoring and assessment activities are undetermined at this time. The Committee will work with Dakota County Parks to establish program objectives and develop and implement a monitoring strategy that can be used going forward.

Lake Byllesby

Because of the potential for an AIS infestation in Lake Byllesby to negatively impact the Byllesby Dam, preventing an AIS introduction (particularly zebra mussels) in Lake Byllesby is a top priority for Dakota County. Unfortunately, in August 2023, MN DNR native mussel staff found one live adult zebra mussel attached to a native mussel enclosure in Lake Byllesby. Due to abundant algal growth at that time, veliger tows were conducted instead of visual SCUBA searching. No zebra mussel veligers were found during this search. A follow-up zebra mussel monitoring survey was conducted in June 2024. Veliger tows were collected at four sites across the lake and a snorkeling search was conducted near the initial report location. No adult zebra mussels were

observed, but four zebra mussel veligers were found. Dakota County hired a consultant to conduct additional monitoring in the fall of 2024. High priority landing spots were targeted, and a single adult zebra mussel was found at that time. <u>Lake Byllesby was listed as infested for zebra mussels</u> due to these findings.

A collaborative effort to prevent further infestations is necessitated by the fact that both Dakota County and Goodhue County own lakeshore property and operate public water accesses on Lake Byllesby. Goodhue County financially supports the Lake Byllesby Improvement Association annual aquatic vegetation monitoring effort.

Metropolitan Council Environmental Services conducts <u>regular water monitoring activities</u> on Lake Byllesby on a rotating schedule. Monitoring efforts are conducted bi-weekly from April through October. Common water quality issues and characteristics are monitored for, including:

- Basic lake characteristics such as water clarity and vertical depth profiles of dissolved oxygen, temperature, conductivity, pH, and turbidity
- Excessive nutrient enrichment phosphorus and nitrogen
- Chloride
- Visual assessments for AIS at the boat launch and near the monitoring location(s)

Though not looking for AIS specifically, any observations by Metropolitan Council staff are reported to EDDMapS, Dakota County, DCSWCD, and the MN DNR.

Volunteer Monitoring Network

Providing volunteers with the necessary training to identify and report potential infestations is one strategy to help prevent the spread of AIS within Dakota County. Each year, the County supports public involvement through their participation in volunteer programs including the University of Minnesota Extension's AIS Detector program, Starry Trek, and the Wetland Health Evaluation Program. Supporting volunteer engagement through these programs has increased the number of volunteers trained in AIS identification and reporting who can then support local AIS efforts.

Participants with the <u>AIS Detectors program</u> learn general principles of aquatic ecology; AIS identification and monitoring methodology; reporting protocols. Upon completing the course, participants eligible to participate in the AIS Detectors volunteer program by completing annual AIS-related volunteer activities of their choice. The Committee has funding available to cover registration fees for interested Dakota County residents.

Starry Trek is an annual statewide event coordinated by the MAISRC and hosted by local organizations. Dakota County hosts this event which includes training volunteers and providing them with equipment and directions to monitor local lakes. Any species found (native and invasive) are collected for identification and reported to the MNDNR. During this event, Starry Trek volunteers have discovered previously unknown populations of various invasive species (including starry stonewort, zebra mussels, Eurasian watermilfoil, and Chinese and banded mystery snails) in lakes all around the state.

Program (WHEP), a volunteer program focused on determining the health of wetlands in the County. WHEP volunteers are trained and work on community-based teams to collect data on wetland plants and macroinvertebrates, providing valuable information to local governments and decision makers. Beginning in 2016, and annually thereafter, Dakota County provided AIS funds to WHEP to incorporate AIS plants and macroinvertebrates into the training materials, monitoring protocols, and reference guides used by the volunteers.

Rapid Response

Rapid assessment and response involve assessing the size of the AIS infestation relative to the resources and tools available to completely remove the infestation ("eradication"). The best defense against an AIS infestation in a local waterbody is utilizing strong preventative actions, like boat inspections at launch sites and educating the public about rules and regulations relating to AIS, to prevent AIS from ever entering the waterbody in the first place. Early detection of a new infestation, and a subsequent response to that infestation, are considered the "second line of defense," following prevention.

Early detection and rapid response are core tenets of any effective invasive species management program. When the introduction of new AIS is detected, a prompt and coordinated response to contain the affected area (and, if feasible, provide treatment to eradicate the species) can reduce the potential establishment, spread, and harmful impacts of a given species. Early detection and response to a new infestation can result in lower overall costs and reduced damage to the resource than implementing a long-term control program after an invasive species is established in the waterbody. Regular monitoring is necessary to detect new infestations in a timely manner so that the response plan can be as effective as possible.

To deal with new AIS infestations, Dakota County utilizes the MN DNR's Rapid Response Plan developed a rapid response plan outlining different response strategies to employ when a new infestation is reported and a rapid response contingency fund that is available for use by LGUs and other concerned organizations when responding to a new infestation.

Rapid Response Plan

Eradication is always the primary goal of a rapid response plan. Failing to completely eradicate AIS from a waterbody means that the infestation will be a reoccurring problem in future years. Unfortunately, as is often the case, once AIS is established in a waterbody, successful eradication is unlikely, which further emphasizes the importance of prevention and early detection monitoring. Early detection and rapid response are the critical second line of defense to minimize the economic and ecological impact of an AIS infestation.

A rapid response plan may have one of several possible goals relating to dealing with an infestation, such as containing the entirety of the AIS infestation within a given area, suppressing the population to slow its spread to other parts of the lake or river, or containing the AIS and preventing its spread to new locations by completely eradicating it. It is important to keep in mind that not all AIS infestations will necessitate a rapid response effort

going into effect and no two rapid response plans are alike so each new AIS infestation will be responded to on a case-by-case basis.

The Dakota County AIS Advisory Committee recognizes the MN DNR's Rapid Response Plan (2021) for use in local implementation when dealing with new AIS infestations. This Plan:

- Outlines the process for early detection of new infestations
- Focuses on rapid response for new and isolated AIS occurrences
- Is adaptable to be useful in a variety for different species and waterbody types

This MN DNR's plan provides background on Minnesota experiences with Rapid Response, related Federal plans and requirements, an incident command system to clarify the organizational and decision-making structure, a summary of available resources, and a process for acting. The Dakota County response team includes representatives from Dakota County, DCSWCD, and local representation from LGUs and lake association members.

For more information about the rapid response plan, see MN DNR's Invasive Species Program, go to the subheading 'Responsibilities.'

Rapid Response Contingency Fund

A portion of the funding provided to Dakota County through the Local AIS Prevention Aid Grant has been set aside to assist with rapid response activities in the county. A minimum balance of \$20,000 will be maintained starting in 2026. Because all AIS infestations are unique, rapid response procedures will be initiated in partnership with, and following recommendations by, state and/or local agencies.

Once a response plan for a new infestation has been decided upon, contingency funds are made available to partner organizations. These funds can be used for direct response activities such as monitoring or treatment (chemicals, staff, supplies) or for public engagement (community notifications, outreach activities, educational materials).

Outreach and Education

One of the keys to successfully preventing AIS from spreading is to engage the public on AIS issues (major species of concern and their potential impact) and to communicate the importance of personal responsibility regarding prevention. In doing this, Dakota County will continue to explore partnership opportunities with internal partners, local businesses and community organizations; strengthen existing relationships with LGUs and lake associations; and support established outreach campaigns (including those developed by the MN DNR and the County.

Dakota County will also look to expand its role with and act as a central hub for information, coordinating outreach materials, and ensuring effective communication through regular updates on grants, resources, and webinars with LGUS, lake associations and other partners. The County also hopes to collaborate with others through the establishment of a local workgroup among cities, lake associations, and other stakeholders. The County's role would be to host presentations and trainings and facilitate roundtable discussions.

Outreach Materials

Roundtable discussions with LGUs often focus on partnership opportunities. Discussions indicated that all parties would be best served by the County developing AIS-related outreach materials and supporting educational programming that could be used by partner organization. Using this direction, the County has created or purchased a variety of AIS outreach materials including AIS identification guides, brochures, and specialty items. These materials have been handed out at the Dakota County Fair, provided to Starry Trek volunteers and attendees of other outreach events, and distributed by watercraft inspectors at local boat launches.

Some of the outreach materials available include:

- Waterproof bathymetric maps for Lake Byllesby, Crystal Lake, and Lake Marion
- AIS identification books and ID cards
- Temporary tattoos and sunglasses
- Bags, towels, key chain floats

In 2020, Dakota County hired a consultant to develop an educational display and supporting materials (maze, chalkboard, ID cards) for use at public events including in libraries and building atriums. The purpose of the display was to inform and educate the community and promote positive behavior changes when dealing with AIS issues. The display and supporting materials, as well as the other outreach and swag offerings, are available to partners for use at community events and presentations. Future

consideration is also being given to the creation and sourcing of new outreach materials and giveaways.

Youth and Family Outreach Programs

The Committee has in the past and will continue to participate in various outreach events including Hastings' Party in the Park and the School of Environmental Studies' Earth Day celebrations, as well as Dakota County Parks' Take a Kid Fishing Day and the City of Eagan's LakeFest. Opportunities to promote and support education activities that serve various groups within local communities including Metro Children's Water Festival, Starry Trek, and Dakota County Library programming will also be sought out.

Participating in these events is an easy way to engage directly with a given audience (school age, youth or the general public), promote AIS information, and inform people on how they can best help to prevent the spread of AIS

and educate others. In the future, Dakota County will continue to attend these events or support by providing the host organization with educational displays and outreach materials.

For the past several years, Dakota County has contributed both financially and in-kind to the Metro Children's Water Festival. The purpose of the festival is to educate fourth grade students from local schools about water related topics including water quality and quantity, macroinvertebrates, and AIS. Each year, 200 to 250 students from schools in Dakota County participate in hands-on and virtual opportunities to learn about water and its importance to people and the natural environment. The goal is to engage students about ways they can help ensure future protection and management of water quality and quantity. In recent years, AIS has taken on a larger focus at the festival, so this event serves as a first point of contact for many children to not only learn about AIS but also learn how they can help prevent the spread.

Starry Trek is a single day AIS volunteer monitoring event organized by the University of Minnesota Extension and MAISRC. Dakota County has hosted a local training site since it began in 2017. The statewide monitoring effort has averaged over 220 volunteers (including individuals of all ages, families, Scout and 4H groups) monitoring local lakes for AIS each year and has resulted in 99 new infestations being reported across the state (18 of those have been in Dakota County). During Starry Trek, volunteers participate in a brief AIS identification and monitoring training before heading to local boat launches to search for AIS. Suspected AIS are collected and returned to the coordinator at the rendezvous site for identification confirmation and reporting. Dakota County volunteers have discovered a

zebra mussel infestation in Lake Isabelle in Hastings and multiple Eurasian watermilfoil and mystery snail populations. The importance of this event is highlighted by the fact that infestations that would probably not have been discovered had there not been volunteers out monitoring for AIS as part of the event. The Dakota County training site has had the highest (or close to the highest) number of volunteers participate in the event each year and feedback from the event continues to be positive as volunteers are excited to learn more skills and want to continue to be engaged in other monitoring activities in the county.

Over the last few years, the Committee has developed a strong partnership with Dakota County Library. Focusing on National Invasive Species Week in February and National Water Quality Month in August, the Committee has provided library branches with outreach materials and purchased AIS-related books to be displayed at the branch entrance for a set time. This partnership helps to increase the visibility of the AIS program as it provides the community with easily accessible educational materials and information about AIS volunteer efforts on their local waterbodies.

Grant Program

In 2017, the Committee launched a <u>AIS grant program</u> with the goal to promote and support AIS prevention, management, and education efforts by local organizations within the county. Those eligible to propose projects and compete for available funds include local municipalities, townships, watershed organizations, lake associations, and non-profits located in Dakota County. Collaborative proposals between partner groups are recommended to strengthen the effectiveness and positive outcomes of a given project. Projects must be conducted on waterbodies or waterways within Dakota County.

- Early detection and population assessment
- Management of new or established AIS populations
- Watercraft inspection and decontamination programs
- Education and outreach activities and resource development

The grant program is held on an annual basis in late winter/early spring to align with field season planning and permit application due dates. Adjustments to the grant program have occurred over time due to funding availability, program goals, and the number of applicants. Authorize the execution of Agreement No. 1060110 with Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) for Signal Revisions at Trunk Highway (TH) 13 and County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 28 through Eagan Project No. 1562.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County is partnering with MnDOT and the City of Eagan on project No. 1562. The project consists of revisions at four traffic signals within the City of Eagan; however, only the location of TH 13 and CSAH 28 (Yankee Doodle Road), identified as Signal System "C", involves County participation. The traffic signal revisions consist of flashing yellow arrows installation and associated necessary hardwire improvements, as well as new Americans with Disabilities Act-approved ramps, trail construction, and pedestrian pushbuttons (Attachment: Project Location).

Agreement No. 1060110 determines the responsibilities of each relevant party and their corresponding cost shares for this project. Per the Agreement, Dakota County will provide minor signal system maintenance to signal System "C". The County portion of the budget has been designated as County Project (CP) 28-72.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends executing Agreement No. 1060110 with MnDOT and the City of Eagan for Project No. 1562 to make signal revisions at TH 13 and CSAH 28 (Yankee Doodle Road).

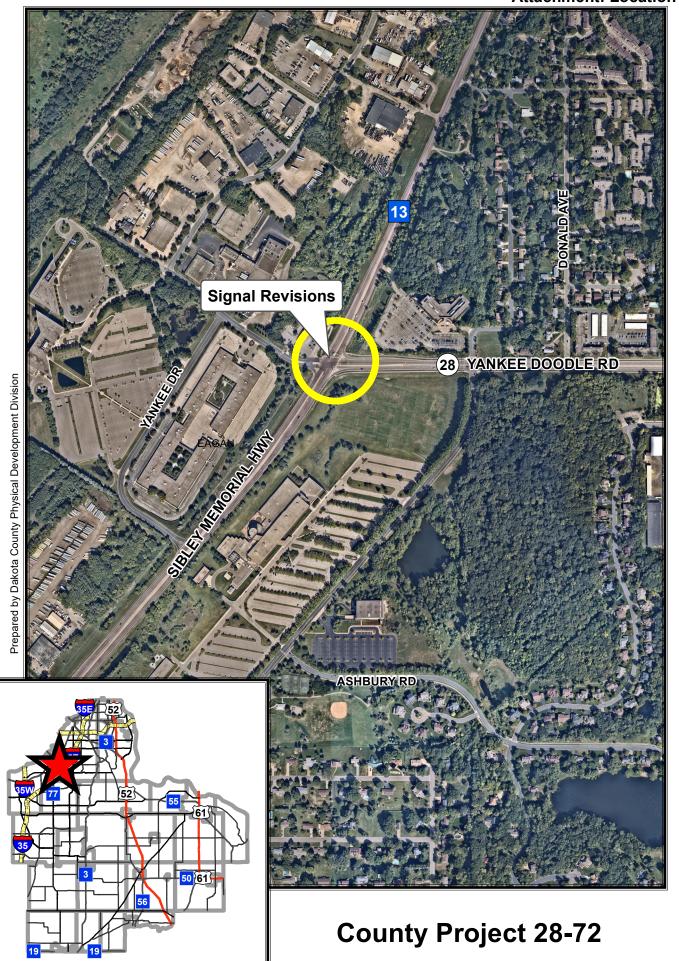

Authorization To Amend 2025 Adopted Budget For Construction And Maintenance Agreement With Canadian Pacific And Union Pacific Railroad For Railroad Bridge Replacement On **County Project 86-34**

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Amend the Transportation Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Adopted Budget for County Project (CP) 86-34 to include additional funding for the Union Pacific Railroad contract under the Construction and Maintenance Agreement with Dakota County, Canadian Pacific, and Union Pacific to support replacement of the existing railroad bridge in Castle Rock, Eureka, Greenvale, and Waterford Townships.

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County has proceeded with CP 86-34. This project involves the reconstruction of County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 86 (280th Street West) as an undivided two-lane highway with shoulders and dedicated turn lanes at all public road intersections, extending from CSAH 23 (Galaxie Avenue) to Trunk Highway (TH) 3 (Chippendale Ave). The project also includes an urban three-lane section with curb and gutter through the Village of Castle Rock, as well as the replacement of the existing railroad bridge (FRA/DOT #380380F) in coordination with Union Pacific Railroad.

By Resolution No. 20-523 (October 20, 2020), the County Board authorized execution of a Construction and Maintenance (C&M) Agreement between Dakota County, Canadian Pacific (Canadian Pacific), and Union Pacific Railroad Company (Union Pacific) that established project requirements and goals for replacing the existing railroad bridge as part of CP 86-34.

By Resolution No. 22-312 (July 19, 2022), the County Board approved amendments to the 2022 Sales and Use Tax and Transportation Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budgets, and authorized execution of a contract with Northland Grading & Excavating for the construction of CP 86-34.

The 2025 Transportation CIP includes a remaining balance of \$40,851.64 within the total project budget of \$24,266,269.30 for CP 86-34. However, the contract with Union Pacific Railroad includes up to \$800,000 in remaining or anticipated billing. To meet the full contractual obligation, a budget amendment is required.

An amendment is requested to increase the construction budget for CP 86-34 by \$800,000, bringing the total 2025 Transportation Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget for the project to \$25,066,269.30. This increase will fully fund the remaining contractual obligations with Union Pacific Railroad and support the completion of all outstanding work.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends amending the 2025 Transportation CIP budget to fully fund and complete construction of CP 86-34.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The 2025 Transportation CIP budget does not include sufficient funding to fully cover the Union Pacific Railroad contract for County Project 86-34. A budget amendment of \$800,000 is required to address this shortfall. The gap will be funded using County Sales and Use Tax revenues. Overall project funding sources include Federal funds, County State Aid Highway (CSAH) funds, and County Sales and Use Tax funds.

WHEREAS, the 2025 Transportation Capital Improvement Program (CIP) includes a remaining balance of \$40,851.64 for CP 86-34, which is insufficient to fully fund the remaining contractual obligations with Union Pacific Railroad; and

WHEREAS, a budget amendment of \$800,000 is necessary to fully fund the Union Pacific Railroad contract and ensure completion of all outstanding work without delay; and

WHEREAS, the funding gap will be covered using County Sales and Use Tax revenues, with overall project funding including Federal, CSAH, and County Sales and Use Tax funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Dakota County Board of Commissioners authorizes the amendment of the 2025 Transportation Capital Improvement Program Budget to include additional funds for County Project 86-34 as follows:

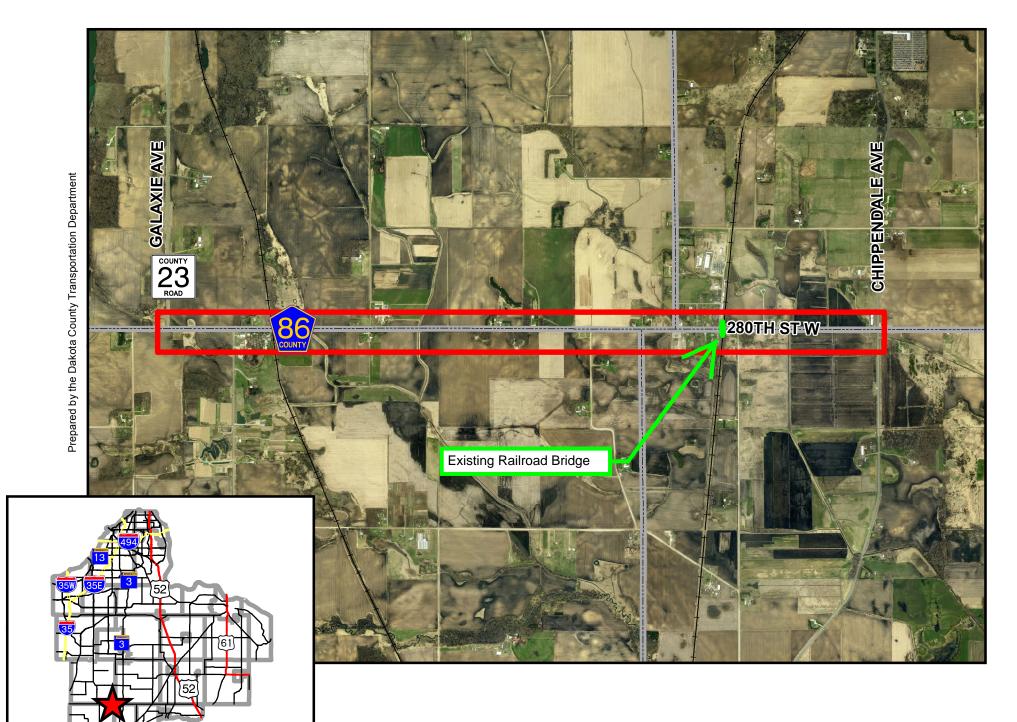

REVIEW 09/24/25:

The proposed site includes two lots to be platted as Block 1, Lot 1; and Outlot A. Block 1, Lot 1 is to remain as Inver Wood Golf Course. Outlot A is undeveloped and is reserved for future development. The proposed plat is adjacent to CSAH 26, CSAH 28, and CSAH 73 which are all designated as three-lane roadways with 60 feet of half right-of-way dedication requirement. Appropriate right-of-way dedication is shown along CSAH 26. Existing right-of-way along CSAH 28 is 50 feet of half right-of-way. The plat must dedicate an additional 10 feet of half right-of-way along CSAH 28. Existing right-of-way along CSAH 73 is 33 feet. The plat must dedicate an additional 27 feet of half right-of-way along CSAH 73. This applies to both Block 1, Lot 1; and Outlot A.

Dakota County access spacing guidelines are ¼ miles for full access locations on CSAH 26 and CSAH 73. Access to Block 1, Lot 1 will remain at the existing golf course entrance. Access to Outlot A must be provided via the local street to the north. Restricted access must be shown along CSAH 26 and CSAH 73 except for a 60-foot opening at the existing golf course entrance.

RECOMMENDATION 09/24/25:

The Plat Commission has approved the preliminary plat provided that the described conditions are met. The Ordinance requires submittal of a final plat for review by the Plat Commission before a recommendation is made to the County Board of Commissioners.

REVIEW 11/05/25:

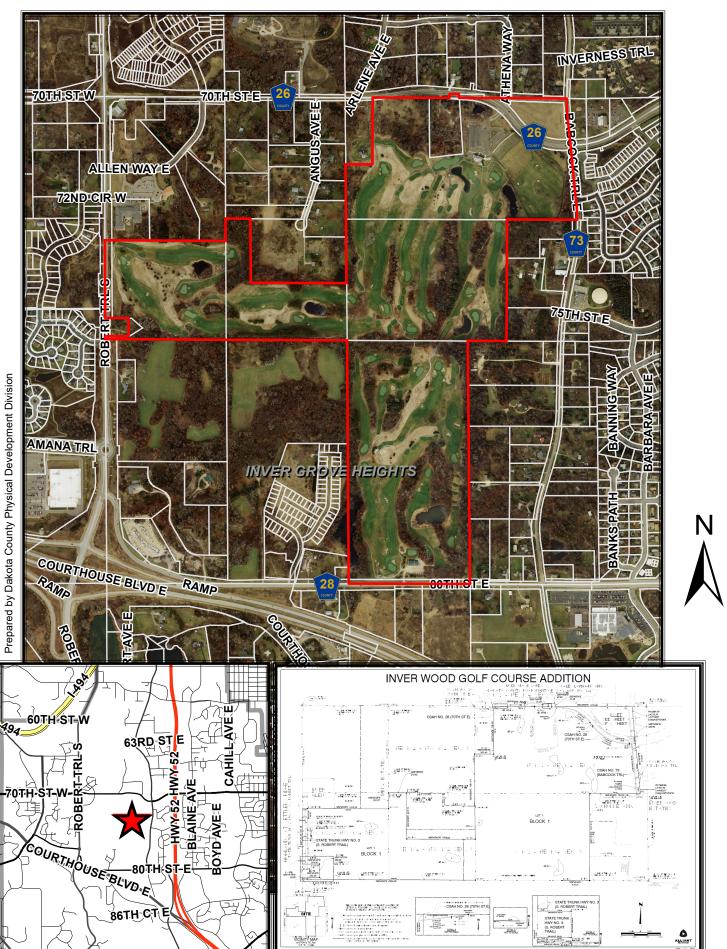
The proposed site includes two lots to be platted as one lot and one outlot. The platted lot will remain as Inver Wood Golf Course. The outlot is undeveloped and planned for future development. The proposed plat adjacent to CSAH 26, CSAH 28, and CSAH 73 are all designated as three-lane roadways with 60 feet of half right-of-way dedication requirements. The final plat meets the right-of-way needs of 60 feet of half right of way with the proposed road dedications. As noted, the outlot will require additional right-of-way dedication for the future roundabout.

The Dakota County access spacing guidelines are ¼ mile for full access locations and 1/8 mile for restricted access locations along CSAH 26, CSAH 28 and CSAH 73. There are two access locations to CSAH 26, one full access at the existing main entrance and one future restricted access at the existing golf operations entrance, which is located approximately 1/8 mile west of the main entrance. Access to Outlot A must be provided via the local street to the north. Restricted access should be shown along all of CSAH 26, CSAH 73 and CSAH 28 except two access openings along CSAH 26 one access opening along CSAH 28.

As discussed, there is an existing city parcel located in CSAH 26 right of way that has not be included in the plat legal description. The County recommends adding this adjoining city property to the plat description and dedicated as CSAH 26 or deeding the property to the County. The legal description can be found in Warranty Deed No. 951339, which is described in the first paragraph of Exhibit A (Parcel ID's: 200050080021& 200050080022). This would clean up ownership for the future CSAH 26 right of way map.

PURPOSE/ACTION REQUESTED

Authorize the pursuit of right of way acquisition and relocation assistance for the total acquisition of the Parcel Three on County Project (CP) 26-060 in Inver Grove Heights (City).

SUMMARY

To provide a safe and efficient transportation system, Dakota County and the City of Inver Grove Heights (City) are proceeding with CP 26-060, a reconstruction of County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 26 between Allen Way and Trunk Highway (TH) 52 that will include a roadway expansion to three lanes, construction of two roundabouts, multiuse trail, retaining wall, storm sewer, and installation of new City utilities (Attachment: Project Map). Expansion of CSAH 26 in this area is a recommendation of the updated Regional Roadway System Visioning Study adopted by Resolution No. 22-419 (October 4, 2022). A joint powers agreement (JPA) with the City to enable final design and right of way acquisition was executed by Resolution No. 23-075 (February 28, 2023).

Dakota County is the lead agency for the design, right of way acquisition, and construction of CP 26-060. Acquisition of right of way from 21 parcels, including one total acquisition, is required to deliver the project. Property appraisal and negotiations for the total acquisition of parcel three, the Cotterman Parcel (1271 70th St. E.) (Attachment: Cotterman Parcel) have begun in order to maintain the schedule for the overall project. An appraisal and review appraisal were completed by Patchin Messner Valuation Counselors and Kelly Lindstrom, respectively. The total appraised value, plus relocation and moving expenses, is estimated at \$400,000. Detailed information about the appraisals has been provided to the Board in a separate document, as the appraisal is currently confidential, non-public data pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 13.44, subd. 3. The property owners are entitled to relocation assistance from the County, including moving and relocation expenses. If this property is acquired, all structures would be demolished, and the property prepared for construction anticipated in 2027.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the right of way acquisition and relocation assistance for the total acquisition of the Cotterman property for CP 26-060.

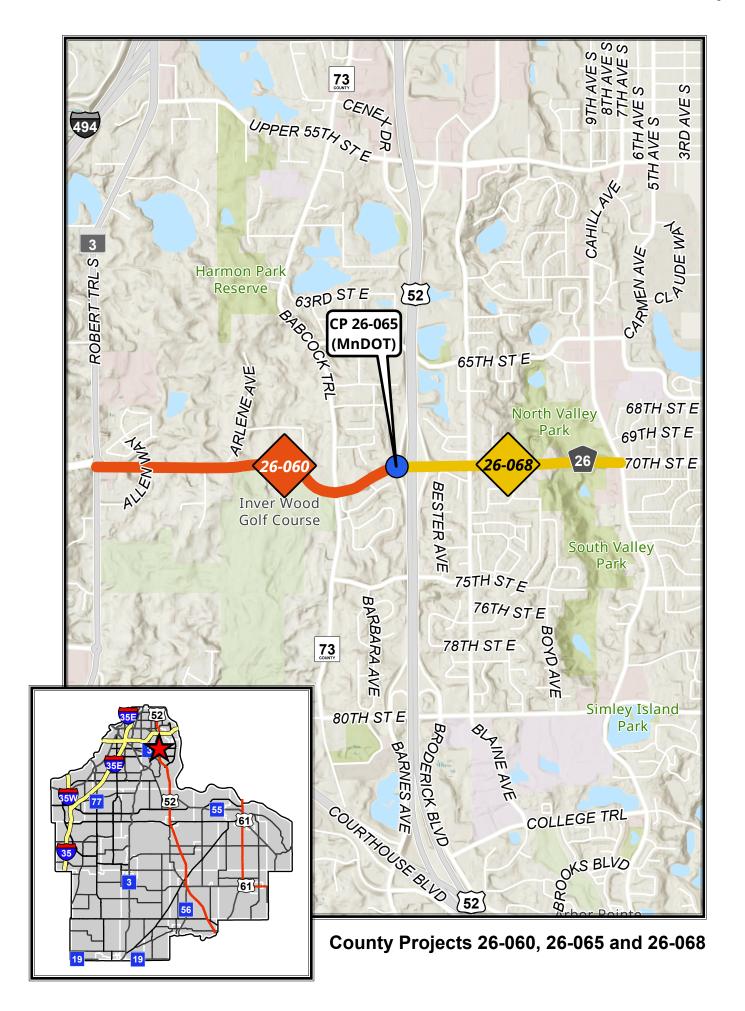

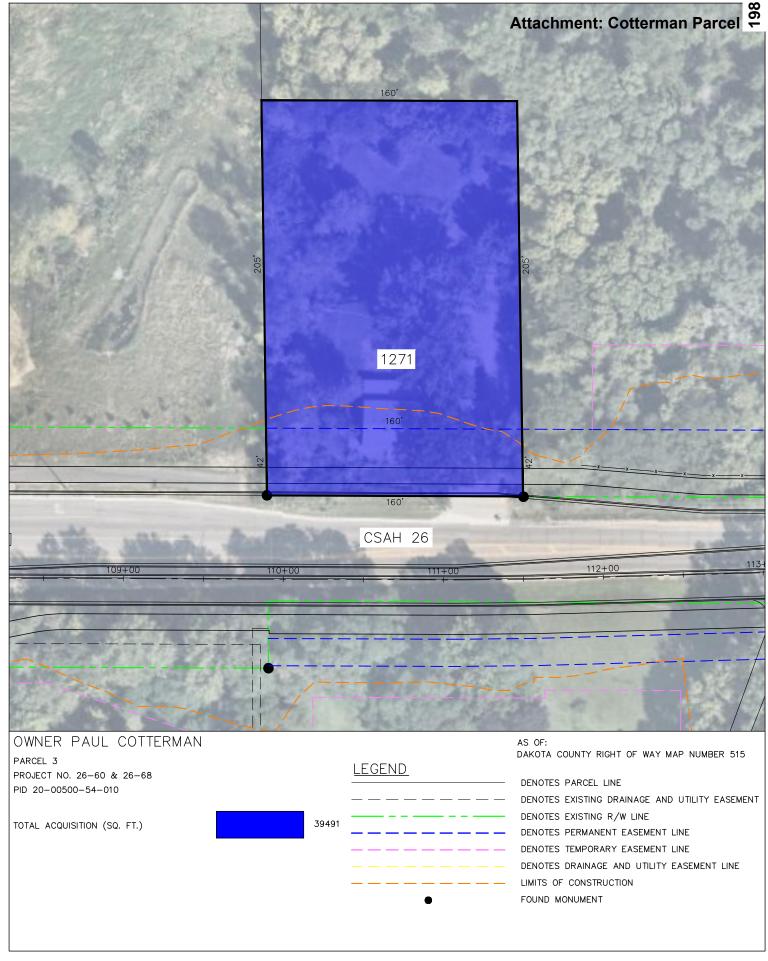

SUMMARY

The Dakota County Transportation Department is committed to providing safe and efficient travel within the County. Eureka Township is proposing to make improvements to 34 miles of township roadways. The improvements include re-shaping, grading, and adding up to 6.5 inches of gravel to roads under township jurisdiction. Eureka Township is pursuing funding for the improvements through MnDOT's LRIP solicitation, which requires Dakota County support and sponsorship.

The Eureka Township gravel roadways need resurfacing. Some of the roadways do not have sufficient gravel to grade and shape the surface. The proposed improvements will bring all the gravel roadways in Eureka Township up to standards. Construction is proposed in 2026.

LRIP is administered by MnDOT and makes available up to \$1,500,000 to apply towards projects on local roads that are regionally significant, result in safety improvements, address transportation deficiencies and contribute to economic development. LRIP requires townships to have a county sponsor and the support of a County Board. LRIP also requires that Dakota County be the fiscal agent on behalf of Eureka Township, allowing the funds to flow through the County to the contractor.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends authorizing a letter of support and agreeing to sponsor the application for road improvements.

Authorize to execute a contract with T.W. Vending Inc., dba Turnkey Corrections (Turnkey Corrections) for jail canteen services.

SUMMARY

Since 2010, the County has contracted with Turnkey Corrections for inmate services, including onsite and off-site video visitation, video voicemail, inmate secure messaging, and vending services. In 2014, the County released a Request for Proposals for this service. At the conclusion of that process, Turnkey Corrections was chosen to provide canteen services to the Sheriff's Office and have been exceptional. The current agreement is set to expire on December 31, 2025, and the Sheriff wishes to continue this relationship from January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2030.

The contractor, Turnkey Corrections, is responsible for maintaining, servicing, and repairing all equipment and keeping the same in good order and operating condition.

Pursuant to Minnesota Department of Corrections Rules Governing Adult Detention Facilities (Minn. Rules 2911.4800), the County is required to operate a canteen in the jail facility. Minn. Stat. § 16A.72 addresses revenue and expenses in canteen revolving funds and subdivision 7 states, "...in the case of prison industries in the correctional revolving fund, in each institution for the benefit of the patients and inmates..." Commissions received by the Dakota County Sheriff's Office from this canteen fund are applied to programs and supplies for the benefit of the inmates.

RECOMMENDATION

Sheriff's staff recommends authorizing the Sheriff to execute a contract with T.W. Vending Inc., dba Turnkey Corrections to provide jail canteen services for the period January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2030.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

Revenue and expenses of \$100,000 are reflected in the County Manager's recommended 2026 budget. The revenues that pay for this contract come from a percentage commission received by the County from the sales of products or use of text and emails. If these revenues are insufficient to cover canteen service expenses, any deficit is paid for with the use of General Fund balance.

Authorize the Sheriff to execute a contract authorization to execute contract With T.W. Vending Inc., dba Turnkey Corrections (Turnkey Corrections) for inmate telephone services.

SUMMARY

In 2025, the Dakota County Sheriff Office issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) seeking a vendor to provide telephone and tablet services to inmates of the Dakota County Jail. A careful comparison of the proposals received during this process was conducted by Sheriff's Office staff. Turnkey Corrections was chosen as the recommended vendor who offered the most desirable services to Dakota County.

That current telephone contract expires December 31, 2025. Sheriff's staff recommends authorizing the Sheriff to execute a contract with Turnkey Corrections to provide jail telephone services for the period January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2030.

Charges for services are within Federal Communication Commission (FCC) regulations. Inmates will be charged \$0.21 per minute for local, intrastate, and interstate telephone calls, \$0.21 per minute for international calls, and \$0.21 per minute for voicemails. Under the terms of the contract, the County will receive a commission of 57.14 percent of gross revenues for telephone. This is an increase from the previous contract, which provided 53 percent of gross revenues to the County. The commission revenue is placed into a "canteen" fund or a correctional revolving fund as defined in Minn. Stat. § 243.23, to be used for the benefit of the inmates.

RECOMMENDATION

Sheriff's staff recommends authorizing the Sheriff to execute a contract with Turnkey Corrections to provide jail telephone services for the period January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2030.

EXPLANATION OF FISCAL/FTE IMPACTS

The revenue for jail telephone services is included in the County Manager's recommended 2026 Sheriff's Office budget.

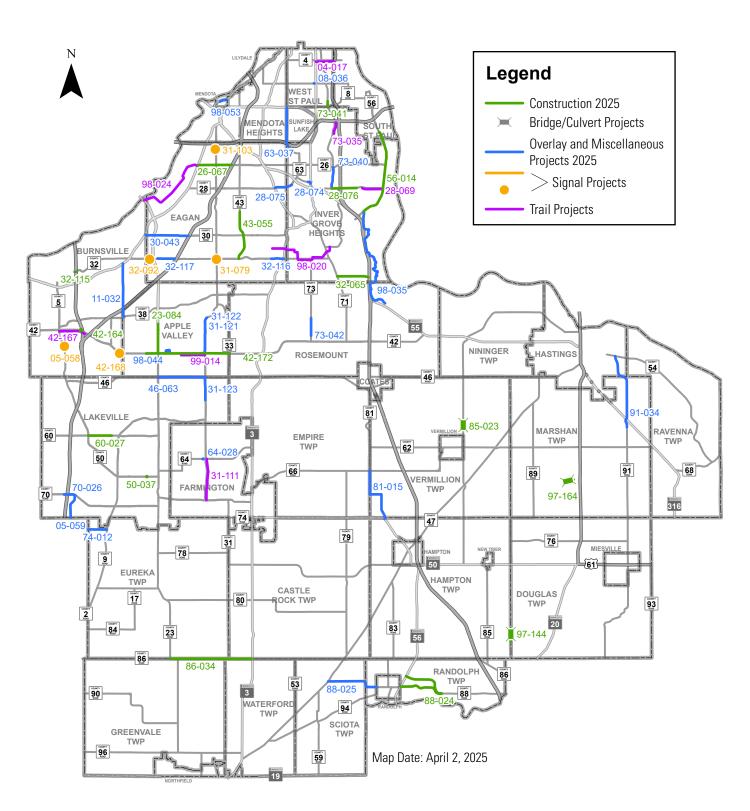

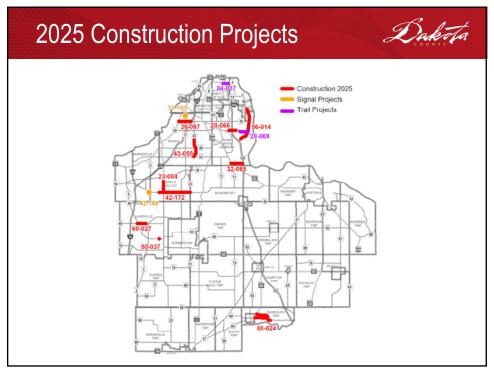

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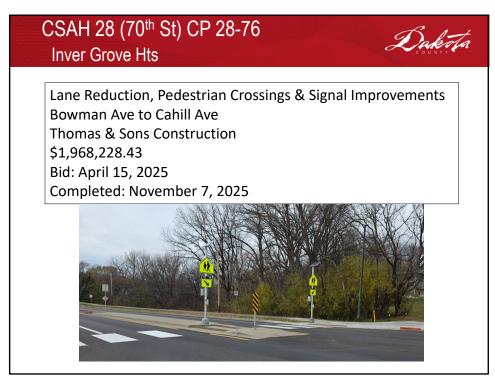

WHEREAS, to construct the project, the County acquired certain property rights by eminent domain proceedings (19HA-CV-21-317) from Falcon Development, LLC (Owner) identified by Dakota County

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Right of Way Map No. 471 as Parcel 25, DU 25, TE 25, Parcel 26, DU 26, TE 26, Parcel 27, DU 27 and TE 27; and
